WIND BLOWS 35

However, Little Damage Is Reported; Reached Velocity of 72 Miles at North Head.

Although a maximum of only 35 miles hour was reached by the wind storm which accompanied the rain last night, its howling and the lashing of the rain on windows, gave people the impression

It started to blow about noon yester-

day and gradually increased last night until it reached a maximum velocity of 35 miles from the south at 8:25 o'clock since the rain began on Friday there has been 1.44 inches of precipitation, of September 30.


On the Oregon coast the gale assumed reater proportions. The maximum yeocity of the wind reported from North Head was 72 miles on two occasions, once before 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, when it was blowing from the southwest, and again during the night from the south. At 5 o'clock last evening the weather bureau report from North Head fixed the velocity of the gale at 60 miles from the south, which after reaching a maximum of 72 miles, gradually died down to 10 miles an hour this morning.

Storm warnings were ordered out on the Straits of Fuca yesterday, but the highest velocity reported from Tacoma was 32 miles. Warnings are still being displayed at North Head. A good stiff breeze is now blowing off the coast. Forecaster Drake said this morning that he thought the wind would increase tonight, but would be mostly over tonorrow.

Because of the storm a number of vessele which are dus have been unable to get in, while others are lying at Astoria awaiting an opportunity to get out. A rise of 1.3 inches in the river, due to the rain, is heralded with delight by river men, to whom even that slight rise is a boon, while the prediction is that the river will continue to rise for the next few days. The present stage of the water at Portland is 4.0 feet abova zero.


