

PHONE COMPANY REPORTS TO CITY

First Concern to Comply With Charter Provision That Corporations File Report.

The first quarterly report ever submitted to the city by the Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph company was received this morning by City Auditor Barbur. This report is made in compliance with a charter provision that all public service corporations shall file such information with the city. The city auditor mailed blank forms several months ago to all corporations. This report is also the first of these to be received.

The report covers the months ending June 30, 1910. The operating revenues are noted to be \$211,639, and the operating expenses \$168,056. The report states there are 316 shareholders, and 180,000 shares. The assessed valuation of the local branch of the company for this year is \$774,455 on personal property, and \$100,150 on real estate. The report further gives the organization to have been in December, 1906, under the laws of California.

The service, including number of telephones and receipts for the same, for this quarter is as follows:

Business telephones—One party, 2098; \$11,399; two party, 3022; \$52,239; four party, 3184; \$17,897; 10 party, 133; \$1,037.

There were 7725 nickel-in-slot telephones used, and 478 private branch exchanges operated. The receipts for the former are not given, but the revenue from the latter was \$23,712. There are 53,647 miles of wire used in the city, and 14,846 poles.

The rates for service are not specified, and the company will be asked to submit this. W. J. Phillips, division commercial superintendent, filed the report for the company.

and after election, and in strictly limiting by known amount what may be spent and the manner of spending it.

"I believe that it should be unlawful for any lawmaking or other public servant to be employed by or to receive compensation from any interstate or public service corporation.

"I believe it should be unlawful for any lobbyist or other representative of any interest to advocate or oppose any measure to any legislator or legislative committee without first publicly registering his name, the nature of his compensation and the name of his employer.

Special Interests Out of Politics.

"I believe that the most pressing patriotic duty of today is to revive popular government by driving the special interests out of politics and that complete publicity of all the affairs of every interstate and public service corporation is necessary to that end.

"I believe that corporations have certain rights that should be respected, but they have no constitutional rights, powers or duties, and they should have no representatives in congress, in the cabinet or on the bench.

"I believe that the special interests through their control of politics and business, and principally by means of the tariff, are responsible for the exorbitant cost of living.

"I believe that the Payne-Aldrich tariff was made by the servants of special privilege for the benefit and according to the orders of their masters, and that when congress and the president enacted and approved it, over the just protest of the progressives, they broke faith with the people.

No Credit Due Administration.

"I believe that the credit for the good laws recently passed in congress belongs to the progressives of both parties, who amended bad bills in the public interest, rather than to the administration, which drafted and advocated the bad bills.

"I believe that the old party ties are slipping off; that the progressives of both parties are the true representatives of their parties.

"I believe that the people have lost confidence in congress because congress as a whole no longer represents the people, who elect it, but the special interests, who control it.

"I believe that Cannon and Aldrich and all they represent are passing away.

"National Power Best Safeguard."

"I believe the people will protect themselves against the special interests in state and nation alike, that they can best protect themselves by the power of the nation against corporations operating across state lines, and that the special interests must not be permitted to take refuge from all control by speciously raising the issue of state rights.

"I believe that our laws and institutions should be planned, made and changed solely as the necessities, advantages and difficulties of the people require, and not for the benefit of the special interests.

"I believe that the president, cabinet lawmakers, officials and judges all are the servants of the people; that they hold office for the benefit of no special class or political party, but solely for the benefit of the people, and that they may justly be held responsible by the people for what they do.

"I believe that our local, state and national governments can, and should be run as honestly and efficiently as any well managed private business.

Right to Natural Resources.

"I believe that the people have rights in all natural resources, even when privately owned, and that these resources must be managed and used not for private advantage alone, but likewise so as to promote and not endanger the common good. These which still remain in the hands of the people should be kept there and should be developed and administered for the benefit of us all.

"I believe that no man has a right to waste or freely monopolize any necessary of life, like coal, timber, water power or oil, and that the people have the right and duty to prevent the wasteful or destructive use of any natural resource.

"I believe that this should be a government by men for human welfare, and not a government by money for profit, and that it is better to help a poor man make a living than to help a rich man make more money.

"The foregoing statement is not my own confession of belief. It does not cover all the ground of my political creed. I have not attempted to state

my platform, but rather the position which I believe the largest number of voters throughout the country hold today.

Before the luncheon it was planned that Congressman Denby should introduce Pinchot. It was suddenly remembered that Denby was a member of the Ballinger investigating committee and that he had voted against Pinchot. A hasty change of plan was made and President Larned of the board of commerce presented the former chief forester to his auditors.

The situation has become acute and a general strike is threatened unless the demands of the strikers are granted by the companies. The latter informed the governor that they could operate their wagons with plenty of men if they could be assured of protection by the authorities.

Rioting began within a few minutes after the drivers walked out. Non-union teamsters who took the places of the strikers were dragged from the wagons and terribly beaten, while the horses were turned loose to care for themselves.

Rioters blocked all approaches to the Grand Central station, where most of the express wagons were congregated when the strike was declared. Hand to hand fights were common occurrences. Express traffic was almost completely paralyzed and the companies were unable to get their wagons and teams into the barns in many cases. Many were injured.

Leaders of the strike, while denying responsibility for the disturbances, declare they will accept no defeat, but will fight relentlessly until their demands are granted.

Eight wagons leaving the Wells-Fargo station in Jersey City were attacked by a mob of strikers shortly after noon. The drivers were forced to abandon their wagons and were knocked down and trampled upon by the mob. Sixteen injured, nearly all strikers, were taken across the river to a Manhattan hospital for treatment.

A wagon was attacked at Fifth avenue and Forty-sixth street, New York, by a small crowd of strikers and their sympathizers, and after the driver had been stoned and the horses unhitched, the wagon was overturned. A similar disturbance took place at Madison avenue and Forty-second street. The police interfered here, and the drivers galloped

back to the stable, where they abandoned their outfit.

Injuries received in riots throughout the night and early today. The ruins of a dozen express wagons lie in the streets and the police seem powerless to prevent disorder.

In spite of the assertion of Mayor Witt Ford and Chief Monahan that strike disturbances are repressed, Governor Fort is considering the advisability of calling out troops.
