

ADOPT PLANS FOR LINCOLN SCHOOL

To Open Bids December 1; May Build Necessary Class-rooms, Etc., Later.

Plans and specifications drawn by Architects Whitehouse & Foulhoux for the new Lincoln high school were adopted at an adjourned meeting of the school board last night. Bids will be invited from contractors in Portland and elsewhere to be opened at noon December 1. A certified check for 5 per cent of the amount must accompany each bid.

The bids will be invited in two parts, as the board wants to reserve the right to eliminate the auditorium and a few other features from the main structure, should it be desired to do so, in letting the contract. It was explained that the finishing of the auditorium, for instance, could be done at a later day in case the cost of the structure should run up so high that it would not be deemed advisable to complete the auditorium at this time.

The board also took up the matter of conducting night schools for the winter term. The schools will be open three nights a week, Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, instead of five nights, as was the case last year. It having been ascertained by Superintendent Frank Rigler that a better aggregate attendance is thus obtained. The board agreed if a persons works in the daytime three nights of study is about all he can do without strain upon his health.

Superintendent Rigler's recommendations, as adopted, follow:

Elementary schools at Lincoln high school, Palling school, Stephens school, Alhina Homestead and Thompson school.

High school department at the Lincoln high school.

Machine shop practice, woodworking, mechanical drawing, electrical construction.

SALMON-TENTH STREET ROUTE IS FAVORED

The franchise asked by the Oregon Electric company over Salmon and Tenth streets to connect its tracks with those of the United Railways met the approval yesterday of the city council, and the measure was referred to the executive board for valuations. The street committee recently approved this route, despite the protest of a number of property owners on Salmon street, who objected to the track being placed on that street. Efforts are now being made to block the Salmon-Tenth street route, and force the company to go over Fourth street, providing the franchise of the Southern Pacific can be revoked. The franchise will go to the executive board and back to the council.

COUNTY GRAND JURY RETURNS TRUE BILLS

The county grand jury yesterday afternoon returned five true bills and two not true bills. Those who will have to stand trial are: Elmer Curry, indicted for an alleged attack with a revolver on E. C. Roberts October 1, and D. R. Dunning, accused of having committed the same kind of an offense on the same date.

Myer Shanker will face the circuit court on a charge of having stolen a roll of copper wire from the Portland Railway, Light & Power company. J. E. McDonald and C. Peterson are held on a larceny charge. Jesse Barnett was acquitted of having made an assault with a deadly weapon. So were Joe Batavia, Joe Liteman and J. D. Krutch, all three having been indicted for an alleged larceny.

BIBLE CLASSES HAVE SEVEN HUNDRED MEMBERS

Seven hundred men and boys are now registered in the Bible classes of the Portland Young Men's Christian Association, although the season for these classes opened only a few weeks ago. Last year the registration in Bible study was 1001, the largest number of any city west of Buffalo. This year R. R. Perkins, the religious and social work director, says the enrollment will go to 1200.

In all 43 classes have been organized and plans are being made to establish 11 more. Thirteen of the classes are conducted outside the association building. The last one to be formed was in the new boys' home. It has 12 members, which is the total number of boys in the home.

OFFERS COUNTY SEAT FOR DOLLAR

Ross Winans Makes Offer to Hood River of Block of Land.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Hood River, Or., Oct. 13.—That there is to be a hot time in the election this fall in Hood River county over the location of the county seat seems evident. Winans City, 10 miles south of the city of Hood River, is waging an aggressive campaign. Ross Winans, the sage of Winans City, and the Hood River hunter who has pinned more cougar scalps to his belt and drawn more hides from the carcasses of the mountain bear than any hunter in this section, has announced to the citizens of Hood River through a large "ad" in the local papers that he will sell the county an entire block in the city of Winans for the sum of \$1 and the buildings for the sum of \$150. Mr. Winans will conduct a whirlwind campaign in the interest of the new proposed county seat.

MAY NOT PICK SITE FOR POSTOFFICE SOON

Word comes from Washington, D. C., that the selection of a site for the new Portland postoffice has not been made, and that it is not probable that the interesting question will be settled in the immediate future.

Third Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Hillis, with whom rests the selection of postoffice sites, has confirmed the statement that the site had not been decided upon. At the same time he admitted that the matter might come up for final action at an early date.
