

WOULD LIVE HERE IF PERMIT GRANTED

**License Committee Increases
Population by Promising
Dancing Privilege.**

While a request for a roller skating license was held up yesterday afternoon by the license committee of the city council, another request for a dancing license was handled with quickness and dispatch. The committee is composed of Councilmen Driscoll, Dunning and Conannon.

Ryder & Harding applied for a permit to give dances at East Thirty-first and Hawthorne avenues. Both men told the committee they were strangers in Portland, that if a dancing permit were given them they would make this their future home. The committee assured the two men they would be able to get a permit after the council meeting Wednesday morning.

Two young men giving the name of Griffin and Young asked the committee to allow them to conduct a roller skating rink at East Fifty-eighth and Foster roads. They said they had been here more than one year, and considered Portland their home. The matter was finally referred to Councilman Rushlight, in whose ward the men live.

J. C. Cranwell, proprietor of an auction store at 74 North Sixth street, whose place has been called a fake auction shop by the police, was warned to conduct a better place in the future. He was summoned to appear and show cause why his license should not be revoked. Evidence shows he has had number of "cappers" and hired hiders around his place, and that his auctioneers prey upon innocent men who come into his place.

WILL DISCUSS PLANS FOR BETTER HIGHWAYS

The Oregon Good Roads association headquarters, sixth floor of the Beck building, citizens who desire that Oregon shall possess a complete system of good roads will discuss, at 8 o'clock tonight, plans for securing adoption of an amendment to the state constitution which shall have the effect of removing the present constitutional limitation which prevents counties from building roads even when the voters so desire.

The meeting, it is accounted, will be of the greatest importance, and a large attendance, both of subscribers to the Oregon Good Roads association and of citizens who are interested in the success of the present state-wide good roads campaign, is being arranged for. The feature of the session will be an address by Professor H. M. Parks of Oregon Agricultural college. Professor Parks has been making a geological survey of

COLLAPSE OF PILE DRIVER KILLS ONE

Castroville, Wash., Sept. 13.—The piledriver used in erecting the approach to the bridge which is being built here collapsed yesterday morning while being moved up the approach, and lies a mass of splintered timbers. Several men were also broken down like they were pinsteems. One workman, Joe Walden, a heavy-setter, was thrown some distance and alighted on his head, sustaining injuries from which he will probably die. All the other men escaped without serious injuries, though several had close calls. It is feared the accident will delay construction of the bridge until too late to get it finished this year. It is said the accident was caused by a "hog rod" slipping from the top of the post which held it up.

Chilean-Centennial Celebration.
Santiago, Chile, Sept. 13.—The Chilean centennial celebration is now at its height. Throughout the length of the republic cities and towns are en fête for the occasion. The more elaborate exercises are being conducted in this city, the capital, and in Valparaiso, where warships representing the navies of the United States, Great Britain and other nations are assembled to take part in the festivities.

The occasion of the national rejoicing is the centenary of the independence of Chile. Originally, and for a long time Chile was under the dominion of the Incas of Peru, though it was not held without difficulty. Then it became a Spanish province and finally declared its independence of Spain in September, 1810, not actually winning it, however, until several years later.

New Lodge for Dayton.
Dayton, Or., Sept. 13.—A lodge of the Modern Woodmen of America was organized at this place in Hibbert's hall Saturday evening by Deputy Head Consul H. J. Atlee of Banks, Or. The camp starts out with 21 charter members and 20 old members who will transfer from other camps. The work was put on by the Newberg camp team and several visitors from other camps were present. The camp will be known as Dayton camp, No. 9373.

Local Fire Insurance Agents.
Chicago, Sept. 13.—The fifteenth annual convention of the National Association of Local Fire Insurance Agents opened in Chicago yesterday and will continue until Thursday. The initial session was held this afternoon and was devoted chiefly to the reports of officers and committees. Expense reduction and the resulting reduction in rates are the leading problems to be considered at the succeeding sessions of the convention. State rating laws, uniform blanks, and qualifications for agency appointments are among other matters that will receive attention.

CITY HAS NEW BACTERIOLOGIST

**Dr. Pernot Succeeds Dr. R. C.
Matson, Who Resigned Be-
cause of Business.**

Professor Emile F. Pernot, leading bacteriologist of the west, has succeeded Dr. Ralph C. Matson as bacteriologist to the state board of health. The laboratory was moved yesterday to the offices of Dr. Calvin S. White, the state health officer. The removal of his practice and press of business compelled Dr. Matson's resignation after successful and effective work for the state health board extending over several years.

"I have a purpose in this work that I have taken up," said Professor Pernot yesterday. "It is to make this laboratory mean much in the way of protection to Oregon people against consumption, typhoid fever and other diseases, and to emphasize the necessity for pure water and pure milk, that disease may be kept away from the people."

"More is done now in Oregon to protect the health of hope than of the people. Yet humanity should come first. People are only healthy when their surroundings are sanitary and wholesome environment means health to all. It will be noted that the discoveries which aid us in our fight against diseases are laboratory discoveries. In the laboratory man has learned how to become master of the destroying germ and to set against it the beneficent germ that

destroys the disease organism. This kind of work is tremendously important, and the appropriations for its carrying on should be great enough to permit the fullest usefulness."

Professor Pernot recently established the Portland bacteriological laboratory in the Medical building. He has previously held noteworthy connection with Oregon Agricultural college. Before locating in Portland he visited the great laboratories of all eastern cities, "modernizing" as he terms it. With his own great experience and the \$3000 laboratory of the state board of health, it is believed that more effective work will be done than ever before has been possible.

At the Hague conference a year ago Professor Pernot was credited with the discovery that tuberculosis actually exists among poultry. Before it had been vaguely known. He has received national recognition for the exceptional quality of his work.

MOTIVE FOR MURDER AND SUICIDE UNKNOWN

Ukiah, Cal., Sept. 13.—Mrs. Jessie Browning and her slayer, Ed Robinson, victims of the murder and suicide of Saturday, were buried here yesterday. Although a perfunctory investigation of the case has been made, the real motive behind the tragedy is not known, and it is probable that the authorities will not investigate further.

Mrs. Browning was shot and killed by Robinson in her own home. There were no witnesses to the shooting. Robinson was a friend of Mrs. Browning's husband and was a frequent caller at the Browning home, according to neighbors. Whether the shooting was the result of a quarrel or of the infatuation of the man for the woman is not known. From appearances when the body was found, Mrs. Browning evidently had been trying to escape from the house when Robinson killed her. He shot himself with the same weapon with which he had ended her life.
