Gold medal banners and special prizes will be awarded to the best collection of apples grown on irrigated and non-irrigated lands exhibited by Commercial clubs, associations, unions, counties or districts. Any number of varieties may be entered. There is no restriction on the number of apples used and the judging will take into consideration the general arrangement, attractiveness, pack, varieties, condition and color.

These entries are exclusive of those competing in the carload and other classes for prizes and premiums of a total of \$20,000. The judging will begin on November 14 and it is expected to complete the work in time to announce the awards on November 17.

law. The legislatures enact the laws and while president of the state senate the opportunity was there for him to make these corrections.
The speaker then reviewed Bowerman's past activities as a legislator, showing how he had fought many laws that were for the welfare of the people, and would save the taxpayers money. He showed also how Bowerman left the president's chair in the senate and took the floor in behalf of the Mariner bill which attempted to legalize assemblies because its proponents knew that to hold an assembly would be against the law. He said how Bowerman said in that speech that he would rather vote for a man who had been nominated by a convention, than for one who had been nominated by the people.
The speaker told, further, how necessary it was to preserve the direct primary and the right to pledge members of the legislature to vote for the people's choice for United States senator. Mr. West's address was straightforward and delivered in so convincing a manner that the sincerity of the speaker was attested by every spoken word. He held his large audience with a breathless interest for a solid hour. The ovation tendered the candidate in Salem was one of the most enthusiastic ever given any speaker in this city.

USES OPPONENT'S PICTURE ON CARD

H. D. Reed of Southern Oregon Adopts Unique Plan of Campaigning.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Gold Hill, Or., Nov. 5.—Using his opponent's picture as a campaign argument against him is the unique device, just launched, by H. D. Reed, anti-assembly, Statement No. 1 candidate for joint representative from Jackson and Douglas counties against J. A. Buchanan, of Roseburg, assembly Republican candidate for reelection. It is a card bearing an excellent half tone cut of Mr. Buchanan and the legend, "This man tried to repeal Statement No. 1." The cut is surrounded by a border, all pointing inward at the assembly adherent.
The fact that Mr. Buchanan claims to believe in the direct primary and majority rule is contrasted with his record as a member of the last legislature which includes a vote for the despicable Mariner bill, which had for its purpose the legislating of the assembly, and the notorious Brooke-Bear bill, which proposed to make it a misdemeanor for any candidate to subscribe to Statement No. 1, together with his unenviable performance of introducing a bill to repeal Statement No. 1. Mr. Reed's friends here think that this card, circulated as it will be throughout the two counties, will effectively counteract Mr. Buchanan's claim that he is a friend of the direct primary.
Mr. Reed closes the card with the statement: "I am against the assembly and for Statement No. 1. I believe in a government of the people, by the people and for the people. Mr. Buchanan, his record shows, believes in a government of the people by the bosses—for the corporation."

LOS ANGELES FAVOR PANAMA-PACIFIC BONDS

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 5.—Constitutional amendments Nos. 22 and 23 will be supported at the polls Monday by members of the Merchants' and Manufacturers' association. At a meeting of the board of directors of that organization it was decided that the amendment providing for raising funds for the proposed Panama-Pacific exposition at San Francisco in 1915 were worthy of support, and by a clause of the resolution the votes of the citizens of Los Angeles were requested for their passage.

"WETS" VS. "DRYS" BATTLE AT SALEM

Mayorality Race in Primaries Proves to Be Warm Affair After All.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Nov. 5.—Primaries are being held this afternoon in the capital city for the purpose of nominating a mayor, city marshal, city treasurer, city recorder and seven councilmen. Though up to within five days before the primaries there were no apparent candidates for the mayorality, there has developed within the last few hours one of the warmest contests ever precipitated between the "wets" and the "drys" to capture the office in today's primaries. Louis Lachmund, hop buyer, and present member of the city council, is the "wet" candidate, and H. S. Gile is the "dry" candidate, though neither have openly expressed their sympathies and the liquor question has not been made an issue except in so far as the "wets" have rallied to the support of Lachmund and the "drys" to Gile, who is known to be a strong prohibitionist.
The only other contest in today's primaries is between Ira Hamilton and Walter Johnson for city marshal, or rather chief of police, as the aspirants prefer to dignify the office with that title rather than the correct one. In the contest for mayor all voters will have to write in the name on the blank ballot, as neither of the candidates came out sufficiently early to get on the primary ballot. The city election will be held Monday, December 5.

MARK SAMPLE BALLOT IN JOURNAL NOW TO SAVE TIME AT POLLS

The supply of sample ballots for distribution at the county clerk's office has proven far unequal to the demand, but readers of The Journal who have failed to secure one can obtain it by tearing out page 16 of today's Journal. This is an exact reproduction of the ballot to be voted in Portland. The state officers and the 22 measures at the bottom of the ballot are the same in all parts of the state.
Voters should study this ballot before going to the polls. By marking the sample ballot the way they wish to vote and taking this with them, they will be able to save much time on election day. Unless this is done, those unfamiliar with the amendments, in particular, will find themselves perplexed at times when they go to vote.

MAKE LAKES OF WASHINGTON IDEAL

Fish Protective Association to Remove Carp and Suckers From Fish Lakes.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Spokane, Wash., Nov. 5.—Officers of the Spokane Fish Protective association have perfected plans to remove the carp and suckers from the bass lakes in Spokane county and will then extend their operations to other parts of Washington. This is the first organized attempt to do this kind of work in the northwest, and it is expected that lake fishing will be greatly improved as a result.
Fish Trap lake will be the first one to be cleaned and then these lakes will be taken in the order named: Clear, Williams Silver and Newman, also all other lakes where the work can be done without expense. The anglers are enthusiastic over the plan and many of them have offered assistance in doing the work.
Al Wiesemann, secretary of the association, and Game Warden Uhlig will direct the work. The former said in an interview:

"It is certain that when the carp and suckers, both spawn-eaters, are removed from the lakes there will be a big increase in the number of eggs that will mature each year.
"The plan to be used by the association is to solicit the aid of the farmers and others owning land on the lakes and by the use of nets clean the lakes of the scavengers. The carp and suckers will be given to the farmers for fertilizer.
"It is planned to do the work without any expense either to the association or the property owners and from present indications there will be little trouble in securing the required help. The plan has been carried out successfully in the east and we believe it will work in the northwest.
"It will require several years to accomplish results in some of the lakes. The nets to be used by the association will be furnished by the state fish and game commission. It is planned to have the work completed in six weeks."

SWISS PROFESSOR ON OREGON PLAN

In Letter to Bourne Admits His Country's Popular Rule System Is Surpassed.

Washington, Nov. 5.—Senator Bourne has a letter from Professor C. F. Borgeme of the University of Geneva, Switzerland, saying:
"You are certainly, in your state, ahead of us Swiss in the matter of direct primaries, and I wish you to accept my hearty congratulations for the rapid steps which, under the lead of your friends and yourself, your state of Oregon has made toward the reality of that government of the people, the formula of which was once given to the world by your great leader, Lincoln."
Professor Borgeme goes on to say that he lectures at the University of Geneva on comparative constitutional law every year, and that he studies, with his classes, American institutions. He says he will seize the next opportunity, to refer to the Oregon laws before the students.

WINS GIRL, BUT GOES TO JAIL

G. H. Reed Impersonates Secret Service Operative to Make Hit With Friends.

G. H. Reed, the curly headed countryman who impersonated a United States secret service officer to win the love of a girl, pleaded guilty in the United States district court this morning and was sentenced by Judge Bean to serve three months in the county jail. Reed smiled and went back to his cell.
When Reed was arraigned his attorney said he had been guilty of no serious wrongdoing, the only advantage he had secured by his impersonation being an automobile stage trip worth \$150. He said he had posed as an officer in order to secure a position of favor with a woman and with his friends. The district attorney agreed the case wasn't serious, but insisted upon a severe enough sentence to restrain Reed from ever again posing as a member of the secret service.
Al Nathan, one of the alleged "white slavers" indicted by the grand jury yesterday, was arraigned and, through his attorney, C. W. Fulton, asked for an extension in which to plead. Mr. Fulton said Nathan was penniless and he had been secured by Astoria friends

of the accused man to defend him in court. The case was set for Thursday morning.

DR. GRANT GUILTY OF EVA SWAN MURDER

San Francisco, Nov. 5.—Dr. Robert Thompson, alias Grant, was convicted yesterday afternoon of murder in the second degree in having caused the death of Eva Swan which followed an illegal operation. The jury was out an hour and 20 minutes. Judge Dunn will sentence Thompson Monday.

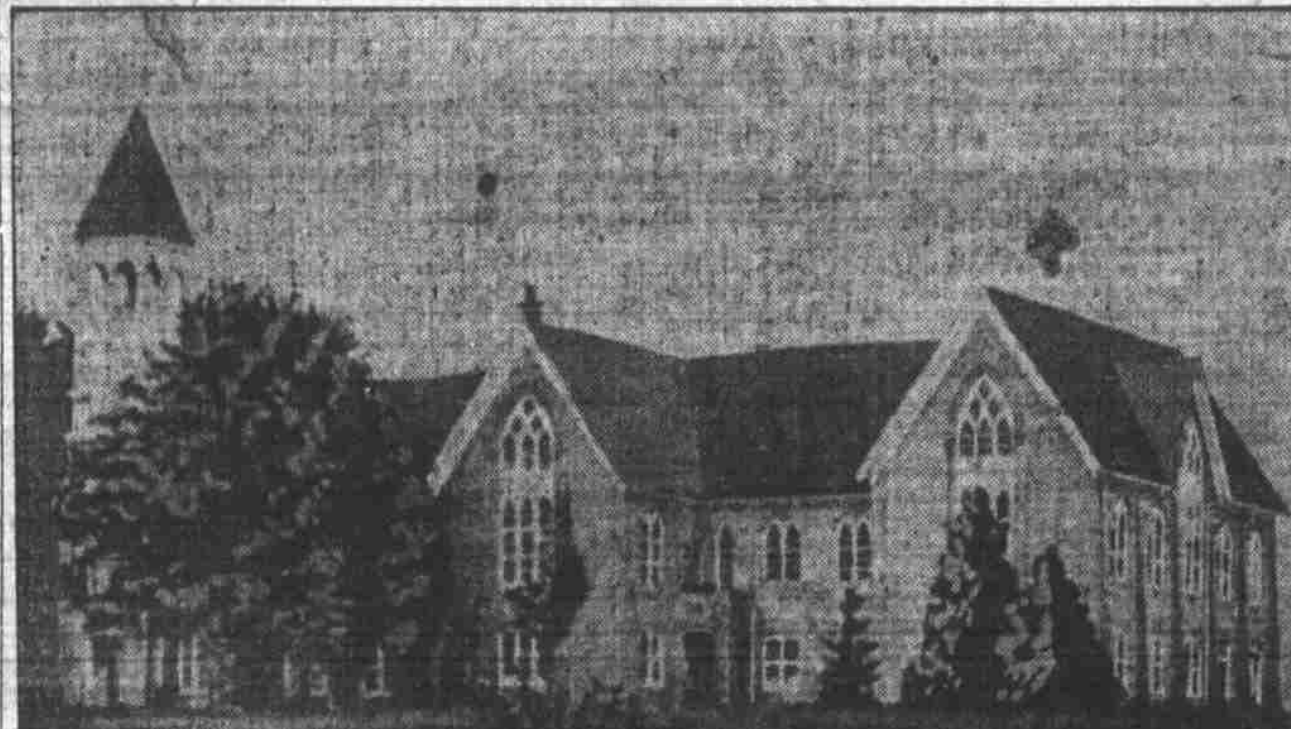
