

GUILFORD TELLS OF CONSPIRACY IN ROBBERY CASE

Sensational Charges Are Made Against Deputy District Attorney Fitzgerald and "Bob" Patterson, Rounder.

That Deputy District Attorney Fitzgerald and "Bob" Patterson, a business friend and associate, formed a conspiracy to implicate Attorney Seneca Fouts and Alex Sweek in an attempt to bribe H. M. Barton, a juror in the Cooper trial, is the sensational statement that H. A. Guilford made in his own defense this morning. Deputy District Attorney Page, who is acting for the state, embarrassed the witness by frequent interruptions, but Guilford was nevertheless able to convey, under legal restrictions, his information.

Guilford told how, working under instructions from Patterson, he proceeded to the office of Fouts & Sweek several days before his visit to Barton, and broached the subject of jury bribing. Fouts, he said, refused his approach, and he went back and reported to Patterson.

Met Fouts Again. "Two days later," continued Guilford, "I happened to be in the Lumbermen's building again. I met Fouts going out of the building. He nudged me and I went along with him to the street. He asked me who had sent me to him in the first place. I told him that I had come of my own volition, that no body had sent me. He told me to come up and see him again."

"I went to see Fouts a number of other times and after each visit I would report back to Bob Patterson. My intention was, during all this time, to drag Fouts into a jury bribing scandal. I noticed several times that I was followed by men who, I presumed, were detectives in the employ of the district attorney's office."

"Tuesday, May 10, Fouts finally agreed to bribe some juror. He asked me whom I had in mind. I reported to Patterson and asked him what juror I should approach."

Guilford then started to tell the jury what Patterson said to him, but he was prevented from doing so by the objection of Deputy District Attorney Page. Judge Kavanaugh sustained the objection on the ground that what Patterson might have said would be hearsay, and therefore not admissible in evidence.

Saw Barton at Home. "I went to H. M. Barton's house that evening," resumed Guilford, "and told him to put on his hat and come down the street with me. Barton said, 'I know what you came for, but I want you to identify yourself.' I gave Barton my card and my telephone number and told him to get his witnesses ready, that Fouts had agreed to pay the money."

Barton told me that he had a mortgage on his house and that he could not undertake to enter into the deal for nothing, that it was a risky business. I could not make any arrangement with Barton that night, but made an appointment with him for the following morning. We agreed to meet at the corner of Second and Washington streets the next day at 8:15 a. m. I reported progress to Patterson.

Pursuant to our agreement, Barton and I met and he told me he wanted me to have somebody pass \$500 to him in the presence of witnesses.

Wanted Money in Advance. "I went and told Fouts at noon that day that he would have to pay \$500 in advance. Fouts laughed at me and told me he had no money. He said he would have the coin sent out to Barton that evening, and for me to tell Barton to expect it. Later in the day I met Barton at the Arcade saloon and told him what Fouts had said."

Wednesday evening I tried to get Fouts on the telephone. Although I spent an hour or so calling over the phone, I could get neither Fouts, Sweek or Judge Gordon, one of the attorneys associated with Fouts and Sweek in the Morris case. I finally learned that the three attorneys were at the Oregon hotel. I went to the Oregon and was told that the men I wanted to see were downstairs in the grill. I waited around a long time and at last grew tired of waiting and went downstairs. There I saw Sweek seated at a table with some other gentlemen. Fouts had gone. I started towards Sweek, saying I would like to see him a minute. Sweek waved me back, saying: 'We've had enough of you, run right away.'"

Then I went home and Thursday morning I called up Barton and told him the deal was off and that he had better vote as his conscience dictated to him. Barton was angry and asked me what I meant by treating him in that way. He said he was disgusted that he should have waited so long and then would get nothing out of it.

"Well, I have had a worse trick played on me," I replied. "I had to wait around a street corner an hour or two and get nothing myself."

Guilford then told how he was arrested by Detective Craddock and taken to detective headquarters. He said he did not know that Craddock and Fitzgerald were in each other's confidence all the time and that he refused to tell the detective anything at all until Fitzgerald came down to the room in the Worcester building, to which the detectives had taken him.

Fitzgerald on Scene. He said that Fitzgerald gave him a peculiar glance and began a series of wild gesticulations, telling him that he had gotten into a bad place and that he had better come through and tell all he knew.

"I then outlined the confession dictated to me by Fitzgerald and the detectives," said Guilford, "believing that it was a part of the district attorney's game. He told me that the confession would not be used against me."

Before the taking of testimony Campbell, for the defense, argued a motion to have Judge Kavanaugh instruct the jury to return a verdict of acquittal. The judge overruled the motion. Campbell declared in his argument that the attempted bribing of juror Barton had been secured by the district attorney's collusion and that the case should be dismissed on the ground that the state had solicited a crime. Judge Kavanaugh decided that the evidence has shown that the crime was committed before the soliciting was done.

Patterson in Scheme. Guilford, in his testimony, tried to show that Patterson and Fitzgerald were business partners in a rooming house property in the north end, but the witness was prevented from relating his conversations with Patterson by objections of Deputy Page. Patterson will

IOKA DEMOCRATS ASK FOR PRIMARY

State Committee Makes Overtures to G. O. P. Committee on Vacancy.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Des Moines, Iowa, Oct. 22.—The Republican senatorial turmoil following the death of Senator J. P. Dolliver has been increased by a Democratic complication.

Chairman Reed of the Democratic state central committee has written to Chairman Frank of the Republican committee, proposing a primary election to select Dolliver's successor. Reed suggested that the committee should provide extra ballot boxes in each booth and that the result of the vote should be binding upon the legislature when senatorial candidates were before it for election.

On behalf of the Democrats, Reed offered to pay half the cost of the separate election and added that if the Republicans refused the proposition he would ask the governor to call a special session of the legislature to amend the law so that a primary election of senators would be legally possible.

have to be called to the stand, Judge Kavanaugh decided, if this testimony is admitted.

Guilford was permitted, however, to tell of an alleged transaction of his with Fitzgerald. The witness said that he had employed Fitzgerald, at Patterson's suggestion, to act as his attorney in the collection of a promissory note for \$20.

Guilford testified that Fitzgerald did not make the collection, and that he presented a claim for \$18.65 for his services. This, Guilford said, he refused to pay, on the ground that it was exorbitant. Fitzgerald threatened to sue him for the money, he says, but that later he told Fitzgerald he was working for Bob Patterson.

Admits Partnership. "Then Fitzgerald told me that I would not have to pay him, that he would let the bill go," said Guilford. "He told me that he was a friend and business associate of Patterson. And he also told me to keep in touch with his meaning. He said that 'they' would have lots of jobs later on."

In the beginning of his interesting statement Guilford told how he had come to this city from Minneapolis and had gone to work for a private detective agency. He said his first work for the agency was to act as a watchman for Patterson. He started to tell the jury that he had been ordered to try to connect Patterson and Fitzgerald with the white slave traffic but another objection by Deputy District Attorney Page again cut him off.

According to the latter part of Guilford's story he wrote to his father at Northampton, Mass., while he was in the county jail a week or so after his arrest. His father, he says, sent \$1000 to be used for bail money and instructed the defendant to fight the charges and, if necessary, to carry the case to the United States supreme court.

Guilford took occasion to bandy repartee from the witness chair with Deputy Page. On one occasion, he was exasperated by the continuous objections of the prosecutor that he replied in answer to a question, "I be doggoned if I know where I am at."

Woman on Stand. Detective Craddock occupied the witness chair most of the afternoon yesterday. The defense is making an effort to impeach Craddock's testimony by showing that there is a great divergence between it and the statements he made before the bar association when disbarment proceedings were brought against Sweek and Fouts. Mrs. Barton was called to the stand to corroborate her husband's testimony to the effect that Guilford visited him at the Barton residence.

Detective Fred Mallet was asked by defendant's attorney why he did not investigate the district attorney's office when Guilford made the claim that the district attorney's office had sought to bribe him a bribe. The question was ruled out by Judge Kavanaugh on an objection by Deputy Page.

Detective Craddock was recalled by the defense.

"Did you ever try to ferret out anything against Sweek and Fouts?" asked Attorney Campbell.

"I tried to find out who was behind Guilford," replied the officer.

"What did you find out?" continued the questioner.

"I found out several things that corroborated this man Guilford's statements," was the answer.

Asks for Acquittal. "Why didn't you investigate the district attorney's office?" asked Campbell.

"I didn't have any reason to," replied the detective.

"What you learned of Guilford's alleged visit to Barton could you not have arrested him then and held him in jail on a charge of vagrancy?" asked Campbell.

After some legal parleying between Campbell and Page the witness reluctantly replied that he could have.

The question was put with the evident intention of showing that Guilford could not have been convicted of having effected a bribe if the state had not solicited the crime.

Campbell then made a motion that the judge instruct the jury to bring in a verdict of acquittal on the ground that the crime was solicited for the purpose of prosecution by Deputy District Attorney Fitzgerald, Special Prosecutor A. E. Clark, Circuit Judge C. U. Gantenbein and Detectives Craddock and Mallet. Before this Deputy District Attorney Page announced that the state had rested its case.

PORTLAND'S NEED OF PUBLIC DOCKS IS BEFORE COAST AND MERCHANTS ASSOCIATION

Portland's Need of Wharves Is Forcibly Illustrated at Meeting of Transportation Committee of Chamber of Commerce.

Portland's urgent need of public docks was forcibly illustrated last night at a largely attended meeting of the transportation committee of the Portland Chamber of Commerce. The meeting was held in the convention hall of the Portland Commercial club.

Those who spoke were thoroughly familiar with their subjects and in view of this fact the meeting was considered one of the most instructive ever held in this city. The importance of the port as a distributive point was brought out with particular emphasis and clearness.

Wittenberg Presides. The meeting was opened by H. Wittenberg, chairman of the transportation committee, with the statement that if Portland did not have its geographic and strategic position it would be entirely at the mercy of the transcontinental railroads.

The general work of the committee was gone into thoroughly and its future work touched upon; its assistance to the commercial interests; its power in regulating transportation facilities, and the necessity of united action on the part of all merchants by becoming attached to the transportation committee was thoroughly explained.

J. N. Teal, counsel for the committee, was introduced and illustrated the situation of Portland as to its rail and water facilities and its distributive possibilities. He went exhaustively into the necessity of reasonable rates both in and out of Portland, to protect itself against encroachment of the eastern jobbers and manufacturers, the power of the movement of freight from the Atlantic sea coast to Portland by water, the increased handling and the low rates, and explained how the opening of new conditions and increase the power of Portland. In connection with the water transportation the necessity of dockage facilities was clearly pointed out.

Need Is Illustrated. As remarked by some members present, it was illustrative of the necessity of the dockage facilities that the illustration was received very favorably.

A. H. Dwyers spoke on the necessity of increasing the membership of the transportation committee, that its power and influence may be maintained. There were several other speeches dealing with subjects under discussion.

The meeting was closed by a statement from W. S. Smallwood, traffic manager of the transportation committee, giving a statement of the general work of the committee, its future work, and its similar organizations of the middle west, in the great work of transportation.

Many of those present requested application blanks for the purpose of joining this committee. It was considered that the transportation committee should have more of these open meetings, that more commercial interests become better advised on matters of transportation by rail and water and freight rates.

ARREST 2 MURDER SUSPECTS AT PASCO

Brakeman on S. P. & S. Shot By Hoboes—Boxcar Tourists Are Bad Men.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Pasco, Wash., Oct. 22.—In the capture and arrest at this place of A. T. Kennedy and James C. Horne, the police believe they have the two men wanted on a charge of having murdered a brakeman in the employ of the S. P. & S. at Washuena, Monday of this week.

The dead man was found by the section crew near that place after the body had been out placed by a train. A bullet in the head, evidently made by a bullet, was the cause of the coroner's jury bringing in a verdict to the effect that deceased came to his death from a gunshot wound at the hands of party or parties unknown.

When the two men were taken into custody at this place, they had been defying all efforts of the train crew to eject them from the train and had threatened the train men with draws revolvers. Justice Reider gave Kennedy 30 days for carrying concealed weapons, 30 days for aiming a revolver, and 10 days for trespassing. While Horne drew 30 days for trespassing. The sentence was made as heavy as possible consistent with the offense in order to allow the officers of Adams county sufficient time in which to look up the Washuena crime and trial the guilty parties.

RAILWAY COMPANY HAS FENDER HEARING

Mayor Simon will give the Portland Railway, Light & Power company another hearing on the fender question this afternoon. The company asked for an opportunity to present further reasons why the council should not insist upon the use of the Nelson Automatic fender for street cars.

With the return Friday of B. S. Josselyn, president of the company, new evidence and reasons, it is believed, will be made. Representatives of the railway company will be given an audience with the mayor in his office. Mayor Simon will not pass upon the ordinance requiring the use of the specified fender until Monday. He has until then to either veto or send it to the council without his signature. It is thought he will do the latter.

Birthday of German Empress. Berlin, Oct. 22.—Berlin displayed a profusion of flags today in honor of the birthday anniversary of Empress Augusta Victoria, who was born Oct. 22, 1858. The imperial family celebrated the day with a large gathering at the palace. One of the features of the entertainment was the singing of Miss Geraldine.

STOLEN TO FEED FAMILY; FRIENDS COME TO HIS AID

When S. D. Hyndman Shows He Forged Checks to Buy Food Court Suspends His Sentence; Money Raised.

Because his sole purpose in forging checks was to obtain food for his wife and children and pay the rent of the apartments, S. D. Hyndman, a bookkeeper, received his liberty on a suspended sentence from Judge Tazewell in the municipal court today. Numerous friends of his wife, including Rev. E. S. Bollinger, pastor of the Highland Congregational church, and Attorney R. C. Nelson, came to his assistance and the money obtained by the fraudulent checks was returned.

Hyndman recently lost his position and was unable to obtain another, and when he was finally reduced to serious financial straits, he accepted the only work he could obtain that of forging checks. He was unable to stand the physical test and in desperation he passed three checks on local people. One was for \$7, another for \$12 and a third for \$35. When the checks were returned from the banks the victims went to the district attorney's office and secured warrants for Hyndman's arrest. He was taken into custody Tuesday evening and being unable to furnish bail was held in the county jail pending trial.

Wednesday Mrs. Hyndman, and the two children were evicted from the Ononta apartments on Seventeenth street because she was unable to pay the rent. She is a refined and educated woman and has numerous friends in the city who were prompt in coming to her assistance when her rights became known. Attorney Nelson became interested in the case and took Mrs. Hyndman to Deputy District Attorney Hennessy, who agreed to recommend mercy to the court in view of the unfortunate circumstances of the family, providing the prosecuting witnesses were appeased.

Rev. Mr. Bollinger and Nelson yesterday contributed some of the money necessary and the remainder was raised among other friends and members of the Highland church. The sums obtained by the bogus checks were repaid and the prosecutors declared they would gladly recommend leniency to the court. Rev. Mr. Bollinger and Attorney Nelson were in court today to plead in behalf of Hyndman and Judge Tazewell granted him his freedom when the prosecutor refrained from criminal practices in the future.

"Hyndman is not at all a bad man," said Rev. Mr. Bollinger, "and I know that he has only been unfortunate. He has been very good to his wife and children."

NORTHEAST CLUB CRITICIZES ACTS OF PORT COMMISSION

Improvement Ass'n Adopts Resolutions Condemning Officials for Fighting Broadway Bridge.

The Port of Portland, because the subject of boating regulations which were unanimously and enthusiastically adopted at a largely attended meeting of the Northeast Improvement association last night. The port's "star-chamber" session of last Monday was condemned. The commission itself was termed "arrogant, obnoxious and arbitrary body."

The removal from office was advocated and approved. The text of the resolutions follows: "Whereas, the Port of Portland, at a special meeting held Tuesday, October 18, adopted a resolution expressing opposition to the construction of the Broadway bridge and...

"Whereas, the Broadway bridge was authorized by the vote of the people, approved by the taxpayers and demanded by the united voice of the people of the east side and of almost the entire city, and...

"Whereas, the city authorities are exerting every effort to hasten the proceedings to bring about a speedy building of the bridge in order to relieve an intolerable congestion of traffic across the Willamette river, the result of the rapid growth of population and...

"Resolved, That we denounce these star chamber meetings at this late hour, without notice to the people, and at the behest of the avowed enemies of the bridge, and in view of the statement of the attorney for the obstructionists in the supreme court at Salem on Thursday that the Port of Portland would never permit the construction of the Broadway bridge, the said star chamber meeting appears to this body as a part of the program of the shameful conspiracy to defeat the will of the people and that the people of this city should take immediate steps to relieve itself from being further burdened by this arrogant, obnoxious and arbitrary body."

San Francisco Pulls For Show

California Metropolis Would Have Coast Cities Aid Panama Exposition.

San Francisco has sent a request to the Portland Chamber of Commerce asking that all possible pressure be brought to bear to get the government to indorse San Francisco as the place for the holding of the Panama exposition in commemoration of the opening of the big ditch in 1915.

New Orleans is trying hard for the honor and San Francisco needs all the assistance it can get from the various coast cities. The chambers of commerce have already gone on record in favor of San Francisco.

The communication received this morning states that what is really desired is for business firms to write to their connections in the east asking for their moral support. And this may be done with very little inconvenience by addressing the congressional committee, 718 Merchants Exchange building, San Francisco, which will get out circular letters and mail them to any number of names that may be furnished in the east.

Last Saturday the Oregon & Washington Lumber Manufacturers' association went on record in favor of San Francisco and a great many letters have already been sent out by lumber manufacturing firms in this city to customers in the east.

San Francisco is regarded as entitled to the exposition for many reasons and especially because of the hard test it was put to during the fire and the subsequent unparalleled energy in rebuilding the city.

WOMAN TELLS HOW GEORGIA WENT "DRY"

"How Georgia Went Dry" was the subject of a stirring address delivered at the First M. E. church last night by Mrs. Mary Harris Armour.

"What we want is Christians who will do things," she declared. "I hate the liquor traffic. I was born to hate it and I have contempt for any one who believes in drinking liquor or who believes that it will make Oregon greater by drinking red liquor."

Mrs. Armour told of the stirring days that were passed through during the Georgia fight to oust the saloons. She recommended as effective a fight for Oregon. That it is a woman's province to get out and fight against the saloon as an enemy of her home and the homes of all other women, was another of Mrs. Armour's assertions. She played the Oregon Home-Rule association, declaring it to be organized for the liquor interests. She ended with an appeal to the people to fight for temperance.

LABORERS SENT ON WILD CHASE

Vancouver, B. C., Made Dumping Ground by Grafters Working at Seattle.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 22.—Some labor agency grafters in Seattle seem to be reaping a harvest from foreign laborers at the expense of a few promises of sure and steady work in Vancouver.

For some time heads from Seattle have been dumping in Vancouver each day batches of six or more laborers, principally Austrians, who have been induced to come here on the promise that they would be met at the docks and at once conducted to jobs. On Wednesday the largest bunch arrived, 20 in all, and these, like the others which came before, found nothing doing so far as work was concerned.

The men all say they have been promised jobs by labor agents in Seattle. Instead of this they have been paying their good money for the information, and fare to this city, besides.

SUFFRAGE WORKER TO SPEAK IN VANCOUVER

Portland people who are interested in woman's suffrage will have an opportunity to hear Miss Jeannette Rankin, who is one of the leaders in the equal suffrage campaign being waged in Washington, talk on the advantages of the equal franchise in Vancouver tonight.

Miss Rankin is a western girl who has made a close study of sociological problems, and has done a great deal of able settlement work in New York, San Francisco and other of the larger cities. She has been one of the leaders in the fight being made in Washington by the Washington Equal Franchise society and has made addresses in many Washington cities. Her subject will be "Women's Need of Suffrage." She will discuss it largely from the sociological standpoint.

The meeting will be held in the auditorium in Vancouver. Stanton Warburton, candidate for congress from the Tacoma district, and Glenn Ranke of Tacoma, will also address the meeting.

60 PERSONS PERISH IN WRECK ON BRAZIL COAST

Rio de Janeiro, Oct. 22.—Forty-five passengers and 15 members of the crew of the steamship Walley were drowned off Para in a terrific south Atlantic storm that raged yesterday. Word was received here today that 75 passengers and crew had been rescued. The vessel was a total loss.

Prince Francis Dies. London, Oct. 22.—Prince Francis of Teck, brother of Queen Mary, died today of pleurisy. Recently the prince underwent two surgical operations.

Retirement of Lieutenant Barney. Washington, D. C., Oct. 22.—First Lieutenant James P. Barney, until recently on duty with the Eighth Cavalry at Fort Huachuca, Arizona, was placed on the retired list today. Lieutenant Barney is from Ohio and served as first lieutenant of the Third United States Volunteer engineers during part of the Philippine insurrection.

CAZADERO LINE TO BE EXTENDED BY P. R. L. & P. CO.

Three and Half Miles of Track to Be Built, Tapping Rich Timber and Agricultural Country.

The Portland Railway, Light & Power Co. will extend its Cazadero line three and a half miles as quickly as the work can be done. This was announced by President B. E. Josselyn, who returned last night from a trip to the Atlantic coast cities. It was planned to eventually make an extension, but at a conference between President Josselyn and the directors of the company at Philadelphia it was concluded to proceed at once.

The extension will tap a rich body of timber and open a lot of desirable land, and it will also give transportation facilities to the new power plant being built by the company above the ones now furnishing power.

Mr. Josselyn started east about four weeks ago, ostensibly for the purpose of placing his son in school, but he also attended the annual convention of the National Street Railway Men's convention in Atlantic City, spending a week at that place. Other cities visited by Mr. Josselyn were New York, Boston and Baltimore. He found the climate quite different from that in Oregon, and says people do not realize the comforts of the Oregon climate until they get away for a while. On the Atlantic coast he found the humidity very great and oppressive.
