Shipment of Eight Carloads Is Stowed in Hold of Oriental Liner for Moji; Takes Large Flour Cargo.

When she sails during the early part of next week, the Norwegian steamer Henrik Theen of the Portland & Asiatic line will have aboard 8 carloads of cotton, the first shipment to go through Portland on one of the Oriental liners for nearly a year. The shipment is consigned to Moji, Japan, where the only cotton mills in the empire are located.

The consignment of cotton which will be shipped out on the Ibsen is composed of 400 bales which were shipped here from Texas by way of San Francisco, as it is the overflow of a cargo that could not be loaded aboard one of the Harriman liners there. few years ago it was no unusual thing for large shipments of raw cotton to be shipped to the Orient by way the liners running out of Portland. Large shipments of tobacco also went to make up the cargoes of those steamers, but it is only once or twice a year that they are sent from here, being loaded almost altogether at San Fran-

The Ibsen will shift from the Port-land Flouring mills to the Pacific Coast bunkers tomorrow to bunker for the voyage to the Orient, after which she will move to the Irving dock to complete her cargo with 300 tons of wheat. She now has \$50 tons of wheat aboard, as well as 29,000 barrels of flour. In addition to this she will take out 100,000 feet of lumber, and on this Voyage she will go as far as Manila. She is expected to sail Monday afternoon or Tuesday morning.

The Norwegian steamer Heroules, of the same line, is new loading flour at Albina dock and she is scheduled to get away for the Orient between October 20 and October 21. She will have aboard between 3500 and 4000 tons of flour and 1,009,000 feet of lumber for Japan ports, Hongkong and Manila.

STEERAGE RATE CUT


