

ALBERTA VOTERS HEAR SPEAKERS RAP ASSEMBLY

Immense Crowd Turns Out to Their First Large Meeting of Campaign; Attorney Logan Denounces Machine Politics.

The campaign against the assembly was carried into Alberta yesterday evening by a large and enthusiastic meeting in Baker's hall, Seventeenth and Alberta. Judge E. T. Cleaton of the county court, John F. Logan and Seneca Fouts were the speakers of the evening. Many from the business district went out to hear the issues of the campaign discussed, and the representative voters of Alberta and surrounding territory gathered in their first big meeting.

Judge Cleaton was the first speaker on the program. He was introduced by the chairman as the "man who closed the draw bridges." A warm greeting from the east side was given him. Launching into the issues, Judge Cleaton went over the duties and features of the county court. He showed the large amount of business and the importance of having it done in a systematic and business-like way. It was upon this theory of dispatching business that he contended the county would grow correspondingly. Much emphasis was placed upon the good roads movement taken up by the county court, which is composed of the county judge and county commissioners. Judge Cleaton gave credit in a large measure to his predecessors for the work they have done in this line.

Oregon Watches Court.
He said they had not built many roads, but they had started and done what they could under great obstacles, and they deserved high credit for their efforts. He referred to them as "trail blazers," and said the county would never forget them.

"The eyes of Oregon are upon the county court for the work outlined in road building," said the judge. We have many barriers against the work, and many of these obstacles are in the way of other western states. We are going to solve them. Other states are waiting to follow. We want to build the roads as good and with as little expense as possible. Good roads throughout Multnomah county mean highways of industry to Portland. Such thoroughfares into Portland mean much to every person in the city. It means business, industry and advancement. This road building must be done by a sturdy and persistent progress."

When the subject of draw bridge closing was taken up by Judge Cleaton, he was warmly applauded, and it is close to the hearts of the east side people.

Found Two Cities.
When he came to Portland 19 years ago, he said, he found two cities—an East and West Portland. There were bridges over the river, but the river men had so warped the course of using them that every one had to wait when the boats wished to run up or down the stream. As bridges were erected the east side began to grow. Now it is the great residence district, he said, and until recently the people on that side of the river had nothing to say about regulating the draws. The judge explained how the county court brought the matter to an issue, and enforced closed draws during the rush hours. He said the river men have filed 17 complaints with the United States authorities, and that they are waiting until election to see what course to take in prosecuting them.

With the present management the complaints will remain dormant, but the only hope the river men have of getting back to the old regime is to defeat Judge Cleaton and other members of the court who have forced closed bridges.

"It is up to the people," said Judge Cleaton. "If they stand by the county court the court will stand by their stand on the draw bridges. It will all be determined by the vote on November 24."

Attorney John Logan took up the assembly movement and carefully analyzed many of its features. He brought out that until a few years ago politics was a science and politicians were the tools of heavy corporation interests. He declared that the people are throwing off this yoke and now endeavor to run politics. The local assembly movement contains the same old crowd of fighters for boss rule and machine politics that are being defeated all over the country by the wing of insurgency, said Attorney Logan.

for the assembly, for it hard and strong. Why? Because "there's a reason." Mr. Fenton told them that he has not been around legislators for the past nine years. This takes us back to the time in Salem, where there were not enough railroad tracks to hold the private cars of big corporation men who were there to use their fine hand in shaping legislation. Attorney Logan made an appeal for all voters to stand by the anti-assembly ticket from top to bottom. He declared it was the last stand and hold of the old gang, and that they were tottering. Mention was made of the office of County Clerk Fields. Logan said that the assembly members are working their heads off against Fields.

"Fields is one of the best officers Multnomah county has ever had," said the speaker. "I have seen him at the courthouse early and late. He has been kind and courteous to the old soldiers who receive their vouchers in his office, and especially has he been a friend to the poor who have applied to him. His office has been placed on a good business basis. His books show this is the best the county has ever had."

Attorney Seneca Fouts went into the origin of the assembly. He said Charlie Lockwood had a dream one day about the assembly movement.

"While Lockwood is an attorney admitted to the bar, you never see him around the courts," said the speaker. "But you always see him around the councils and legislative bodies. He lives well, has money and appears to be a good fellow. He dreamed of the assembly, and the little criteria of men who met in Fenton's office July 6 kindly took his dream. They fixed up the assembly slate and are trying to put it through."

The speaker warned the voters to beware of an attempt to divide them a few days before election by floating a ticket upon which would be printed the assembly members for the legislature. He urged all to register.

Attorney Frank Hennessy sang "Cleaton, He's the Man," and Mrs. Fred Olson sang two selections.
