

LAZARUS MARKS MAY LEAD TO DISCOVERY OF TIMES DYNAMITERS

that the boat was anchored outside the harbor.

Seen to Meet Launch.

Before sailing from San Francisco, the Kate was seen to meet the launch Pastime which was used by the three mysterious men who purchased the dynamite at Glendale. The meeting of the two boats gave foundation to the theory that the powder might have been transferred to the Kate and taken to San Pedro. The men aboard the Kate had announced before sailing that they were to seek a hidden treasure on an island in the Santa Barbara straits.

All efforts of the police to trace the movements of the boat after it left San Francisco proved fruitless. Not until Frohman was interviewed, was it learned that Osterhaus had been seen in San Pedro after the sailing of the vessel. When the boat left San Francisco Osterhaus was booked as the captain. This fact has given almost positive strength to the theory that the mysterious power schooner was at or near San Pedro on or about October 2.

Detectives state that Osterhaus probably left his boat beyond the harbor bar before entering the port. Frohman, the man who saw and talked with the seaman, says that Osterhaus said that he was enroute for San Diego.

Mysterious Boat.

Attorney Earl Rogers has not placed much reliance in the theory that the men left Los Angeles after placing the dynamite at Mr. Zeehandelaar's home, and then escaped by boat. The new development has caused the investigators to make every effort to locate the mysterious boat. It is now believed by a great number of the detectives that when the boat is found a long step in the investigation will have been taken. The peculiar individualities of the man's handwriting will probably be one of the important connecting links in the evidence which is being forged around the men suspected of using dynamite. The characteristics of a signature now in the possession of Attorney Earl Rogers, who is conducting the investigation into the disaster, will probably point to the definite identification of the three men who purchased the explosive at Glendale.

Signatures.

Yesterday Professor E. K. Isaacs, the handwriting expert, was retained by the investigators, and is making an exhaustive study of two signatures which were secured by the detectives. Should Professor Isaacs report that the two signatures were written by the same man it is probable that the man who has been under surveillance here during the last three days will be taken into custody. In the event that the suspected man is arrested the police detectives say that they will be able to place their hands upon two other men suspected of placing the dynamite at the Zeehandelaar home.

When the 500 pounds of giant gelatine was purchased on September 23 from the Giant Powder company, the man giving his name as J. B. Leonard signed a receipt for it. This signature was brought to Los Angeles by Attorney Earl Rogers, and when the signature of the suspected man here was secured, Professor Isaacs was retained to give an opinion upon it this morning. The investigators received word that the injured miner who is under captionage in a northern strait is gaining in strength. It is believed by Mr. Rogers that valuable information will be secured as soon as the injured man is able to talk coherently.

Police Disagree as to Wallace.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Sacramento, Cal., Oct. 13.—The police of this city are a little confused over contradictory telegrams which have been received from Los Angeles since the arrest here of George Wallace, suspected Times dynamiter. Wallace has been released, and today dropped from sight just after a telegram from Los Angeles to hold him had been received. The police here are satisfied that Wallace was in no way connected with the Times affair, as is also Detective William J. Burns, who spent a part of yesterday interviewing him. The telegram stated that an officer would be sent to take Wallace to Los Angeles. The police say they are making no effort to relocate Wallace.

TREASURE HUNTERS ARE
SEEKING GOLD OF INCAS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Victoria, B. C., Oct. 13.—Seeking a massive gold chain looted from the Inca temples of the sun worshippers on the Isle of the Sun in the mountains of Bolivia, many treasure hunting expeditions are in the Bolivian mountains, according to news brought by the four masted schooner, Aluma, which reached Victoria late yesterday afternoon.

T. Brown, a young English railroad engineer, who has been running lines for the highest railroad in the world, running from Antofagasta to La Paz, said:

"There have been many treasure hunting expeditions in Bolivia this year. An Italian count had returned just before I left and a party of four Americans were in the hills. The Americans had been gone three months and some anxiety was felt for their safety. They have gone in search of a massive gold chain said to be no less than 50 feet long, with huge links said to have been buried in the days of Pizarro."

MAKES GOOD FIGHT

BOWERMAN COULD HAVE DONE THINGS: WHY DID HE NOT?

roads if he is elected governor. He wants to build them with convict labor and save money for the state. He says he wants to consolidate the purchase of state supplies and have one board purchase for all the institutions, and so save thousands of dollars. He wants to maintain reforms after he is elected governor.

"Why has not Bowerman tried to do some of these things? He has been acting governor for four months and he has had time to make a beginning. He has been senator through three sessions of the legislature, and the record of those sessions shows no statute bearing Bowerman's name introduced and passed for the benefit of the people of Oregon."

State Board and State Supplies.

"How now says how state supplies shall be purchased. They must be secured from the lowest bidder. It is adequate to protect the state now. If the law gives the state board the direction of how to purchase state supplies, why has not Bowerman put his reform into effect? He for four months has been the majority of things that I have done. The law is not adequate now, why has not Bowerman at least attempted to make it so during his six years in the state senate? He has known of the conditions. He has been president of the senate and has appointed auditing and investigating committees. He has been a resident of Salem, and has known the superintendents of these institutions and the workings of the institutions. Why, then, did Bowerman not try to remedy these abuses six years ago, or four, or two years ago?"

"He had the power and the opportunity. Why did he not have the inclination?"

"Will Do" vs. "Have Done."

"We are candidates for governor on two different platforms, Bowerman and I. He is a candidate on a platform of promises of what he will do. I am a candidate on a platform of what I have done. 'You all know Bowerman's record. He refused to subscribe to Statement No. 1. He voted for the Mariner bill to legalize assemblies. He was the leader of the assembly, the father of it. He is the product and the nominee of a movement which has as its purpose and its aim the subversion of the primary law, the annihilation of Statement No. 1 and the return of the state to the old order of things."

Bowerman as Friend of People.

West reviewed his service as state land agent and explained his fight against the tide land and lieu land abuses. He went over his services as railroad commissioner and showed his efforts to benefit the people of eastern Oregon through better service and lower rates. He showed that because of this record he had won the enmity of the O. R. & N., but said he hoped it had given him the friendship of the people. He promised that if elected he would use his power to bring about a better system of taxation in the state. The very safeguard put in the law had been turned by the public service corporations into a tax on the people.

Wallawa Is Anti-Assembly.

Wallawa county has no assembly county sentiment. It had an assembly delegation to the state assembly. The delegation was picked by T. Hockett, George Hyatt and A. C. Miller. Hockett engineered the deal and he was not even a member of the county central committee. Eighteen delegates were picked, and most of them refused to go. Hockett has a relative working as stenographer for Bowerman at Condon. He packed the Wallawa delegation for Bowerman so tight that when Charles A. Johnson of Baker City asked the support of Wallawa county, Hockett told him the delegation was pledged to Bowerman. Then Hockett voted the delegation straight.

The people of Wallawa county remember the assembly like the country remembers the Maine. They are out for those who conceived the outrage.

BLUE AND GRAY TO MEET
AGAIN AT GETTYSBURG

Harrisburg, Pa., Oct. 13.—One of the greatest patriotic demonstrations ever held in the United States will take place in 1913 on the battlefield of Gettysburg. If the plan discussed at a preliminary meeting of the arrangements committee here today are carried out, the demonstration will be in observance of the fiftieth anniversary of the great battle between the Union army under General Meade and the Confederate forces under General Lee. That the celebration of the semi-centennial will be truly national in its scope is already assured by the acceptance by nearly all the states of the invitation to participate. Two southern states, Georgia and North Carolina, were the first to respond to the invitation. It is expected that the Grand Army of the Republic and the United Confederate Veterans will have the leading parts in arranging for the celebration. The first Monday of the month of July, 1913, is the date of the other patriotic organizations of the country will participate.

man, with his Harriman pass in his pocket, hurried over to the state treasurer's office and truthfully collected the money. The treasurer's books show the payment.

Proof He Took Pass.

The proof that Bowerman held an annual pass over the Harriman lines in 1908 and 1909 is afforded by the files of the state railroad commission. Under the provisions of the act creating the railroad commission, passed in 1907 every railroad is compelled to file with the commission a list of all passes issued. Section 45 of the act provides: "Every railroad shall file on the first Monday in February in each year, and oftener if required by the commission, file with the commission a verified list of all railroad tickets, passes and mileage books issued free or for other than actual bona fide money consideration at full established rates during the preceding year, together with the names of the recipients thereof, the amounts received therefor, mileage thereof and the reasons for issuing the same." (Laws of 1907, p. 23.)

Reports Filed.

Pursuant to this law the Harriman officials filed reports with the railroad commission, showing that an annual pass was issued to Jay Bowerman, as attorney for the O. R. & N. for the years 1908 and 1909. An annual pass was also issued to R. R. Butler, Bowerman's law partner, for both years.

It will be remembered that when it became known that Bowerman was going to call a special session of the legislature in March, 1909, to correct bills made at the regular session, Governor Benson tried to induce the mem-

bers to waive all claims for mileage, so as to keep the expense as small as possible. He urged that they had already received mileage at the regular session, that the sums thus allowed were two or three times the actual cost of transportation, and that the special session would have been unnecessary but for mistakes made at the regular session. For these reasons he thought the members should not demand mileage again. Four of the senators, Kellam and Selling of Malheur, Abraham of Douglas and Miller of Linn and Lane, acted upon Governor Benson's suggestion and did not draw down any mileage.

Not So With Jay.

Not so with Senator Jay Bowerman. With his Harriman pass in his pocket he called at the state treasurer's office and collected his \$71.10 mileage, just as he had done three weeks earlier at the close of the regular session.

The actual cost of a round trip ticket, Condon to Salem and return, is \$15.20.

BLOOD FLOWS IN
BATTLE BETWEEN
TROOPS-STRIKERS

to fire through the windows if the order were not obeyed.

M. Jaures, leader of the men in the building, appeared at a window and shouted defiance.

"We will surrender only when you come and take us!" yelled Jaures.

As he stepped back into the building a bullet crashed through the window above him. It was answered from within the building and a battle which lasted nearly two hours was on.

Immense throngs surrounded the building and the police charged and countercharged them in an effort to keep the space around the building clear.

Men and women were down, and one woman was reported killed. Reinforcements were rushed to aid the sorely tried police, and after a sharp conflict the mob was dispersed.

The police then turned their attention to those in the newspaper office.

The laborers were with barricaded. Most of them appeared to be armed and shots were fired from the windows. A scattering fire was returned by the police and soldiers, who charged and captured the men within the building.

Four men were treated at La Broca and De La Charle hospitals and many more are said to have been injured and taken elsewhere.

In charging the crowds the troops and

police had orders to use the flat of their swords, which probably was responsible for the small number of casualties.

The strike was even more effective today than yesterday. The Northern line ran a few trains, but no attempt to maintain regular service was made. The Eastern and Western lines made a spasmodic effort to resume traffic, but failed.

Food trains heavily guarded started shortly after noon, but the presence of armed men on the cars did not prevent hostile demonstrations on the part of the strikers.

REVOLUTION PREDICTED;
ARMY UNTRUSTWORTHY;
STRIKERS BEARING ARMS

(United Press Leased Wire.)

London, Oct. 13.—A despatch to the Globe from Paris this afternoon says: The railroad strike has developed into a revolutionary struggle for the purpose of overthrowing the government. Bloodshed and rioting are imminent. Scenes approximating the French revolution are expected when the troops, half loyal to the republic and half favorable to the "syndicate," are ordered to suppress anti-government demonstrations.

Following the riot at the offices of La Humanite six prominent labor and socialist leaders were arrested. The deputies who were at the meeting in the newspaper offices were allowed to go free.

Non-striking railroad men were given permission today to arm themselves to protect their lives and the trains against the strikers. Immediately after the announcement was made the strikers made a rush for arms and thousands of armed men are now parading the streets. The situation is considered desperate.

the cities are thronged with troops.

At Barcelona a martial law already has been declared and Premier Canalejas announces that in the event of an uprising the king is confident of the support of the army. It is reported that Alfonso will personally command his forces. All leaves of absence have been suspended.

Reports from Barcelona indicate that the great stone prison, Spain's bastille, is guarded carefully by a heavy garrison for fear that an attempt will be made to dynamite the noted jail, in which hundreds of republican prisoners are held.

Professor Ferrer was executed after a farcical trial.

Within the walls of the great edifice hundreds of political prisoners are buried alive in rat-infested, disease

filled cells. When the revolution comes in Spain, the great Barcelona prison will be one of the objects of attack, and the secrets that its shot-torn walls will disclose will shock and thrill the world.

The execution squads of a tyrannical government have been at work three years shooting men for political offenses. Should Barcelona fall into the hands of the Republicans of Spain the infamous prison will be torn stone from stone.

SPANISH CONSUL AT
NEW YORK THREATENED

(United Press Leased Wire.)

New York, Oct. 13.—Emilio Periera, Spanish consul general stationed here, received a letter today threatening the consulate with destruction by dynamite. "I fear trouble," said Periera, who has been through the Carlist troubles on the French frontier, "and the man who touches me today will be shot down."

The consul carries a revolver and is guarded by detectives.

"I don't think there will be a revolution in Spain," he continued. "The army and navy are loyal. Spain has had experience as a republic and did not like it. I intended to close the office today, but the arrival of a steamer from Spain forced me to keep it open."

Memory of Ferrer Kept Green.

London, Oct. 13.—In nearly all the capitals and chief cities of Europe simultaneous meetings were held today in memory of Professor Francisco Ferrer, the founder of the modern schools of Spain, who was court-martialed and executed by the Spanish government one year ago today on account of his revolutionary activity.

TEN MILLIONS FOR IRONDALE WORKS LAND ON AGENT

Carnegie Trust Company Is Sponsor for Flotation to Enlarge Plant on Sound.

Seattle, Oct. 13.—On his return from a visit to New York, James Moore today announced that about \$10,000,000 would be invested in enlarging the steel works at Irondale, located on Port Townsend bay, which now has an independent steel mill as its sole industry.

The money was raised, Mr. Moore says, through the sale of bonds. Two million dollars of the bonds has already been sold, and every dollar of the balance will be available, according to Mr. Moore, the moment funds are needed for enlarging the Irondale plant.

Mr. Moore announced that the Carnegie Trust company of New York City was acting as trustee for the bonds and that friends of that institution had purchased the securities.

Several houses are being built in Bend.

Salem, Or., Oct. 13.—Stockmen, feeders and shippers at Ontario, Or., have petitioned the railroad commission for relief against what are termed "starvation conditions" imposed upon them by the agent of the Oregon Short Line at that point. The petitioners allege that the agent falls and refuses to furnish them and other shippers with information as to when they can get cars, when they can be loaded and when they can be moved out of the yards, with the result that frequently stock must be held in the yards at Ontario from 12 to 14 hours without food or water, much to the damage of shippers. There is no water in the company's stockyards at Ontario.
