

HOOD RIVER GETS MILLION FOR HER BIG APPLE CROP

Half Million Boxes Ready for Shipment; Find Two Growing Where Ranchers Only Expected One.

The Hood River apple crop's value this year approximates \$1,000,000. It is three times greater than last year. The total of boxes of apples packed and sold to New York buyers is nearly 500,000. "Pickers are finding two boxes of apples this year where they only expected to get one," said Robert Smith, of the Stanley-Smith Lumber company today.

"Not only will the figures of the crop be found correct, but it is not too much to say that the apples were never of better quality. Nearly the entire crop has been bought by two big New York buyers—Steinhilf & Kelly and Ray & Hatfield. They buy the fruit on the trees and pack it for shipping."

Mr. Smith gains this information concerning the Hood River apple crop partly because of the fact that his firm has furnished a large proportion of the lumber used in manufacturing apple boxes. The crop, he says, has passed the largest expectations. The prices are satisfactory to the growers, and next year they are planning for even more business.

There are about 8000 people in the Hood River valley. Not all of them are apple-growers or employees of apple-growers. But it is among these people that the money for the apple crop will be distributed.

GARBAGE FIGHT IS ON IN COUNCIL TO DEFEAT CITY PLAN

Private Corporation Aims to Secure Franchise, Fix Rates and Leave New Municipal Plant Idle.

A warm fight has developed between advocates of municipal and private collection of garbage. The Portland Sanitary company has asked the city council for the privilege of taking collection off the city's hands, and offers to pay for the opportunity. The Civic Council and the North East Side Improvement association will protest against any such arrangement, advocating on the other hand, municipal collection.

The protest of the two organizations will be formulated at a special meeting which will be held tonight in the Commercial club convention hall. T. B. McDewitt, chairman of a committee of opposition appointed from the North East Side Improvement association, declares the proposed franchise will have the effect of holding up the city. He points out that no clause in the proposed franchise binds the Portland Sanitary company to any system of rates, thus giving it opportunity to charge householders whatever it pleases.

City Building Own Plant.

The fact that the city has under process of construction a new and modern \$100,000 crematory which will stand idle in the event that the private collectors get their franchise is also recalled.

Councilman Annand, who introduced the ordinance embodying the franchise desired by the Portland Sanitary company, spoke favorably of the plan this morning.

"Banking interests well established in Portland are back of Babcock, the young man who applied for the franchise," said Councilman Annand. "I am not at liberty to reveal the identity of the banking interests, but I can say that I know they are all right. The new company will also collect garbage at half the rates now charged, and will purchase the new garbage incinerator from the city. The company expects to make money from refuse which the city now wastes. They will save solder and tin, will feed hogs with the slops, and in many other ways get back the cost

of maintenance, in ways that the city would never attempt."

Annand's Arguments.

"The company will get more work out of its men than the city could from its employees. The people will get better service than is now given or can be given at a less rate. I think the Portland Sanitary company has a good side in its representations. The application for franchise will come up before the council committee this afternoon."

The present system of garbage collection in Portland is for the city to permit private collectors to gather refuse from householders, business places and eating houses, charging whatever price they can induce the people to pay. These collectors have no particularly defined section in which to work and are compelled to get patronage where they can. As a result the service is unsatisfactory and inadequate. The wagons are of wood and leak.

Among the unsanitary features are daylight collection, carelessness in making collections and the leaving of refuse which leaks from the wagons upon the streets.

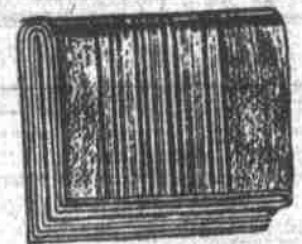
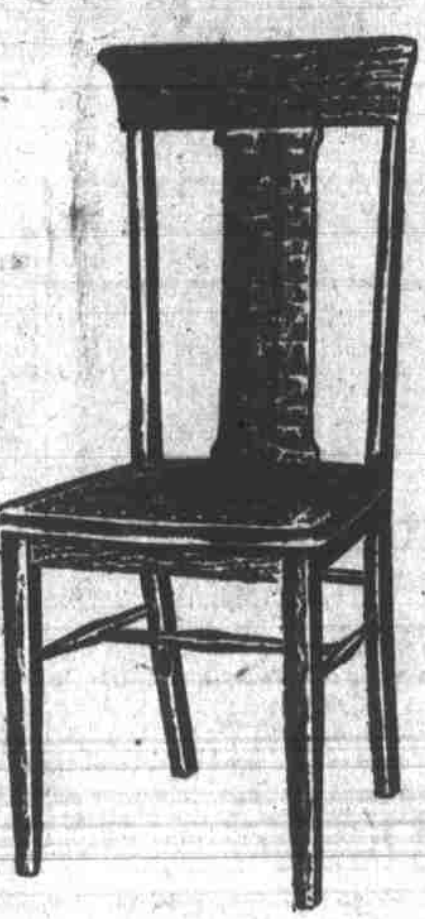
