

ACID IN HIS FACE; KNIFE OVER HEART

W. P. Rees at Los Angeles Is
Victim of Fiendish Assail-
ant Met in Darkness.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Los Angeles, Nov. 8.—His face hor-
ribly scarred and burned by carbolic
acid, thrown by an unidentified man,
and suffering from loss of blood re-
sulting from a knife wound above his
heart, W. P. Rees is in a critical con-
dition at the hospital. According to his
statement, Rees was attacked on Long
Beach avenue late last night. The acid
was hurled by a man who approached

him in the darkness. While he writhed
in pain the assailant struck him a ter-
rific blow with a knife.

Because of the darkness Rees did not
see the face of his assailant.

stylishly gowned woman emerged. The
woman had just telephoned "different
newspapers that Belle Elmore was in
Hammond, but refused to give her name.
The police are inclined to believe that
the note is valuable, although they are
investigating it.

PULLEY TO LIFT FAT PRISONER OUT OF WELL

South Pasadena, Cal., Nov. 8.—Deputy
Constables Johns and Waters are rig-
ging a block and tackle to be used to
arrest W. D. Browning, who weighs 300
pounds and who descends into a forty
foot well every time the officers appear

his home last night to arrest him he
walked to the well and calmly lowered
himself. From his retreat he enter-
tained the officers by singing, and
jeered at them because they could not
fulfill their mission.

YOUNG HUSBAND HELD ON MURDER CHARGE

Everett, Wash., Nov. 8.—Charles Kirk,
owner of a saloon at Monroe, is in the

county jail charged with murder, while
his bride of three days lies prostrated
at the new home of the young couple,
where Kirk was torn from his bride's
arms last night. Kirk is charged with
the murder of Charles Montross.

Montross was a shingle weaver, 22
years old. He had been attending a
public dance and left the hall shortly
after midnight yesterday morning. A
few minutes later a shot was heard and
Montross staggered, saying that he was
shot. He died in a few minutes. Mont-
ross' wife is in the east. His parents
live at Snohomish.
