

DEATH OF NOTED PIONEER WOMAN

Mrs. Nancy Wimberly, Who
Came to Oregon in 53,
Passes Away.

Roseburg, Or., Oct. 12.—Mrs. Nancy A. Wimberly, an Oregon pioneer of 1853, died at the family home in north Roseburg yesterday, at the age of 72 years. She was a widow of the late Enoch Wimberly, who died in August, 1908.

Mrs. Wimberly, whose maiden name was Nancy A. Marks, was a native of the state of Illinois, her birthplace being near Galesburg. Bereft of her father in very early childhood, she and her mother became members of that sturdy and noble band of pioneers who crossed the plains to Oregon in 1853. About three years were spent near Salem, and thence they came to Douglas county.

In 1857 she was married to Enoch Wimberly, an Oregon pioneer of 1848 and for 30 years they resided near Glendale, this county, thence moving to this city. Five children survive her: L. Wimberly, editor and proprietor of the Rose-

burg Review, and grand patriarch of the I. O. O. F. of Oregon; Ira Wimberly of Brainerd, N. E. Wimberly, Roseburg; Mrs. C. L. Cleveinger of Grants Pass; and Miss Elva Wimberly of Roseburg. She is also survived by one sister, Mrs. Mary Johnson of Prairie City, Or.

liantly and the prancing horses seemed to enjoy the music as much as did the spectators. A large sprinkling of the military from Vancouver barracks added smartness to the ensemble.

Tonight's Program.

At this evening's performance, which begins promptly at 8 o'clock, there will be 11 events in which 116 horses will compete for prizes. In addition there will be the rapid fire drill and the wall scaling exhibition of batteries A and B from Vancouver barracks and the exhibition high jump of Fox Catcher, the champion high jumper of the coast. The batteries and Fox Catcher will be the special features of every performance.

The first event of this evening's program will be the judging of six spans of heavy delivery horses, entered by various Portland firms, followed by the judging of six Percheron stallions. The third event will be the judging of two four horse heavy draft teams. The judging of 19 horses suitable for officers' mounts will be the fourth event. The majority of entries in this class have been made by officers of the Vancouver barracks. Following the judging of heavy harness horses to victoria,

will be the display of 11 ladies' saddle horses. Among the horses competing for prizes in this class are "The Moor," owned by Miss Helen W. Farrell of Seattle; "Bellington Attraction," J. A. Russell of Vancouver, B. C.; "Johnnie Moore," Miss Louise Flinders of Portland; "Sandy Mac," Miss Mabel Lawrence, Portland; "Highland Markman," Miss Laura Galbraith of Seattle; "Misty Pride" and "Senator," Kramer's Riding school of Portland; "Tony," Miss Eva Kiernan of Portland; "Dainty Miss," Miss Mila Westinger of Portland; "Gypsy Maid," Miss Angela Kinney of Portland.

Combination Classes.

Heavy harness horses to gig, of which there are 12 entries, will be judged next, followed by the exhibition of 21 combination riding and driving horses which are competing for blue ribbons. There are eight high steppers in the next class, including some of the finest horses in the show. Among the exhibitors in this class are D. C. McGregor, L. S. Howe and J. A. Russell, of Vancouver, B. C.; Andrew Laidlaw of Spokane, William J. Ball of Salem and Miss Georgiana Leadbetter, Thomas W. Murphy and the East Portland Riding School of this city. Twenty green hunters will contest for prizes in the next event, and following will come the racing of eight hunt teams.

Tomorrow afternoon there will be 12 events in addition to the special attractions. This will be one of the best performances of the show. It will include the judging of eight trotters, five single horses to surrey, twenty-six ladies' saddle horses, three pairs trotters, three pairs high steppers, sixteen horses suitable for cavalry, three pairs heavy harness horses to victoria, twelve saddle horses, fourteen runabout horses, twenty-two saddle horses, thirteen trot-

ters and thirteen horses in the ladies' jumping class. The last event will consist of hurdling, which is always enjoyed.

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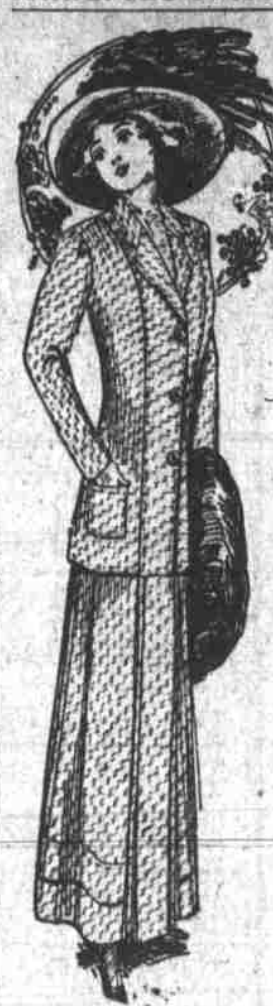

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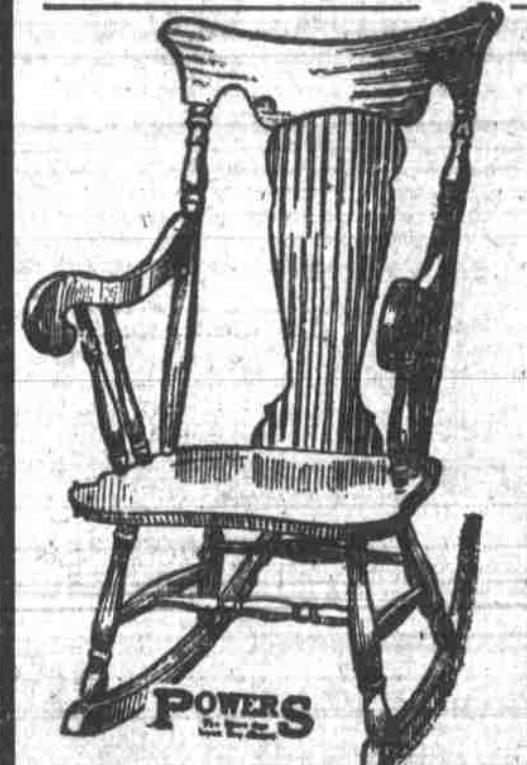
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
