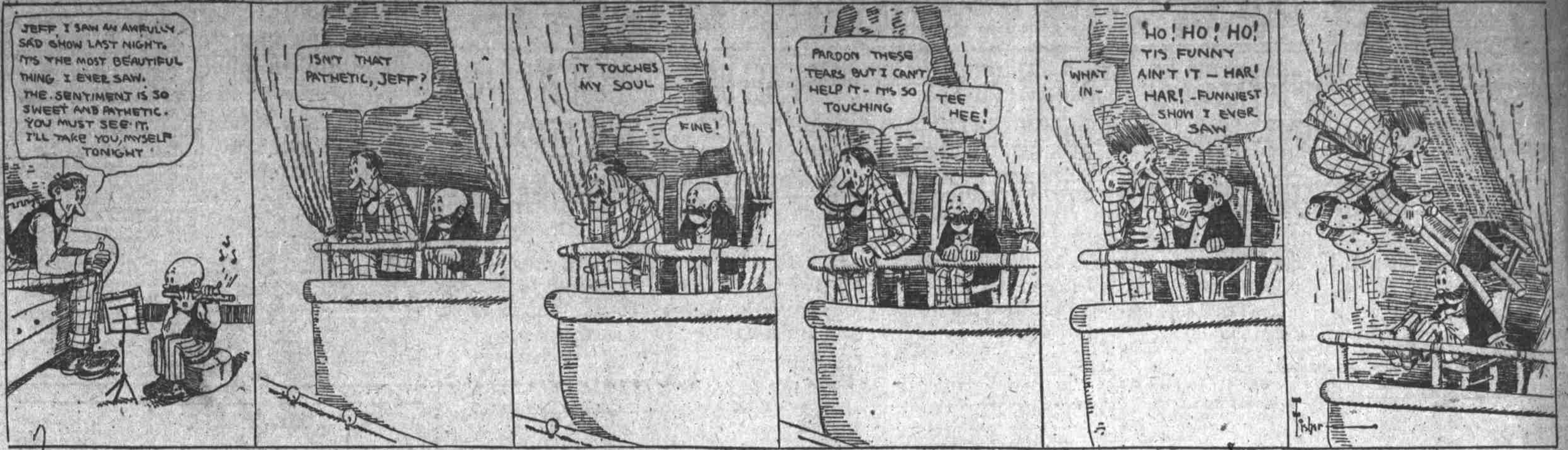


MUTT TAKES JEFF TO SEE A VERY, VERY PATHETIC SHOW--By "Bud" Fisher

WOZZY SPELLS PUT
BEAVERS TO QUEERRun Crazy on Bases and
Make Miscues in Fielding
the Ball.

Los Angeles, Oct. 29.—Portland came within an ace of trimming the Angels again yesterday in a rally in the ninth inning that just fell short of tying up the game. Two close decisions went against the northerners which might have turned the tide earlier in the game. Seaton started the twirling for the Oregonians, but was relieved by Garrett in the eighth, after Menon batted for him in the first half.

Los Angeles made a run in the first inning. Kennedy singled and went to second on Hallinan's sacrifice. Kennedy scored when Olson bungled Delmas' drive and that worthy reached third. Del was nailed at the plate, when Orendorff hit to Seaton, and Delhi closed the affair by flying to Krueger. Poor baserunning spoiled a chance for a Portland gain in the third inning. Ort fanned, but Fisher and Seaton singled and Olson walked. Fisher was caught at the plate on Casey's grounder to Howard. Orendorff made a couple of bluffs to catch Casey at first and draw Seaton off third, whence he was easy on Orendorff to Hallinan to Orendorff.

In the fourth inning Krueger singled and took second on Ryan's out, but was caught at the plate trying to score on Sheehan's single.

Error Helped Angels.
Los Angeles made the winning run in the sixth inning. Rapp's miscue allowed Bernard a life. Bernard took second on Howard's out, Sheehan to Rapps, and went to third when Smith and Kennedy walked. Bernard scored on Hallinan's out. Casey to Rapps. Olson and Rapps disposed of Delmas.

In the ninth inning, after Casey had singled to Bernard, Krueger walked and Ryan singled. Delmas' error allowed Rapps to reach first. Rapps forced Sheehan at second, but Krueger registered on the out. Ryan also tried to score on this same play, but Delmas, who had taken Rapps' grounder from Howard, caught Ryan by an eyelash, and the jig was off. Score:

WASHINGTON PUTS

Washington high school's frisky football team took a long stride toward the championship of the Interscholastic Football league by trimming Portland academy yesterday, 16 to 5, in one of the most interesting games yet played among the "preps."

Washington won on experience and weight combined with the excellent coaching of Virgil Earl, who seems to have it on the other athletic coaches in turning out winning teams in the different branches of sports fostered by the schools.

Portland academy outclassed the east siders in the forward pass department of the game. Time and again Cobb, Reed, Edwards and Miller would get away with some bit of particularly daring work that netted good sized gains. These players form a brainy quartet and were the on a better team they would work havoc with their opponents. The Portland academy line was a trifle light and that accounted for the large gains made by the trans-Willamette eleven.

Cason did the kicking for the Washington high school and came off second best to Reed, who booted the pigskin in the absence of Small, the regular kicker. Cornell stood out as a bruish feller on the east side eleven. He was a star at running back punts and ran the team in heady style.

Washington scored in the first, second and fourth quarters, getting only one goal out of the three touchdowns. A forward pass was responsible for the touchdown made by them.

LIND GETS CONTRACT

TO LAY SEWER PIPE

Cement sewer pipe will be used in the Riverside sewer district. The executive board yesterday afternoon awarded the contract to William Lind for \$132,095. This is the first large contract let for the use of cement pipe, as terra cotta or vitrified pipe have been used in the past.

George Gordon, bidder for vitrified pipe, created a ripple in the sewer committee of the board by asking that all bids be rescinded and the contractors asked to rebid. He had figured his bid on vitrified pipe, although the specifications called for cement. The committee decided he made a mistake by figuring on the wrong plans and would lose his bid.

The fight between the cement and terra cotta interests has been long and at many points very bitter. Cement pipe is a trifle cheaper, but some contend it is inferior. The estimate of the engineer on this sewer district is \$141,161.

Because of a difference of opinion between the United States weather bureau and the forest service over the effect of forests on the water supplied rivers the two will join in a series of investigations which are expected to last about 18 years.

DR. OGLESBY WANTS
NEW NESMITH COUNTY

Dr. W. W. Oglesby, one of the oldest and leading citizens of Lane county, and health officer of Cottage Grove, in which town he has lived for a number of years, is in Portland for a few days. Dr. Oglesby takes an active part in politics.

Dr. Oglesby champions the creation of the proposed Nesmith county, by cutting off a slice from the southern portion of Lane and a small portion off northern Douglas, his opinion being, after years of observation, that the interests of all the taxpayers concerned would be benefited by the change.

"Certain Eugene people are grossly misrepresenting the Nesmith county proposition," Dr. Oglesby explained. They are telling in Portland and elsewhere that the proposed line runs only four miles from Eugene. This is absolutely false; it runs about nine miles from Eugene.

"The people of Eugene have never given us anything. We have had no voice in the administration of county affairs. They turn us down as repeatedly as if we were people of a foreign nation. All we want them to do is to tell the truth. Then if they win out, it will be all right; we will take our medicine."

Under the existing conditions we are far from the county seat and are taxed heavily to support the Eugene ring. We have a population of 8000 in the proposed county, have 500 children in school in Cottage Grove and believe it would be better for the entire population of Lane county to make the division. No doubt our taxes would be reduced.

"Eugene objects because we have the wealth up our way and they want us to help build their courthouse and support the ring. By the ring I do not mean any particular party, but have reference to the old county administration."

"What I want is for the boys to play fair and tell the truth. They may beat us, but I want them to play fair."

PREVENTS TELEGRAPHER
FROM KILLING SELF

Prompt action by a patron of the Hotel Drexel bar at Second and Yamhill streets last night saved Elliott Craig, a telegraph operator, aged 32, from an apparent attempt at suicide, and he was afterward turned over to the police in order to prevent a second attempt.

Craig had lifted a two-ounce bottle of chloroform to his lips and appeared about to drink the contents when one of the men in the well filled barroom took in the situation at a glance and leaped toward Craig. With a swift blow he struck the bottle from his hand and to the floor.

Another man in the place ran to the street for an officer and found Patrolman Quinton as he was on his way home. Quinton found Craig sitting in the saloon with his head on his hands and moaning loudly. He refused to say anything to the patrolman or to other officers at police headquarters.

Craig had recovered his power of speech when arraigned in municipal court this morning and denied that he had tried to end his life. He declared he had a toothache yesterday and had taken some cocaine and alcohol to relieve it. The charges against him were dismissed, as Quinton was willing to drop prosecution.
