

SPOKANE ENTERS MANY HORSES

Andrew Laidlaw's Stable to Be Well Represented at Coming Horse Show.

Andrew Laidlaw, the well known horse fancier of Spokane, Wash., has made the largest number of entries of any competitor in the fourth annual horse show, which will open in this city next Thursday. His splendid string of high steppers are entered in 50 different classes, and among the list are many blue ribbon winners. He will arrive in this city Saturday with his horses and on each day before the opening performance the animals will be given a thorough workout.

The next largest list of entries has been made by J. A. Russell of Vancouver, B. C. His horses will compete for prizes in 40 different classes, and in a number of instances his animals will compete for honors with those from the Laidlaw stables. Third on the list is the Riverside Driving farm of Seattle with 39 entries. In this stable are many splendid riding and harness horses.

Mrs. F. W. Leadbetter has made the largest number of entries of any contestant in Portland. Her horses are entered in 25 classes. Miss Georgina Leadbetter, of this city, has 11 entries. Henry L. Corbett is second among Portlanders in the number of entries. His animals will compete for 12 prizes. The two new horses which he recently purchased in New York arrived in this city today. Good judges of horses say they look like prize winners. They are a bay mare known as "Daundless," and a bay gelding known by the name of "Monarch." Both have been entered in the riding and light driving classes.

L. S. Howe, president of the Vancouver, B. C. Hunt club, has entered one of the finest strings of horses on the coast. Accompanying him will be several members of the Hunt club of which he is president, with their horses. These animals recently carried off scores of prizes in the recent horse show in that city and they are coming to Portland confident that they will win many blue ribbons. From Portland they go to Pasadena, Cal., to compete for prizes in the horse show to be held in that city.

Among others who have entered a number of horses are D. C. McGregor of Vancouver, B. C., who sent in five ad-

ditional entries yesterday; Mrs. James Nicol of Hillsdale; the Kramer Riding school and the East Portland Riding school. The latter two institutions have made 21 and 16 entries, respectively.

PRUNES BRING OWNERS ABOUT \$250 AN ACRE

Lebanon, Or., Oct. 7.—Last Saturday was "prune day" for Lebanon, when Tillson & Co. of Salem received and paid for the prune crop from the following growers of this vicinity: Jos. Stewart & Son, 49,213 pounds; W. A. Bartley, 22,000 pounds; J. Q. Blacklaw, 22,365 pounds; D. F. Sturtevant, 11,851 pounds; Peter Lewis, 2103 pounds; G. W. Spaulding, 1438 pounds. Making a total of 118,095 pounds, or about five carloads. The growers were paid about 6 cents per pound, which would make the nice little sum of about \$6984.14. This makes an average of about \$250 per acre for the number of acres in prunes. Taking in consideration that this prune land was all bought for considerably less than \$100 per acre before the prune trees were set out, makes very cheap orchard land. The above named farmers are not all that sold prunes around here, as a good many raisers hauled their crop to Albany and sold to the Albany packers.

LANDING OF FIRST GERMANS RECALLED

Under the auspices of the associated German speaking societies of the state a meeting of more than 1000 Germans was held in Arion hall last night to commemorate the landing of the first organized band of German people in America. The speakers of the evening were Rev. C. Hopf of Salem, Rabbi Jonah B. Wise and Father Hildebrand of Portland.

Mr. Hopf told of the history of the first German settlement of Germans at Germantown, Pa., related the conditions which caused these people to emigrate to America and urged continued reverence for the fatherland.

He paid a high tribute to the American citizenship of the German people coming to the United States and encouraged the idea of the German speaking portion of the American citizenship banding together for higher social and civic betterment. Twelve sand boxes are being made by the street cleaning department to be placed at different points throughout the city, where horses slip on hard-surface pavements. The county court has agreed to place sand boxes on the steep approaches to the bridges, and the large transfer companies have promised to place small sand boxes on their wagons. This is the work of the Oregon Humane society. The experiment of sanding slippery pavements has proven the best method of protecting the horses at such points. B. J. Wood, secretary of the society, has been working on this question for some time. The street department will make the boxes, which will have a capacity of one quarter. This department will also keep them filled. The county court will take care of those on the bridges.

PIONEER OF '63 DIES AT EUGENE, AGED 65

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., Oct. 7.—Alexander Patterson, a pioneer butcher of Eugene, was buried in the L. O. O. F. cemetery today, he having died at his home in this city yesterday at the age of 64 years, 11 months and 9 days. He was born at Mt. Vernon, Ind., in 1845, and came to Oregon by way of the Isthmus of Panama in 1862. He was married in 1867 to Miss Iphigenia Henderson, daughter of J. H. D. Henderson, congressman from Oregon at that time. He became engaged in the butcher business in Eugene shortly after his arrival here and continued in the same until his death, although he was unable to personally direct the business for several months previous to his death. He leaves two daughters, Mrs. A. L. Stewart and Mrs. E. Bean, both of Eugene, and Elvira Patterson, of Klamath Falls, besides his widow.

HOOD HOODWINKED BY SEWER CONTRACTORS?

R. A. Copple, candidate for joint representative, spent \$11.15.
