Oregon Electric Franchise—Stops at each street crossing and no more than two car trains are the two points which the property owners on Salmon and Tenth streets insisted should be inserted in the proposed franchise to the Oregon Electric company for a permit to use these streets. Several property owners attended the street committee of the executive board yesterday afternoon and made known their wishes. If these two points are not inserted they shall insist that the value of the franchise be placed at an extremely high figure. The Oregon Electric company is asking for permission to go down Salmon to Tenth street, thence north to Flanders street. This will give them a route through the city, and a way to the sea. The company proposed having stations along the route, and not stop at each street crossing. The committee will consider the valuation for the franchise and report it back to the board.

Bishop Scadding Lectures—In order to win the approval of the delegates to the Episcopal convention at Cincinnati to his views for church expansion in the Diocese of Oregon, Bishop Scadding of Portland is giving series of lectures before the delegates and visitors at the Church of the Advent in Cincinnati. The bishop's lectures cover the situation both in church circles and business circles in Oregon and are proving a great advertisement to the state. One of his lectures is to be given tonight. Bishop Scadding wants the church to make extensive appropriations towards increasing the Episcopal working force in Oregon.

Horn Contest Leads in Jail—A contest at 3 a. m. between Henry Helser and H. V. Reed, chauffeurs, to learn the relative strength of their automobile horns, cost them \$15 each in municipal court today. The test took place early yesterday on Alder street, near Fifteenth, the machines of both drivers having recently been provided with horns operated by the motors. The result brought a volume of angry words and oaths from scores of heads which were stuck from windows of nearby bed chambers and also brought Patrolman Robert Stuart to the scene. He placed both under arrest on disorderly conduct charges.

No More Asphalt on Grades—Asphalt for hard surface paving on streets that have a steep incline was declared yesterday by Mayor Simon to be not the best of material. His veto was placed on an ordinance to improve Lauretta place, between Washington and Everett streets. Asphalt has proved more slippery on inclines than on any other paving, and caution will be used hereafter in allowing it to be laid. Any grade of more than 10 per cent will be laid with some other kind of paving.

Ex-Fireman in Trouble—A. V. Johnson, a former city fireman, and his wife were arrested this morning by Detectives Price and Carpenter on a charge of obtaining money on false pretenses brought by Samuel Bromberger, a broker in the Hamilton building. The Johnsons rented furniture from Henry Jennings & Son and are alleged to have afterward represented to Bromberger that they were the owners of the property, obtaining from him a loan of \$150.
