CITY WILL COMPEL RAILWAYS TO PAY OLD LICENSE FEES

Representatives of Corporations Have Ignored Notices to Pay Up Arrears; May Have to Sue to Collect.

City Auditor A. L. Barbur this morning notified City Attorney F. S. Grant to file complaints against the Southern Pacific, Oregon Railroad & Navigation company, Northern Pacific, Astoria & Columbia River, and North Bank railroads for failure of the companies to comply with municipal license laws...

Ordinance No. 11,784, passed in 1900, provides that the city treasury for business done exclusively within the city a license fee of \$75 per quarter.

The railroads have never paid any license in the ten years during which the law has been in effect. The violation of the law was called to the attention of former City Attorney J. P. Kavanaugh more than a year ago, and before resigning the office that official turned the matter over to Deputy City Attorney Tomlinson.

The city auditor again brought the matter before Mr. Grant upon his resignation to the office of city attorney this year. Mr. Grant submitted an opinion in which he held that the railroad companies are liable to pay the license fee prescribed by municipal ordinance.

The total amount of license fees to be collected by the cities is in the neighborhood of \$12,000.

City Attorney Grant this morning deplored the fact that the legal departments of the railroads concerned, in an effort to arrive at an amicable adjustment.

BODY OF BOY BURIED IN WOODS BY FRIENDS

Resident of Crescent, Or., Sept. 21.—In charge of two shepherders the body of Arthur Huston, aged 13, son of J. C. Huston of Prineville, was held in the woods a week in a vain effort to secure the attendance of the parents at the funeral.

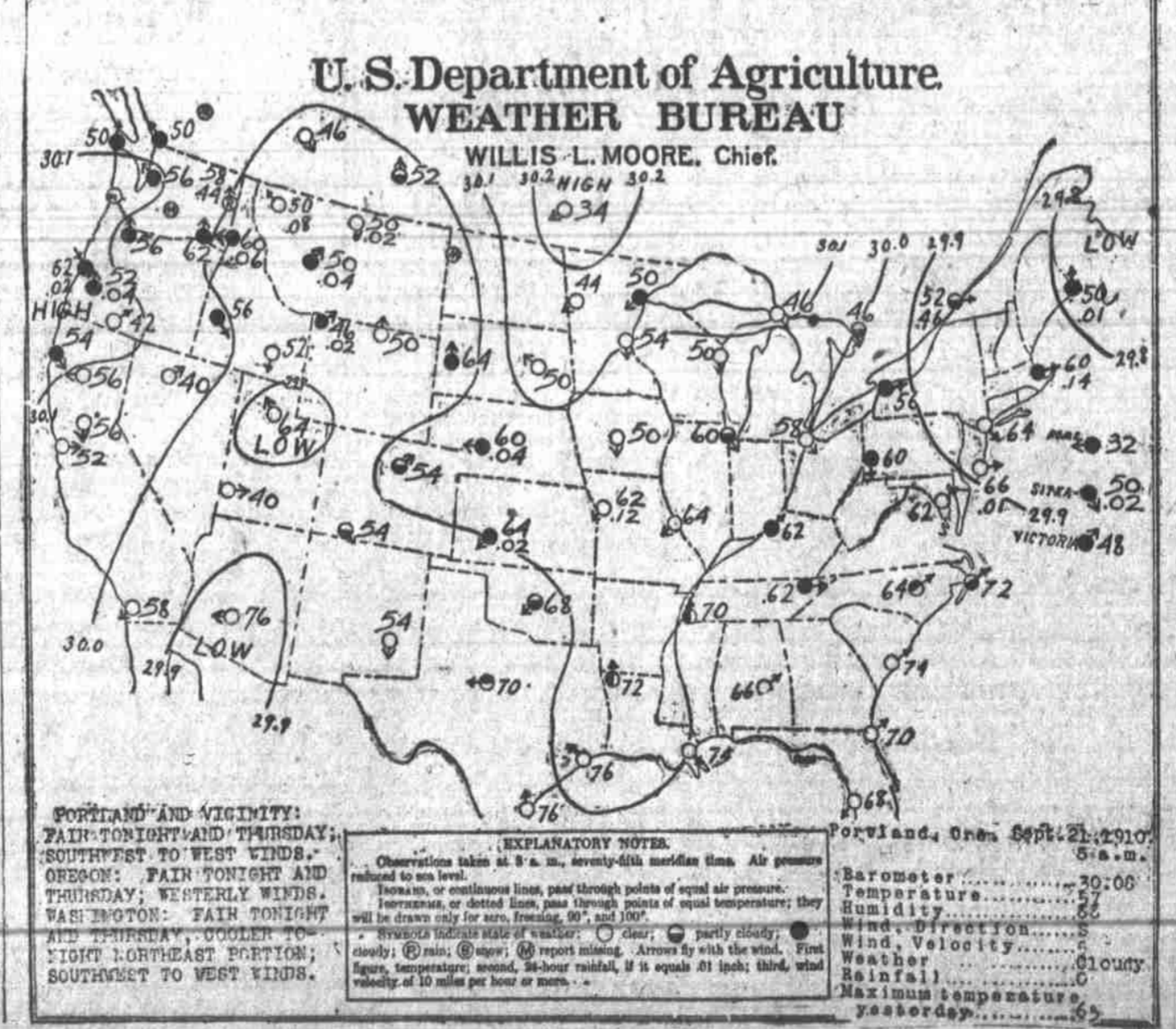
