opening performance of her American tour.

national Brotherhood of Teamsters will meet today to decide whether a sympathetic strike shall be called in New York. If the leaders decide to take their men from the wagons, vehicle traffic in

Greater New York will be paralyzed.
It is generally believed today that the council intends to come to the aid of the expressmen. It is said the decision, which was expected last night, was postponed in order to allow further organization. Organizers representing the various locals affected by the possible order are busy today and merchants and wholesalers in New York are preparing for the expected emergency.

New Scale Prepared.

In the meantime the International union is preparing a new monthly wage scale to be demanded in the principal cities of the United States. The scale calls for \$30 monthly for route drivers; \$70 for transfer men; \$85 for drivers of wagons without helpers; \$50 for chauffeurs; \$55 for first helpers and \$50 for other helpers. The scale calls for a work day of not to exceed 11 hours and no Sunday work.

A committee of the striking drivers today told Health Commissioner Tederle that they would permit the unloading of 10,000 cases of perishable goods and their distribution among the consumers.

A committee of strikers also called on Mayor Gaynor and protested against using policemen as guards on express wagons driven by strikebreakers.
The platform men of the express companies struck today and strikebreakers are being sought to fill their places. About 400 wagons were moved up to noon.

Platform Men Out.

There was little disorder during the morning, but the going out of the platform men was evidently a blow to the express companies, and they endeavored to operate today by making the strikebreaking teamsters and helpers do double duty, by working on the platforms as well as on the wagons. Jeering strikers and their sympathizers stood as near the express depots as the police would permit and taunted the strikebreakers.

The departure of each wagon loaded with police guards was greeted with jeers from the crowd but there was no attempt to stop the wagons.
