

BETTER CONDITIONS ON DAIRY FARMS FOLLOW CRUSADE

State Veterinarian Says Journal Wields Great Influence in Fight for Pure Milk for Portland; 7000 Cows Tested

"Fifty modern, airy dairy barns built; 200 dairy barns rebuilt, remodeled or repaired; 20 sanitary milk houses constructed and in use; 7000 cows that supply milk for Portland proven by test free from tuberculosis; the quality of milk sold in Portland improved fully 150 per cent—these, approximately," said Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, yesterday, "are the direct and tangible results of The Journal's pure milk crusade."

"A bigger and more important service to the people of Portland was never rendered. A greater safeguard to public health was never provided. This has been done within a year. It is an improvement made after nearly 12 years of office holding by Dairy Commissioner J. W. Bailey who has witnessed conditions growing gradually worse both for dairymen and milk users. Publicity, such as given by The Journal, is a more powerful agent of correction for unsanitary conditions than all the officials put together. It has created a sentiment for better conditions that has tremendously aided those officials who earnestly desire that conditions be improved."

Work Just Beginning.
"Great betterment is yet to be secured. The work is just beginning. But the old saying that 'well begun is half done' was never more apt than in the present instance. The people formerly did not know where they could get good milk. In point of fact there was none to be had. Now, through publicity given the matter, they know where to get pure milk, and what supplies to avoid. Such knowledge saves lives."

"The dairymen have commenced to learn the danger of disease, the relation of disease to unsanitary conditions, and the way in which their own pockets are robbed by permitting evil conditions to continue. Such knowledge is a commercial asset."

"Dr. Lytle has been giving much time and attention to the Portland situation during the past year. He has impressed himself upon dairymen and others who witnessed his work as a man who understands his business, a man who is an enthusiast for practically improved conditions."

His statement was confirmed by Dr. Herbert Silverwood, who, with Dr. W. Mack, has been making tests for tuberculosis among dairy herds in the vicinity of Portland, and who, consequently has not only been a witness, but an active agent, in the progressive betterment of which Dr. Lytle spoke.

Model Dairy Barn.
The two officials visited yesterday in company with a Journal reporter, the new dairy barn near Boring on the O. & W. P. line, which is just being com-

pleted by R. L. Sabin, a Portland business man. The barn is the most advanced type of approved barns in Multnomah county. Its cost has been about \$3000, but in outside appearance differs little from the old style barn. Its dimensions are 50x30 feet and it is provided with 800 square feet of window glass. It has, in addition, a complete ventilating system. Air shafts distribute pure air from outdoors equally throughout the area reserved for the cows' stalls. Other shafts carry away the impure air.

"The interior is as airy and light as out-doors and there are no drafts. Not an available inch of space is lost. Feed is to be stored above. The roof is so constructed that hay can be piled to the eaves. A winter's feed for the herd can be stored away. There are feed shafts leading from above to convenient places so that the work of caring for the cows is reduced to a minimum."

Arrangement Best of all.
The cows stand on a solid wooden floor. The gutters are cement; so is the section of the floor between the walls and the gutters. The stanchions are of metal so strong that the cow is not made uncomfortable. Although many up to date barns have been built since the agitation for a cleaner milk supply commenced, Mr. Sabin's is the best of them all.

"It is with me, a business proposition, pure and simple," said Mr. Sabin today. "I believe the cow is entitled to the best shelter that can be provided for her. In return she will produce milk to a greater profit. I learned that from my father. All my cows have been tested for tuberculosis and they are healthy. They will remain healthy in the kind of barn I am building and I will make money by the investment. There is a kind of satisfaction, too, in having the barn built right."

The structure being finished by Mr. Sabin is in strong contrast to others in the vicinity.

Although the London Radium Institute is to be opened in October, the management has been unable to obtain the five and one quarter grammes of radium which it needs for its therapeutic work.
