

NEW APARTMENTS
TO BE READY SOON

Handsome \$25,000 Home to
Be Built in Cedar Hill Addi-
tion for J. R. Bowles.

Architect Lewis I. Thompson announces that the five story apartment house under construction at the south-east corner of Thirteenth and Jefferson streets, for the Reed Institute will be ready for occupancy within the next 60 days. The walls of the building are up and the roof on, and a large force of workmen are now at work on the interior.

The building will contain 26, four and five-room apartments, all equipped with the most modern and up-to-date apartment house conveniences. It will cost approximately \$75,000.

Architect Emil Schacht and Son have completed plans and specifications for a \$25,000 residence which is to be erected on Cactus Drive in Cedar Hill addition for J. R. Bowles, president of the Northwest Bridge Works. The building will be two stories with attic and basement and will contain besides attic and basement apartments, nine large rooms. Brick will be used on the wall of the first story and for the porch columns and balustrades. The upper story and gable will be done in what is known as the English half-timbered effect. It is to be 52x72 foot base. Hardwood will be used in the floors of both stories except in the kitchen and bathrooms where the floors will be compressed cork. All of the interior finish of the first floor will be done in hardwood, oak, mahogany and janazire. The bedrooms of the second floor will be finished in white enamel.

Architect A. C. Ewart is getting up a design for a three story brick apartment house to be erected on Hoyt street near Twenty-second by George A. Houseman. In ground dimensions the building will be 58x74 feet. It will contain 18 suites of two, three and four rooms each. The exterior walls will be done in pressed brick. A feature of the design is the large colonial entrance porch which will have the effect of making it one of the most attractive structures of its kind in the city. All of the apartments will be equipped with built-in refrigerators, wall beds, electric fireless cookers and automatic dumb-waiters. A passenger elevator will also be installed.

Honolulu the Beautiful

Interesting Talk With a Well
Known Traveler and Writer.

Charlton B. Perkins, author of several books on travel, his latest being "From the Grandeur of the East to the Majesty of the West," is a visitor in Portland. Mr. Perkins is a very interesting talker as well as writer. Yesterday he entertained a large number of friends who contemplate joining the Honolulu excursion, with an interesting description of Hawaii, its beauty, spots and the customs and habits of the natives. In the course of his talk he said:

"To my mind no better place could have been chosen as the destination of the 'Aloha' excursion, for, as Mark Twain said of Hawaii, 'No alien lands in all the world has such deep, strong charm for the visitor as that one.'"

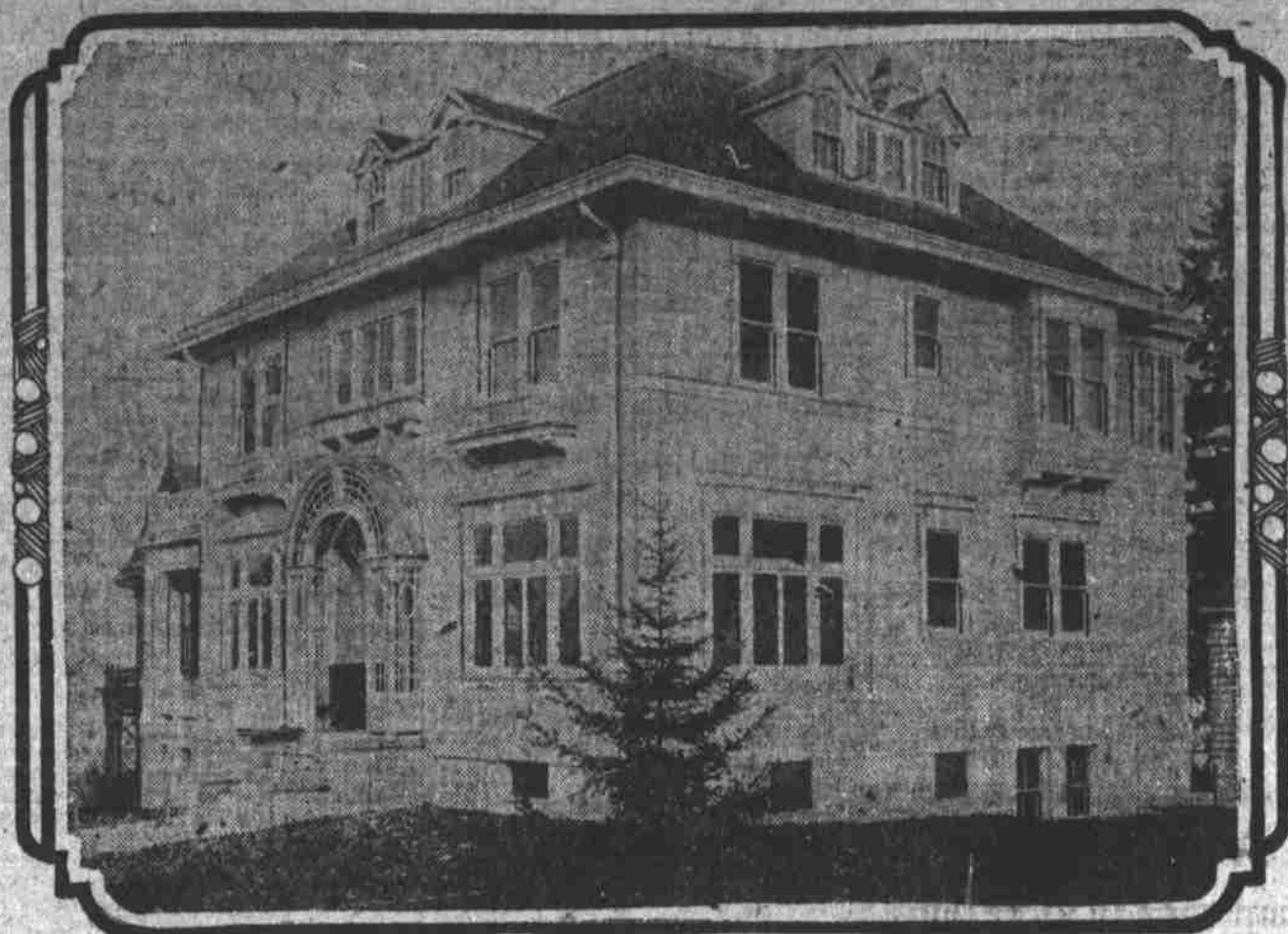
The first glimpse of the islands charms you. Never will any city attract you as will Honolulu, picturesquely nestled as it is at the base of Mount Tantalus, amid a profusion of tropical flowers and vegetation that constantly fill the air with the fragrant odor of ylang-ylang, heliotrope and honeysuckle. "There is so much in and about Honolulu to attract you that it will be difficult to say good bye. At the time of the Aloha excursion the Floral Festival, similar to Portland's Rose Carnival, will be in full blast. The days will be given up to sight-seeing, and during the evening hours entrancing sounds of stringed instruments, mingled with the laughter of the music-loving natives, will be wafted to your ears from many quarters amidst the evergreen jungle.

"When you tire, if you should tire, of the festal joys, visit the Punch-bowl, back of the city, and obtain a beautiful panoramic view, extending from Pearl Harbor to Diamond Head, while at your feet, on the lovely, lovely capital city, surrounded and interspersed with waving palms, tall swinging cocoanut trees, flowers and creeping vines of every conceivable variety known to the tropical climate. Then looking afar you will see the broad, blue Pacific, restlessly tossing to and fro, with its long line of whitecaps breaking ceaselessly upon the shining sand beach.

"When you are surfeited with mountain climbing, visit the famous Waialeale, Honolulu's Manhattan Beach. It is only a short ride by electric car from the city. This beach is the evening resort for Honolulu society, who flock there by the hundreds to bathe in the sea by moonlight or spend the time in pleasant conversation with friends.

"A sight the traveler must not overlook is Bishop's museum. Nowhere else can be found such a collection of Polynesian or Micronesian curiosities and relics. Rivaling the museum in interest is the aquarium in Kaplanani park. Here are many thousands of live fish, varying in size from the smallest minnow to the dangerous and ferocious man-eating shark. All shapes and sizes of the denizens of the deep are represented, with smooth scaly, spiny, horned, speckled, red, pink, yellow, violet, green, cobalt, ochre, gold and silver, with all the combinations of changeable colors seen in the rainbow and known to the human eye; fish whose flesh is as transparent as glass, sea urchins and star fish. The hundred-armed octopuses are also in evidence, swimming gracefully about or fastening their tiny tentacles to the sides of the glass tank, a slight jar upon which instantly disturbs them, and they become jet black from the fluid with which nature has provided them to roll their enemies in case of attack. There are fish in the aquarium capable of swimming faster by far than the swiftest ocean greyhounds glide over the sea. Even the 'Overland Limited,' Portland's fastest train, would be as the hare in the race with the tortoise, Esop's fables to the contrary notwithstanding.

"The most indifferent nature cannot but be carried away with Hawaii's great natural charms and balmy climate. You will naturally enter into the free spirit so noticeable among the people, and be deck yourself with wreaths of yellow and red leis, regretting most sincerely when the time of departure comes that your sojourn is at an end. You will find when the good ship Queen majestically slips away from the dock you reluctantly say good bye and throw your wreaths of leis to the chocolate colored maids on shore. As the last chords of their famous good-bye song, 'Aloha Oe,' are wafted to you over the waters you longingly gaze back to what has been like a fleeting dream of genuine happiness, which in future years will be redundant with pleasant memories. While lost in reflection wondrous Hawaii sinks on the horizon and vanishes away from sight in the amethyst haze of a glittering sea."

REGENTS HEIGHTS
LATEST ADDITION

Overlooks City From Hills Due
North of Guild's Lake; Em-
braces 55 Acres.

"Regents Heights" is the latest residence addition to be carved out of the elevated country overlooking the city from the western hills. This addition embraces 55 acres, located due north of Guild's lake and Blythwood, and is two and one half miles west from Sixth and Washington street, was recently purchased from the Mann estate by local investors.

The property has been subdivided into 300 building sites. In surveying the tract strict attention was paid to the topography of the land, with the result that the streets are contoured, winding along the hillside with an average grade of 7 1/2 per cent and maximum of 12 1/2. The streets are all to be graded and foundations of basalt rock put off, with the view later of putting a completed system of hard surface. Other improvements to be made in the tract include a sewer system, sidewalks, electric lighting and either connection with the city water system or the installation of a private water system.

"Regents Heights" is reached by either the Willamette carline or the United Railways, the distance from the city being only about 1800 feet. The entire tract commands a splendid view of all of the east side as far south as Sellwood, much of the west side of the city, and the entire Peninsula and Vancouver on the other side of the Columbia. A minimum building restriction of \$1500 has been put on the property, with a minimum cost of residence on the high priced lots to be \$2500.

The syndicate controlling the property was organized with the following officers: W. W. Robinson, president; S. Solomon of the Wander Millinery, vice president; R. A. Foster, secretary and treasurer. These officers, together with R. C. Pringle of Vancouver, Wash. and George T. Atchley of Morgan & Atchley, make up the board of directors. It is the intention of the owners of "Regents Heights" to make it a strictly high class residence addition. The sale of the tract was negotiated by the United Trust company and W. J. Byrnes. The property will be placed on the market by the United Trust company, with W. K. Kiesel, an experienced realty man, and Sweek & Byrnes as sales agents.

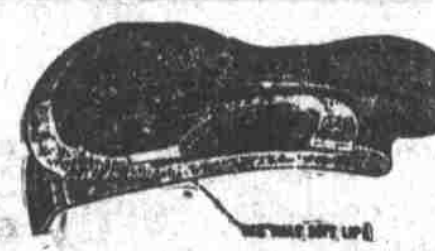
