

PROSPECTS BRIGHT FOR OPENING OF COLUMBIA RIVER

Senator Chamberlain, Upon Returning From Canadian Conference, Bears Prophecy That River Will Be Opened

Bringing the prophecy that Portland is to have a great tributary territory opened up that will include all of the Columbia river basin to its headwaters in British Columbia, Senator George E. Chamberlain returned from Canada yesterday. He told this morning of the meeting held in Nelson, B. C., where Sir Wilfrid Laurier, premier of Canada, recommended the appointment of a surveying commission that will make estimates on the cost of opening the Columbia river from the boundary line to Lake Windermere, where the Columbia rises.

Senator Chamberlain explained that in view of the work being done to open the lower Columbia the Canadians would be given a water highway to the sea, making Nelson virtually a seaport.

The Columbia makes a great sweep from its headwaters in Lake Windermere, first west, then north, then west again, then south through Arrow lake to the boundary line. The country, said Senator Chamberlain, is immensely rich. It would be tremendously profitable to Portland should the river thus be opened to navigation.

"I think the Canadians mean business," said Senator Chamberlain, significantly.

Premier Is Favorable.

"Premier Laurier's recommendation that work of making estimates on opening the river be set about, amounts to a promise that it will be done. His influence is immense and he usually has his way. In this instance popular sentiment is with him."

Other delegates to the open river meeting in Canada were C. F. Adams, C. P. Swigart, A. H. Devers and Captain J. D. Gray, who also returned to the city yesterday. All were enthusiastic over the commercial possibilities of the proposed opening of the Columbia to navigation, and have belief that it will be done, clear to the headwaters. Comment on Osawatimie Speech.

The echoes of Roosevelt's speech at Osawatimie rang through the columns of the local press today. It was discussed by politicians here and all united in the sentiment that it was one of the most remarkable addresses delivered since Roosevelt began his journey west.

"I regard yesterday as the most important political day ever known in Kansas," said Senator Bristow. "The gathering that listened to the Osawatimie speech was the most remarkable I ever saw. Considering the circumstances of the speech, it was, in my judgment, the most important Roosevelt ever made. Colonel Roosevelt did not deny the belief of the Kansans that the speech marked him as an insurgent."

Congressman Madison said:

"Kansas was already placed in the progressive column and Roosevelt's speech positively confirmed that classification. It was an unqualified endorsement of the principles of the progressive Republicans and has given impetus to the cause."

NO TIME WILL BE LOST IN BUILDING BROADWAY SPAN

\$2,000,000 for the bridge," continued Mr. Weldman. "I am satisfied that it can be built in the best possible way for less than \$1,500,000. I hope the work will proceed rapidly, for there has been a very wearisome time of waiting for the bridge bonds to be sold. The sale of the bonds yesterday is very satisfactory to me."

Mr. Weldman's satisfaction because of the bonds' sale was shared by Judge M. G. Munly, one of the Broadway bridges' most earnest and active advocates, who had just returned from a two months' stay in Alaska.

Judge Munly Pleased.

"It seems almost too good to be true," said Judge Munly, "that after all the months of work and combat with obstructionists that the bonds have actually been sold. I hope nothing will happen to prevent the taking over of the securities by Ladd & Tilton. One would think now that the Kiernan-Dunaway obstructionists would give up the fight. They certainly have been given proof that the people of Portland are determined to have the bridge because it is a necessity that continually grows greater with the city's growth."

"After the city council had sold the first \$250,000 block of Broadway

bridge bonds to Ladd & Tilton, City Auditor Barber said yesterday that an abstract of information concerning the bonds would be filed with the buyers within seven days. The attorney of the buyers will then pass upon the securities to the light of the information thus given and is expected to formally recommend the paying over of the money, according to the bid made and accepted.

Of Jack-knife Type.

Then with the money in hand, Mayor Simon and the executive board can advertise for bids on the piers. There are to be four of these in the river. These are samples of the red tape that must be unwound by the city before so necessary an institution as the Broadway bridge can actually be commenced.

Many people think the Broadway bridge is to be of the ordinary draw-bridge type similar to the Morrison and Burnside bridges. This is not true. It is to be of the bascule or jack-knife type. The ends of the long 250 foot span rest on piers and run on trunnions. When a boat whistles for passage the span opens in the center, each section being swung upward. In this way a vessel, no matter what its height, gets clearance that reaches to the sky. In this respect the Broadway bridge will differ from the Madison bridge, where the span is operated by a lift and is raised between towers. There is always the likelihood, with this type of bridge that sailing vessels will not be able to get through without shortening their masts. The Broadway bridge is at the same time to be made so high that ordinary steam vessels will be able to pass underneath the span. It will only be necessary to open for sailing vessels.

The delay in building the Broadway bridge is in sharp contrast to the haste with which work on the C. R. & N. company's new steel bridge is proceeding. Crews of experts are working night and day on the piers. The solid cement pier on which the end of the bridge is to rest on the east side has been completed for some time. Work is going on at all points at once, so that the river is nearly blocked.

The 300 marching members of the Cloak, Skirt and Suit Makers' union were stopped by the police near the club and Inspector McCluskey ordered them to disperse.

"Laurier had a right to eat the crumbs falling from a rich man's table," cried Samuel Rosenthal, the strikers' leader. "Why should the rich object to our eating our own crumbs at their gate? Here we are seeking work to buy our own crumbs."

The appearance of their leader enthused the marchers and he was wildly cheered. They refused to break up and the inspector ordered patrol wagons brought out.

"Let them come!" yelled Rosenthal. "They will find us waiting. We will be martyrs to our cause—men and women."

Then he harangued the crowd, in which were many women. Before the patrol wagons arrived many of the women became frightened and left. Eleven remained, however, and were taken to jail with the men.

Each of the prisoners was fined \$2, and as none was able to pay all were remanded to jail. Magistrate Houser rejected Attorney Levine's plea for leniency.

The prisoners appeared weak from starvation, some of them explaining that they had eaten nothing for 24 hours. Before arraignment 71 men were confined in a room measuring 12 by 14 feet for six hours. Many fainted as a result of breathing the foul air.

PEBBLES SHOT BY AUTO TIRES SHATTER MANY PLATE GLASS WINDOWS

An explanation of the mysterious destruction of plate glass windows in Portland is advanced by Donald G. Woodward of 104 Second street, who as agent of a plate glass insurance company, has investigated a large number of cases.

It may be interesting to property owners to know that the breaking of plate glass in Portland is caused in nearly every instance by the shooting of pebble stones by tires of automobiles," said Mr. Woodward today.

"These pebbles have been dropped on the hard pavement from wagons hauling building material about the city."

In one instance an automobile tire shot a pebble through an open door and it was imbedded in a door in the rear of the office. In another instance a pebble was shot from the street striking a pedestrian and inflicting a serious wound. We lost two plate glass windows in one brick building on Burnside street during the past month and have the pebble stones in our office as evidence."

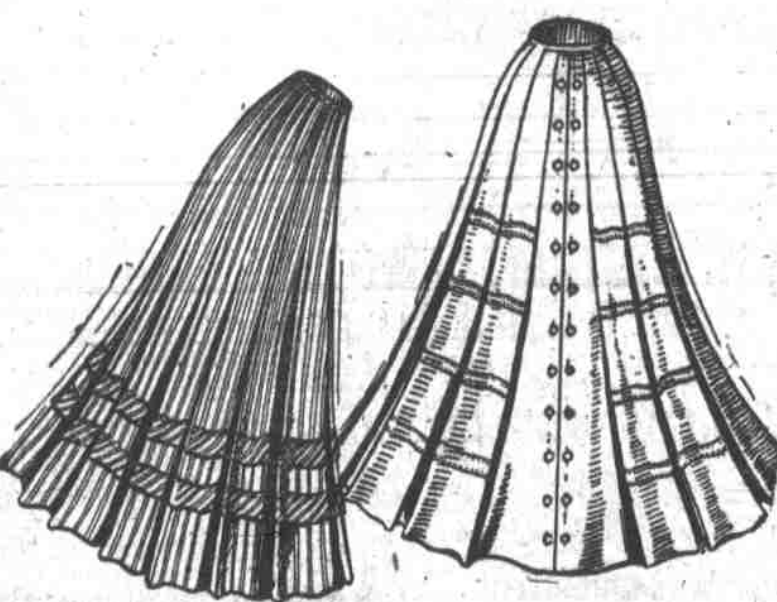
