Sleep on Floor Costly.—When Joseph Laramie, Albany, Or., applied for a room at a Japanese lodging house at 2224 Everett street last night he was told by a Jap he met in the hall that the house was full, but that he could sleep in the hallway on payment of 50 cents. Laramie accepted the terms and carried up on the floor, but awakened a few hours later to find that \$15 had been stolen from his pockets. He complained to the police, but the proprietor denied seeing Laramie or telling him he could sleep in the hall, and the police formed the conclusion that Laramie had been victimized of 50 cents and then robbed by one of the roomers.

Was Disorderly.—Frank Kelley, a saloonkeeper at Grand avenue and East Morrison street, was convicted of the charge of disorderly conduct by Municipal Judge Tawell yesterday afternoon and fined \$100. The conviction followed a stubborn contest on the part of Kelley to clear himself of the charge and prove that Sergeant Joseph Keller, one of the arresting officers, had been brutal. A large number of witnesses were introduced on both sides, but the preponderance of the evidence showed that Kelley had taken an immense drink, and members of the police force in general, and rarely lost an opportunity to abuse them.

New Positions.—The United States Civil Service commission announces an examination on November 21 and 22, 1910, for the position of forest clerk, (male) at an entrance salary of \$1100 or \$1200 per annum, in the forest service. A knowledge of bookkeeping, stenography, and typewriting is required for this examination, and all qualified persons are urged to apply for and take it. For application blank and full information apply to the commission's local representative at the post office building, this city, or to the secretary of the eleven district offices, district, Federal building, Seattle, Wash.

Injured in Collision.—A C. Phelps, a steno typewriter, was thrown to the floor and badly bruised in a rear end collision between two L cars at Second and Burnside streets at 5:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Phelps was removed to his home at 660 Delany street. Defective brakes are said to have caused the collision. While trying to board a moving car on Burnside street at midnight last night, Karl Cornwell, of 59 Twine avenue slipped and fell under the steps. He was taken to St. Vincent's hospital in Holman's ambulance, suffering from a wrenched back.

Buy Inside Property.—Dr. George Farish, who has invented a large amount in inside holdings during the past 15 months, made another important deal yesterday when he took over a quarter block at the northeast corner of Seventh and Glisan streets. The property is located just across Seventh street from block "S," which it is strongly believed is to be the site of the new postoffice and mailing shed. It was formerly owned by B. Hager and was sold to Dr. Farish by Charles K. Henry company for \$55,000.

Body of Suicide Found.—The body of a suicide who had been dead for about a month was found lying in the woods near Arbor Lodge on the St. Johns the last evening by Paul Henry, 274 Farragut street, and George Davis, 1497 Milburn avenue. A 38-calibre revolver lay beside the body. The remains were removed to the morgue by Deputy Coroner Dunning, where a card was found bearing the name of Alex. Lirky. A letter written in Greek was also found in the clothes.

Keen Receivership Application.—The application of H. W. Smith and Victor Willick for the appointment of a receiver to wind up the affairs of the C. A. Smith Lumber company is being heard today before Judge Wolverson in federal court. Bennett and Willick are one of a number of creditors who desire an adjustment of accounts. C. A. Smith and associates were recently the subject of government prosecution, the charge being fraudulent dealings in government lands. This is a different issue.

Postmasters to Meet.—Arrangements are being made for the entertainment of the presidential postmasters' convention in Portland October 13 and 14. The session will be attended by all postmasters from the first, second and third class postoffices in Oregon. To permit attendance the government gives

a five days' leave of absence. The meetings will probably be held in the convention hall of the Commercial club.

Plans on Exhibition.—Plans and specifications for the excavation of about 75 miles of sub-laterals at the Tieton Unit of the Yakima irrigation project may be seen at the office of the Chamber of Commerce, this city. Sealed proposals for the work will be received at the office of the project engineer, United States Reclamation Service, Fort Yakima, Wash., until 2 p. m. October 20.

Tries to Collect \$150.—Elvira Gray has entered into a suit to collect \$150 from W. F. Minard, the case having been appealed from the justice court, where defendant won the decision. The plaintiff alleges that defendant fraudulently obtained the money by locating her on a government timber claim, misrepresented to her.

Damages of \$1.—A sealed verdict granting the plaintiff in the Daly-Rummel suit the sum of \$1 damages was handed in this morning by the jury. Rose Daly was the plaintiff and Johanna C. Rummel, the defendant. The jury found that the defendant had violated the terms of an agreement by which the plaintiff leased a store-room in the Rummel building, Eighth and Washington streets. The amount of damages sued for was \$5000.

NEW REPUBLICAN COMMITTEE SNUBS STATEMENT NO. 1

(Continued from Page One.)

poss of recommending or nominating candidates for the primary nominating election.

"Resolved, further, That the state central committee is opposed to the use of the party organization for the purpose of assisting in the election of any candidate or candidates at the primary nominating election."

When the Bollen resolution was presented its author spoke in favor of its adoption. He called attention to the vote cast in the primary election as showing that the rank and file of the Republican party desired the unwavering recognition of Statement No. 1 and the definite rejection of the assembly idea.

Committee member Schuebel of Clackamas also supported the Bollen resolution. He said that the great majority of the Republicans of the state had decided for Statement No. 1 and against the assembly and that the official representatives of the party should listen to this decision of the voters and back them up in their directions given at the polls.

For Party Harmony. Schuebel contended that the candidates nominated at the primary election should also heed this instruction of the party and declare their allegiance

to the principles upheld by the majority of the party. This would bring party harmony and party success, he contended. But these arguments did not prevail. The resolution was referred to a committee of three, Hamstreet, Dellinger and Williams, all strong assembly men. That was the last of the resolution.

State Senator C. W. Nottingham was elected state chairman following the adoption of the resolutions. He had been seen earlier in the day by friends of Bowerman and asked if he would accept the position if it were given to him. He assured the delegation that he would and when telephoned to after his election in the afternoon came at once and assumed the chair.

Chairman Nottingham was authorized to appoint a committee of five to draft rules and regulations for the conduct of the campaign, and to appoint a secretary. He has not yet decided upon either the committee selections or the secretary, though some three or four men are being considered for the latter position. Chairman Nottingham

said this morning that he did not intend to make the selection of the secretary until after he had a conference with Bowerman.

Those who were present at the meeting of the committee yesterday afternoon were: J. N. Hart, of Baker; George Cochran, of Union; W. J. Purish, of Portland, holding a proxy for Umattila; John W. Cochran, Bowerman's campaign manager, holding a proxy from Gilliam; W. W. Steiwer, of Wheelar; E. V. Littlefield, secretary of the old committee, holding a proxy from Sherman; S. E. Watts, of Columbia; J. S. Dellinger, of Clatsop; Frank Bollen, of Multnomah; Chris Schuebel, of Clackamas; L. Hamstreet, of Yamhill; John M. Williams, of Lane; Ralph E. Williams, of Polk; E. Hough, of Josephine, and Phil Matschan Jr., of Portland, holding a proxy from Harney county.
