

BROTHERHOOD OF ST. ANDREW; IT'S ORIGIN AND IT'S WORK

A conference of the members of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew on the Pacific coast, will be held in Portland, beginning on Thursday next and continuing until Sunday evening, September 11. It is expected that over 300 men from outside the city will attend and will participate in the program.

The name, the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, seems to suggest that it is a fraternal order of Scotchmen. In point of fact it is a society strictly American in origin and designed to fulfill a religious purpose. The Brotherhood of St. Andrew is a society of laymen within the Episcopal church which has for its sole object "the extension of Christ's kingdom among men, especially young men." Any male adult, who is baptized, is eligible for membership. All members are bound by two simple rules, the rule of prayer and the rule of service.

The first one requires all members to pray daily for the spread of Christ's kingdom among men, especially young men, and for God's blessing on the labors of the brotherhood.

The second obliges them to make at least one earnest effort each week to lead some man nearer to Christ through his church.

An Aid to the Clergy.
The brotherhood is intended to be an auxiliary to the parochial clergy in their work. Although the brotherhood is entirely a laymen's society, and has no power of jurisdiction, it is content to carry on its operations only where the clergy desire it and only so long as their consent continues. A man, to be a member of the brotherhood, must join himself to a "chapter," as the small local lodges are called, and a chapter must be in affiliation with some parish and mission, and must enjoy the pastor's approval before it can begin work.

In connection with the Brotherhood of St. Andrew is an organization of laymen known as the Junior Brotherhood, which is organized on similar lines, but endeavors to extend the kingdom of Christ among boys.

The Brotherhood of St. Andrew is always known by its badge, which is a burnus bearing a simple St. Andrew's cross, printed in red upon a black background. The society professes St. Andrew as its patron saint, and November 30, which is the day dedicated to St. Andrew in the church calendar, is always one which is observed in brotherhood circles.

The reason this saint was chosen as his patron, is to be found in the incident recorded in St. John 1:44-45, where we read that Andrew, having himself found Christ, "findeth first his own brother Simon and saith unto him, 'We have found the Messiah' and he brought him unto Jesus." Brotherhood men aspire not only to have St. Andrew's conviction, but also to imitate his generous example.

The Brotherhood's Origin.
The brotherhood was started in connection with a Bible class at St. James Episcopal church, Chicago. That was in the year 1882. Twelve young men, under the leadership of Mr. James L. Houghtaling, banded themselves together to work and pray for the extension of the kingdom. It was only three weeks ago that Mr. Houghtaling died. In the 27 years intervening Mr. Houghtaling saw this movement grow until it filled the whole Episcopal church and thence spread into Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Great Britain, South Africa and in fact to all parts of the Anglican communion. The brotherhood in the United States has grown to such proportions that large offices situated in Boston are necessary for the general administration and several secretaries are constantly traveling from place to place to superintend the work which individual chapters are doing. National organizations of the brotherhood exist in Canada, England, Scotland, Japan and the West Indies, and the movement is ever growing. The brotherhood hopes ultimately to have a chapter in every parish, mission school and college in the country.

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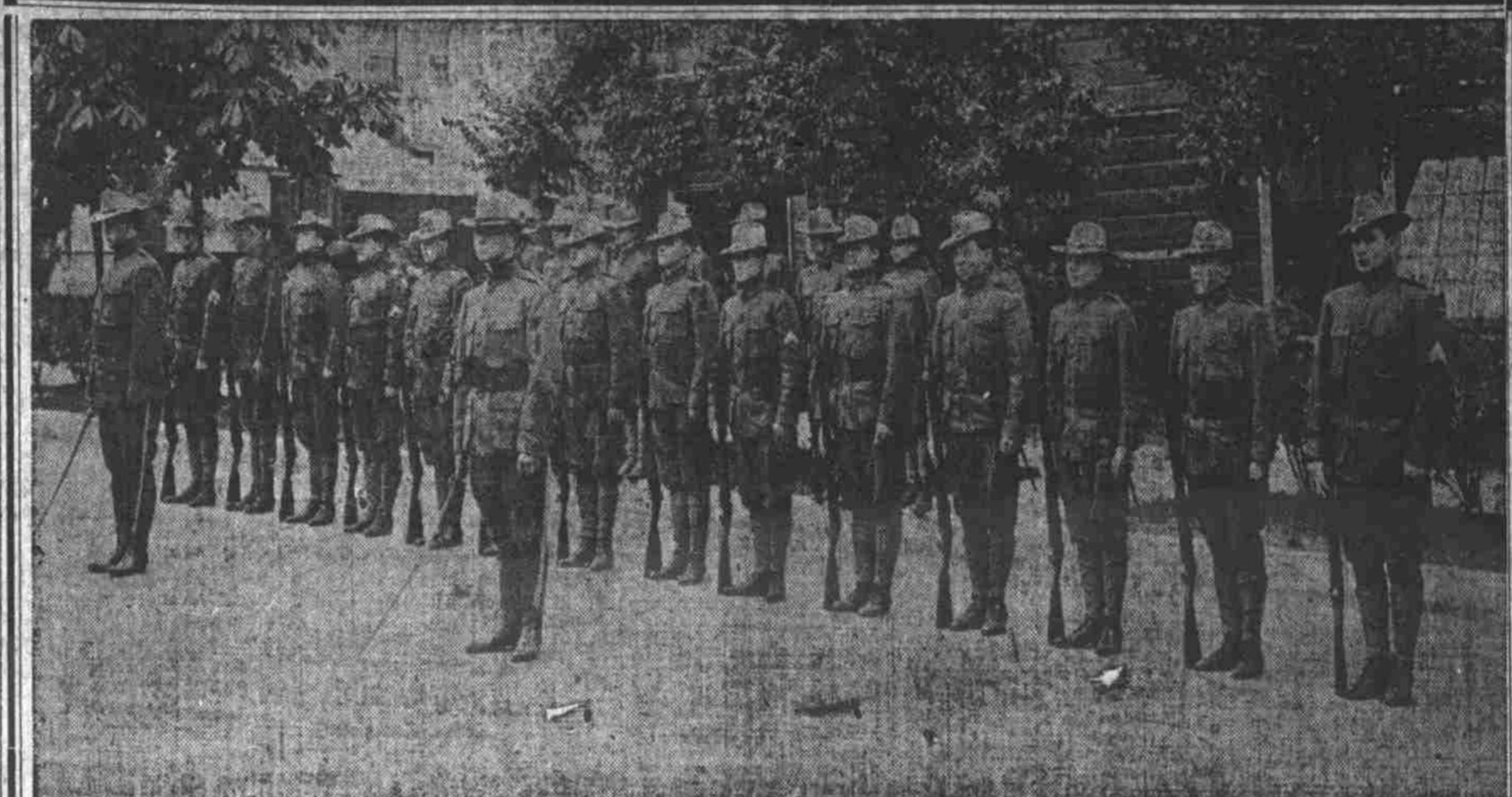
Circuit Court Summons Large Venire for September Service.
