

PENDLETON LAW FIRM MAY GET A JUDICIAL PLUM

Phelps and Steiwer in Line for the Circuit Judgeship and Also for the Office of Prosecuting Attorney.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Pendleton, Or., Nov. 12.—"Who is to be the next circuit judge of the sixth judicial district and who is to be the next prosecuting attorney?" These are the two questions which are now foremost in the minds of local political leaders as a result of the elec-

tion of Circuit Judge H. J. Bean to the supreme bench. According to a street rumor, the law firm of Phelps & Steiwer seems to be in line to land both positions if it so desired. It is generally understood that Judge Bean will resign his present office just before January 1, on which day he will take the oath as a member of the state supreme court. It will then devolve upon Governor Benson or his substitute, Acting Governor Jay Bowerman, to name his successor. That the naming of his successor will not be left to West, the incoming Democrat, is a foregone conclusion.

Phelps Can Have Job. It is also understood that District Attorney Phelps can have the circuit judgeship for the asking. This is by reason of the fact that Phelps was an active supporter of the candidacy of Bowerman in the primary as well as in the general campaign, whereas J. P. Winter, the other local Republican candidate, was not an active supporter of Bowerman during the primary struggle. Whether or not Phelps will ask for the plum for himself or for his friend, Congressman W. R. Ellis, is a question as yet unanswered to the satisfaction of the public. The impression prevails, however, that Phelps will take the position himself.

Other Candidates. If Phelps is made judge a vacancy will be left in the district attorneyship and as Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Frederick Steiwer is a candidate for the position and as he stumped a part of the state in behalf of Bowerman during the campaign just closed, the general consensus of opinion seems to be that he is in line for promotion. There will be other candidates, however, and some of these may arise to sidetrack the aspirations of the present deputy.

DANISH OFFICIAL CARRIED TO HULL

British Foreign Office Must Explain Unwarranted Conduct of English Skipper.

(Publisher Press Landed Wire.) Copenhagen, Nov. 12.—The British foreign office may have a pretty hard nut to crack when the Danish government asks for an explanation of the practical kidnapping of M. Bjaeresson, a magistrate and revenue officer of Patrickfjord, who went on board the trawler *Chiefain*, of Hull, in order to seize it for fishing within the territorial waters of Ireland.

The captain of the trawler threatened to carry the magistrate off to England, and, as a matter of fact, left shortly afterwards, with the official on board, carrying him to Hull. M. Bjaeresson has laid his complaint before the government and an explanation will be asked, together with punishment for the kidnapping English skipper.

Empress Directs Rescue. During a violent storm recently the Empress Marie of Russia, while waiting for her sister, Queen Alexandra, in the garden of the Villa Hvidovre, near Copenhagen, noticed a fisherman in a

small boat stranded in a most perilous position on a sand-bank. The Empress instantly waved her handkerchief to the castaway, to show him that he had been observed, and quickly called two men to give help.

The royal launch, which was lying at the pier in the Villa Hvidovre garden, was taken out by the two men, who succeeded in rescuing the fisherman under the eyes of the Queen and the Empress.

Both the royal ladies watched the rescue with anxiety, and when it was completed the Empress expressed her great joy that the castaway had been saved. The fisherman an old man who did not know who the two ladies were, was greatly surprised when he was informed that it was the Danish King's two sisters who had sent help to him.

King and Queen Change Residence. The King and Queen of Denmark have left the Castle of Charlottenlund after a residence of four months, and they will spend the next few weeks at Fredensborg, the royal domain on Lake Esrom. This picturesque chateau is surrounded by extensive beech forests, in which the Emperor Alexander II liked to hunt by moonlight.

King Christian and Queen Louise for many years received a large family party at Fredensborg every autumn, but these gatherings were discontinued after the death of the last tsar in 1894. The Empress Marie and Queen Alexandra are expected at Fredensborg on a strictly private visit.

Kink Frederick will shortly leave Copenhagen to visit Austria and Hungary. Afterwards he will proceed to Paris, where he will meet his brother, King George of Greece.

Recently the Scandinavian Press has published various rumors to the effect that the abdication of the King of Greece is about to be announced. It was added that his majesty's palace at Copenhagen was being prepared for his reception.

From an authoritative source I learn that these reports are entirely void of foundation. As a matter of fact, the King's palace is let for the next three years, and his relatives and friends here all deny that he has any intention of abdicating.

BOY OF 21 GIVEN BACK WIFE OF 72

Hartford, Conn., Nov. 12.—A decision of the Connecticut supreme court frees Mrs. Lucinda M. Cushman Treat Goddard, 72 years old, of her conservator and gives her the right to live as the wife of Charles M. Goddard, the 21-year-old Yale law student, who married her two years ago.

Her son protested that she was mentally incapable of managing her affairs. He said his mother dressed in a youthful fashion, wearing low-neck dresses and merry widow hats and used paints and cosmetics on her face.

VANCOUVER WOMAN GOES TO CLAIM BIG FORTUNE
