

TO DEMONSTRATE MILK TO PUBLIC

Prof. Pernot Will Make Tests of Portland's Supply Before Consumers' League.

Peculiar features connected with Portland's milk as shown by scientific tests will be demonstrated by Professor Emile F. Pernot, bacteriologist to the state board of health, before the annual meeting of the Consumers' League in the convention hall of the Commercial club at 3 p. m. tomorrow. This pure food committee of the Consumers' League has furnished Professor Pernot with a great number of samples of the milk that is being sold from wagons, in milk depots and from house to house in Portland. His tests of these have produced some results that may prove to be sensational. As the women who compose the Consumers' League purpose to commit the organization more completely during the year to come to the cause of bettering the milk supply of Portland, and as definite plans for carrying on the work will be announced tomorrow, the meeting promises to be the most important ever held by the organization. There will also be other features of the meeting which will be of unusual interest, it is said. An invitation has been extended to the public to attend that part of the meeting which has particularly to do with public welfare.

Texas, November 3. Rodriguez had confessed that he had murdered Mrs. Lena Henderson and was taken from the authorities and hanged by a mob. The lynching has caused bitter feeling.

ing in Mexico and was made the excuse for several anti-American demonstrations. The first serious outbreak occurred Tuesday night, when students in the colleges here held meetings and denounced American civilization and attacked the United States government for allowing the lynching to occur. Americans were jeered in the streets and rioting became general.

Anti-Government Leaders Join.
Yesterday the outbreak took on a more serious form. Crowds, still led by students, formed and the demonstration against the Americans took the form of attacks against them and attempted destruction of property. The rioters marched through the streets, jeering Americans and hurling stones at the windows of stores owned by Americans. Personal encounters between Americans and the crowds that followed the marchers occurred.

Anti-government leaders took a hand in the demonstration and several newspaper offices were attacked. The Mexican Herald was stoned and El Imparcial, the government organ, was made the object of another attack. The plant of the latter paper was considerably damaged and some of its employees injured.

The authorities today believe that this phase of the outbreak was engineered by anti-government agitators. Seeing an American flag floating over a shop owned by a citizen of the United States, the marching rioters made a dash for it and tore it from its staff. The flag was insulted and torn to bits, the crowd carrying pieces of it through the streets and to the statue of the iron horse, in Juarez avenue, where speeches denouncing the United States were made. Americans were stoned as they passed the meeting place and the street car carrying the school children was stoned.

The situation today is admittedly grave. The federal government has taken a hand. Governor Landu y Escandon of the federal district in which the city of Mexico is situated, has intimated his sympathy with the rioters. Chief of Police Diaz, a nephew of the president, is said to have followed the rioters about, but made little effort to check their demonstrations.

Americans in Terror.
The foreign office was the scene of one of the riots. The crowd assembled there to protest against the Rodriguez incident, and from the steps of the building fiery anti-American speeches were delivered. The American ambassador has protested vigorously against this.

Further representations were made to the government today by the American embassy, and it is said that assurances that further rioting would be suppressed have been given. Americans here, however, fear that the demonstrations will be resumed and that the rioters may be permitted to attack the property of Americans.

The local American colony is greatly excited and fears expressed that a renewal of the outbreak may come.

UNFORTUNATE COOLNESS BETWEEN GOVERNMENTS THREATENS DIFFICULTY

Washington, Nov. 10. Conference at the state department over the anti-

American outbreak in the City of Mexico was held today. The Mexican ambassador, Don Francisco Leon de la Barra, hurried to the department today and was closeted for a long time with Secretary Knox. The ambassador assured Secretary Knox that the Mexican government would deal firmly with the situation. One object of the visit was to confer with the secretary concerning the Rodriguez incident.

De la Barra made strong representations to the state department at the time of the lynching of the Mexican in Texas. He asked Knox today what the United States government had done toward punishing the men who were responsible for the burning of Rodriguez.

The situation has caused considerable worry to the officials of the state department. It is known that Mexico is not at all inclined to apologize for the police outbreak, asserting that the lynching of one Leon de la Barra was the real cause of the difficulties, and that the United States has taken no steps to punish the lynchers. Since this is the cause of the trouble, the Mexican government has intimated that Mexico can only prevent further disorders until the United States has shown a willingness to make reparation for the original wrong.

Behind the present unpleasant incident and the outbreaks in Mexico there is a coolness between the two governments that has supplanted the former friendliness.

The revolution in Nicaragua is really responsible for the widening breach between the two republics. It is asserted. When President Zelaya fled from Nicaragua he was received by the Mexican government, was frequently received personally by President Diaz, and was given refuge until he was prepared to flee to Europe. At the time Mexico was perfectly well aware, it is asserted, that Zelaya was considered an enemy of the United States. He was charged with having murdered two American citizens, Groce and Cannon, and the United States government had shown a friendliness toward Provisional President Estrada, who was leading the revolutionary forces in Nicaragua.

Enrique C. Creel, former ambassador from Mexico to the United States, now foreign minister to Mexico, was as a special representative of President Diaz to confer with the secretary of state in Washington regarding the Nicaraguan situation. It was reported at the time, and never denied by either government, that Creel came with a plan for settling the dispute in Nicaragua, and that it was not accepted by the United States. Mexico, however, was fully informed of the attitude of the United States, and knew that Zelaya was not in favor of the American government. The fact that he was allowed to remain so long in Mexico was considered an indication that Mexico was inclined to regard the decision of the United States as unfriendly. Since then, it is said, the former cordial relations between the two governments have not obtained, and this complicates the present situation.

At the recent annual convention of the National Master Horsehoopers' association at Grand Rapids, Mich., William E. Murphy of Philadelphia was elected president and Atlantic City, N. J., was chosen as the next meeting place.

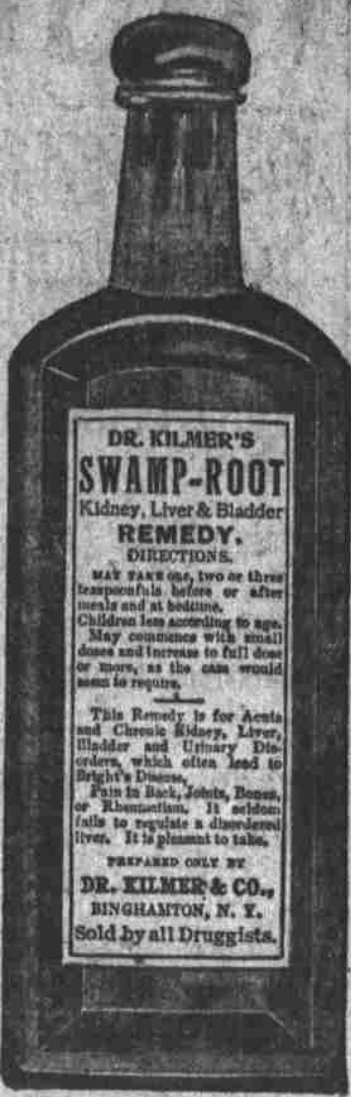
