

NELSON FENDER IS ORDERED ASSESSED BY CITY COUNCIL

Street Company Preferred Its Own Design; What Will the Mayor Do to the Ordinance?

The Nelson automobile fender was adopted yesterday by the city council as the legal fender for the street railway company. This question has been hanging fire for the past three years. The vote yesterday was eight for the fender and six against it. Interest now centers around the action Mayor Simon will take upon the ordinance.

The Portland Railway, Light & Power Co. strongly protested against the Nelson fender, and offered in its stead a contrivance of its own design. The special fender committee, which made tests of various fenders, recommended the fender desired by the car company, but the street committee took up the matter and recommended the Nelson.

Councilman Devlin voted against the Nelson fender, and said he thought it should be left to the company to provide a fender satisfying the requirements of the state law. Councilman Callahan opposed the Nelson fender because it projected too far in front of the car. He said this would cause many accidents. He also claimed the automatic failure would not work where the car ran upon a prostrate body.

Mayor Simon recently gave his opinion that the city should not force a fender upon the company that did not meet its approval, because that did not meet the liability for damages in case of accidents. City Attorney Grant gave an opinion that the city would not be held liable in any way. Those voting for the Nelson fender were Councilmen Anderson, Concanon, Dunning, Kibbi, Menefee, Rueshlight and Wallace. Those voting against it were Councilmen Baker, Belding, Callahan, Devlin, Ellis and Wallace.

WENATCHEE FAVORS OPENING OF COLUMBIA

The Wenatchee Commercial club has fallen in line with the movement of the Portland Chamber of Commerce for the opening of the Columbia river as far as possible, even into the district across the boundary.

In a letter sent out by that club to other commercial organizations united action is suggested with a view of getting results at an early date. The Portland Chamber of Commerce has been at work on the opening of the Columbia river from its mouth towards its headwaters for years and with excellent results and only a few weeks ago it sent a delegation to Nelson, B. C., to confer with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Premier of Canada. At this conference the Premier expressed himself deeply interested in the subject.

The local chamber received a letter yesterday from Wenatchee Commercial club that it had taken up the matter and it was viewed as a big boost in favor of the movement for the success of which the chamber is constantly working.

Former Governor of Kansas Dead.

Wichita, Kan., Oct. 13.—Former Governor W. E. Stanley, one of the most widely known men in Kansas, died at his home here today. Stanley was prominent in Kansas affairs for 20 years, but retired from public life six years ago, after serving a term as governor. He declined an appointment to the state supreme bench in 1904. Stanley's election as governor signified the death of populism in Kansas.

JOHN KLINGERBERG ON TRIAL FOR MURDER

Montesano, Wash., Oct. 13.—John Klingenberg, confessed murderer of Charles Hadberg, whom he shot at Indian creek and for which crime William Gohl was found guilty and is serving a life sentence at Walla Walla, was placed on trial today on a charge of murder in the second degree. A number of witnesses testified to the finding of the body of Charles Hadberg, which was found at the mouth of Indian creek weighted down with an anchor weighing 50 pounds.

Klingenberg throughout the testimony sat unmoved.
Prosecuting Attorney William E. Campbell made his opening statement, and during his recital of the crime Klingenberg never took his eyes off the prosecutor. At times a smile played around his lips, but it was hidden by his hand.

The jury was completed last night after several hours' work, that exhausted the special venire of 150 drawn for the trial.

CASE DELAYED MANY TIMES COMING UP AGAIN

"I will bet six bits that Attorney Dunway will ask for a continuance tomorrow in the circuit court, saying that he is busy and the city attorney's office is crowding him," remarked Assistant City Attorney Tomlinson this morning, in speaking of the case of the investment company against the city of Portland. The case has been held up two years and is set for tomorrow.

The case involves the efforts of the city to open a street in lot 1, block 11, Piedmont. The council authorized the opening of Jessup street, easterly to Commercial street. Only one block is to be opened. The rest of the street has been opened and improved. B. Quackenbush, who owns the lot, is righting the case.

Attorney Dunway appealed from the viewers' report, and the case has been in the circuit court. It has come up for trial several times, but was always continued.

STOCK SHOW SUCCESS; WILL BE HELD ANNUALLY
A stockholders' meeting of the Portland Livestock Fair association will be held October 27, when election of officers for the ensuing year will take place. A complete report and full accounting of the recent livestock show and fair will also be submitted by the secretary at this meeting.

The directors of the association got together last night and in an informal way discussed the recent fair. It was stated that the livestock report will show that it was a success in every way and the outcome so gratifying to the stockholders that it will hereafter be a permanent feature. There was some doubt at the outset whether or not the people would support it, but a sufficient measure to warrant the heavy expenditure and upon the outcome depended the future of the show.

CLARENCE DARROW WILL LECTURE ON PROHIBITION

"The Liberties of Men and the Fallacies and Wrongs of Prohibition" is the subject of the lecture to be delivered tonight by Clarence Darrow of Chicago, in the Masonic Temple, West Park and Yamhill streets. Clarence Darrow is one of the best known lawyers in the country, chiefly because of his connection with the celebrated trials of Meyer, Haywood and Pettibone, officials of the Western Federation of Miners, who were charged with murdering Ex-Governor Steunenberg of Idaho. He was also a member of the board of arbitration which settled the Pennsylvania coal strike of 1902. Mr. Darrow will deliver nine addresses in Oregon under the auspices of the Greater Oregon Home Rule association.

SYNOD OF OREGON IN SESSION AT PENDLETON

Pendleton, Or., Oct. 13.—With commissioners from every presbytery in the state in attendance, the synod of Oregon convened in this city at 1 o'clock and will continue its sessions until Sunday. The Sabbath school conference will be held this afternoon, at which several prominent speakers will make addresses. This evening the retiring moderator, Dr. H. N. Moore of Eugene, will preach his sermon and the new moderator will be elected. Dr. W. H. Blankney, former president of Pendleton academy is mentioned as a candidate for this office.

SOUTH PORTLAND WANTS BRIDGE WITHOUT DELAY

Improvement clubs of South Portland met last night in Weber's hall and adopted unanimously resolutions deploring the delay in carrying forward the plan for the South Portland link of the projected boulevard system on the ground that dilatory methods would forfeit valuable lands heretofore donated to the city. The matter of South Portland to span the Willamette river was discussed. It was the sense of the meeting that the bridge should be built as speedily as possible. The meeting was well attended and enthusiastic.

New Enterprise at Forest Grove.
Forest Grove, Or., Oct. 13.—Jack Latta and Charles Metz, of this city, have purchased the Methodist church building, which will be relinquished as soon as the edifice now building is completed and will establish a steam laundry and cold storage plant therein, moving the building about 200 feet from its present location, to the corner of Second street and First avenue north. A steam laundry and a cold storage plant have long been needed in this city, and Metz and Latta expect the business to be a paying proposition from the start.

POSTMASTERS ARE IN SESSION HERE

Heads of Offices That Handle Mail in Oregon Meet to Exchange Ideas.

Postmasters from all parts of the state, members of the Presidential Postmasters' association of Oregon, are assembled in convention today in the convention hall of the Portland Commercial club. About 25 were present at the morning session, but it is expected the number will be greatly augmented before evening. Tonight the postmasters will enjoy a banquet at the club, and it is expected that at least 50 out of the total membership of 80 will be seated around the festive board.

The morning session was devoted to the address of welcome by R. W. Raymond, chief of the industrial bureau of the Portland Commercial club; President B. W. Johnson's response, reading of the minutes of the previous meeting, reports of officers and the appointment of committees.

President Johnson, in responding to Mr. Raymond's welcome called attention to the fact that the postmasters are the only merchants in the world that he knows of who sell their wares for exactly what they pay for them. He also referred to them as the only merchants who stand the expense of a convention without expecting financial returns in some way or another therefrom.

Postmaster Charles B. Merrick of this city spoke under the head of "appointment of committees," in favor of naming a committee to stimulate interest in the association.

"The postal department grants us leave of absence to attend these conventions," said Mr. Merrick, "and it appears to me that everybody should take advantage of the opportunity and get together for the purpose of exchanging ideas and profiting by each other's experiences."

At the afternoon session addresses are being delivered by H. M. Hoskins of McMinnville and William J. Lachner of Baker City. Discussions will follow the addresses.

TELLS OF ACTION OF ACIDS ON CEMENT SEWERS

Portland, Or., Oct. 12.—To the Editor of The Journal.—In your report of the meeting held Monday night at the Kenilworth Presbyterian church there are some errors which, in justice to all, should be corrected. The acids used by me in making the tests were the same that are found in sewage and their action upon the cement sewer pipes was positive, not simply apparent. The statement that city sewers averaged 1 per cent was intended to represent the average acidity during the hours of the day when factories and trades are active; take for example, soap works discharging one half ton of acid liquor daily, or the case of the city of Worcester, Mass., where the amount of copperas from pickling liquors discharged reached 64½ tons per day. The amount of lime required to neutralize this would be enormous, and if it were to run through cement sewer pipes it would dissolve out of the Portland cement, which is the binding material used in cement and concrete sewer pipes. A sufficient lime for this neutralization, I am firm now, as I have always done, that no matter how strong or how weak the acid in the sewage it dissolves out its equivalent of lime, and thus destroys the cement sewer pipe. Benjamin Brooks, in "The Truth About Concrete," states that reports were received from several laboratories and universities of engineers, from Chicago, Paterson, N. J., Springfield, Mass., Portland, Maine, Memphis, Tenn.—about a dozen principal cities in all—to the effect that concrete sewers were a dismal failure. A few years underground and the sewer acids and sewer gases reduced them to crumbling wrecks. For since all sewers must meet with acids, and since these acids are known to have a marked effect on lime, and since, further, cement contains a large per cent of lime, it should not require more than a Shakespearean imagination to foresee what would happen to an acid bearing concrete sewer. Falling on a board walk near his shack at the foot of East Washington street yesterday afternoon, Richard Tenant, aged 73, received a fractured skull and died early this morning at St. Vincent's hospital.
Tenant lived alone in the hut and was about to enter it when he stumbled. He rolled off the walk and directly under the exhaust pipe of a manufacturing house. Firemen on the fireboat found him a few minutes later and saved him from death by scalding. He was carried into his hut and the patrol wagon summoned. City Physician Ziegler attending him before he was sent to the hospital. Tenant's son is a fireman with Engine company No. 7.

WORD TO WARNING TO COUNTY CLERK FIELDS

County Clerk Fields this morning received a letter from J. B. Eaton, of the state tax commission, warning him as member of the county board of equalization to adhere strictly to the law in performing his duties next week, the opening session of the board being next Monday.
The letter cautions the board to be careful about carrying over the county assessor where assessments have been made lawfully and advises the board that its function is not to strike assessments from the tax rolls, but only to equalize these wherever equalization shall be deemed proper.

Johnson intimated as much when he said all whom he had questioned had declared the hits were not scratches. He sold whiskey in rooms above his place of business. One of the exhibits in the case was a mare in which were 21 pint bottles of whiskey. The judge fined Bolich \$150.

The defendants sold a mare to Hollenbeck and after receiving \$150 in payments for the animal refused to deliver his purchase to the complainant. The suit was to compel them to comply with their contract and deliver the mare.

Alice Maud Hamilton, in the circuit court, filed a suit for divorce from James W. Hamilton. Cruelly and non-support are charged by the plaintiff. The Hamiltons were married at Sardinia, B. C., in 1905.
