Chinatown Guide in Trouble.—Julius Kinspel, a Chinatown guide, took upon himself one of the functions of a police officer early this morning and invaded a saloon at Sixth and Stark streets while Ben Brown and Frank White were counting the cash. He ordered the men to close the place and when told to get out attacked Brown with a blackjack. Sergeant Wanless heard the commotion and placed Kinspel under arrest. The latter wears a special officer's star and on the way to police headquarters he attempted to conceal it. It is probable that he will be deprived of his commission. He will be given a hearing on a charge of intoxication tomorrow.

Baker City's Record.—M. Moessohn, assistant secretary of the chamber of commerce, returned from Baker City yesterday, with the report that the First National bank of Baker City stands sixth in the United States in the amount of surplus profits earned by the national banks in the United States during the past year. The bank is capitalized at \$75,000. Mr. Moessohn arranged with the Baker City Commercial club to have Baker county enter a display in the permanent exhibit of the Portland chamber of commerce. Mr. Moessohn also reports Baker City doing a lot of street paving this year.

New Examinations.—Announcement is made that the United States civil service commission will hold examinations in Portland, October 15 and 16 to select eligibles for various positions in the federal service. October 15 applicants for appointment as foreman with the mine rescue training stations will be examined. October 16 the following examinations will be held: Chemist, engineer and chemical engineer in the forest products laboratory at Madison, Wis.; tariff assistant in the bureau of manufactures, department of commerce and labor.

Decides Vacation Question.—In an opinion rendered this morning by City Attorney Grant, it is held that if a city employee does not take the 15 days' vacation this year, the vacation is lost. That is, a vacation cannot be ignored this year in the hope of taking double time next year. Superintendent Mische of the park department asked the city attorney for light on this question, as some of the park employees wished to pass up a vacation this year for more time next year. The gist of the city attorney's opinion is that this would cripple office work.

To Establish Claim.—Margaret T. Raleigh, widow of John Raleigh, has begun proceedings in the county court to establish her claim to dower in the west half of lots 7 and 8, block 253, city of Portland. The property was sold for debt during the lifetime of Raleigh and the title is now held by Mrs. Dell Stewart. Mrs. Stewart says she did not join in the conveyance and has never lost her dower interest. She married Raleigh in 1875, and his estate was thrown under guardianship because of insanity some time before he died.

Notice of Appeal.—Notice of appeal to the supreme court of the state has been filed by the Patton home in the suit brought against it by David Louth, in which a decision by Circuit Judge Grant favored Louth. The court set aside the decree of certain property by Mrs. Rebecca Peiffer to the home prior to her death, finding there had been no delivery of the deed, and declared the property subject to appeal. A similar notice of appeal has been filed by Carl Goldenberg, involving other land decided in the same manner.

Linnton's Election.—Linnton took advantage of the state initiative law yesterday to hold an election for the purpose of incorporating the town. There was a friendly contest between the 108 voters, the incorporators winning out by a vote of 65 to 43. J. R. Schaefer was elected mayor; other officers elected are as follows: Treasurer, S. M. Mann; recorder, Samuel Goodwin; marshal, J. B. Anderson; councilmen, E. T. Bancroft, Louis Shelk, B. T. Carlson, W. F. Harris, A. A. Carter, J. F. Miller.

Meloe in Saloon.—Beer bottles and glasses were hurled in a combat in a saloon at Sixth and Couch streets last night, and when Patrolman Oelsen entered the place the floor was strewn with shattered glass, while Howard Garner, a bartender; William Wade and John Stewart, railroad employees, were nursing various cuts. All were placed under arrest and fined \$10 each by Municipal Judge Bennett this morning.

University Opens.—Columbia university opened its fall semester yesterday with a large registration. Father Joseph Gallagher, president of the university, looks for a greatly increased growth this year. No new instructors have been secured with the exception of W. C. Schmitt of Notre Dame, the new football coach. Mr. Schmitt will also be employed as an instructor in mathematics.

New York State Society.—The New York State society of Oregon will meet this evening in the parlors of the Glenora hotel, Nineteenth street, between Washington and Couch. Madame d'Aurie has arranged a very enjoyable program of musical numbers, and as usual, light refreshments will be served. Several important propositions will be brought before the business meeting.

DIRECT PRIMARIES
DEFEAT OLD BOSSES
IN NEW HAMPSHIRE

From the New York Post. Commenting on the New Hampshire Primary Election.

"No result of the elections held yesterday is matter for more congratulation than the decisive victory of State Senator Bass as a Republican candidate for governor in the New Hampshire primaries. To talk of the contest in New Hampshire as a fight between conservatives and progressives is to give a very misleading impression of the struggle. It is true, of course, that the fight in one aspect, formed part of the war that is going on all along the line between 'insurgents' and 'regulars'; but in New Hampshire, more than in perhaps any other state, the question really at issue was whether the people would support a corrupt political organization, the servant of a debasing railroad corporation, or would register their verdict for an able, honest and fearless candidate representing the cause of a vitally necessary reform. The result was a crushing defeat for the ring, the vote being about two to one in favor of Bass. And, of the direct primary as an instrument of sound government, two men of national prominence, the great political skill—Senator Gallinger and ex-Senator Chandler—though one was on the Bass side and the other against him, were defeated as candidates for delegate to the state convention. Is it any wonder that the Woodruffs and the Barnests are 'fond of the direct primary idea'?"

Home.

"September 17—Tag day—Baby home." The Juniors met yesterday. The Seniors will meet at headquarters, Park and Morrison streets, Thursday at 2:30 p. m. They are making final plans to insure success for Tag day.

As now arranged the babies from the home will parade the business part of the city in automobiles at 10 o'clock on the morning of September 17. The parade will be in charge of Mrs. John Peters and Mrs. Charles Schmechel and will be an exceedingly attractive feature of the day. The young women who are members of the Junior and Senior auxiliaries of the Baby home will sell tags. They will be assisted by volunteers. The services of as many as care to help are solicited by Mrs. D. C. Burns, president of the Baby home.

"We are getting along splendidly in our plans," said Mrs. Burns this morning. "We anticipate the most complete success for the day. We believe that we are working in a good cause and our friends believe it, too. Our friends apparently are all the people of Portland. We want all the help we can get. At headquarters, Park and Morrison, many of our most prominent women are working, stringing the 15,000 tags that we hope to sell. More help in this and many other ways will be gratefully accepted if the volunteers will either call at headquarters or telephone Marshall 2810. The services of 500 or more women to act as chaperons for the tag sellers will be required and for this service we should like to have volunteers. All who sell tags will be young women. There will be no boys."
