

SHEPHERD FOR CONGRESS, 1912

This Is Slogan of Candidate Who Has Been Defeated 3 Times; Starts Early.

The third time is not the charm. George S. Shepherd is going to run for congress again. He still contends that "deep water to the sea" will yet wash him into the halls of the house of representatives at Washington. And he is sending his cards about among his friends, and the friends of the other fellow.

Some unkind people, of jocular disposition, argue that Mr. Shepherd had a big lot of campaign cards left over from his third and most recent effort to gather in the Republican nomination, and that being of a frugal mind, he hated to see them go to waste. Therefore he decided to become a candidate for the fourth time, these friends contend.

Be that as it may, the fact still remains that Mr. Shepherd is now out handing his cards to those whom he may meet, and is telling them of the advantages of a deep channel to the sea. He avers, with serious mien, that he intends to be a candidate for the Republican nomination for congressman from the second district in 1912, and that believing in the old adage that the first candidate captures the first vote he is out after it.

Whether Mr. Shepherd will keep up his newly launched campaign for the coming two years remains to be seen, but those who have watched his consistent course for the past six years believe that he will. At any rate the people of Oregon will not be able to say that they are without a candidate for office during the coming 24 months, no matter what happens. Mr. Shepherd is now, as always, on the job.

DEMOCRATIC CONTROL OF MONTANA LEGISLATURE

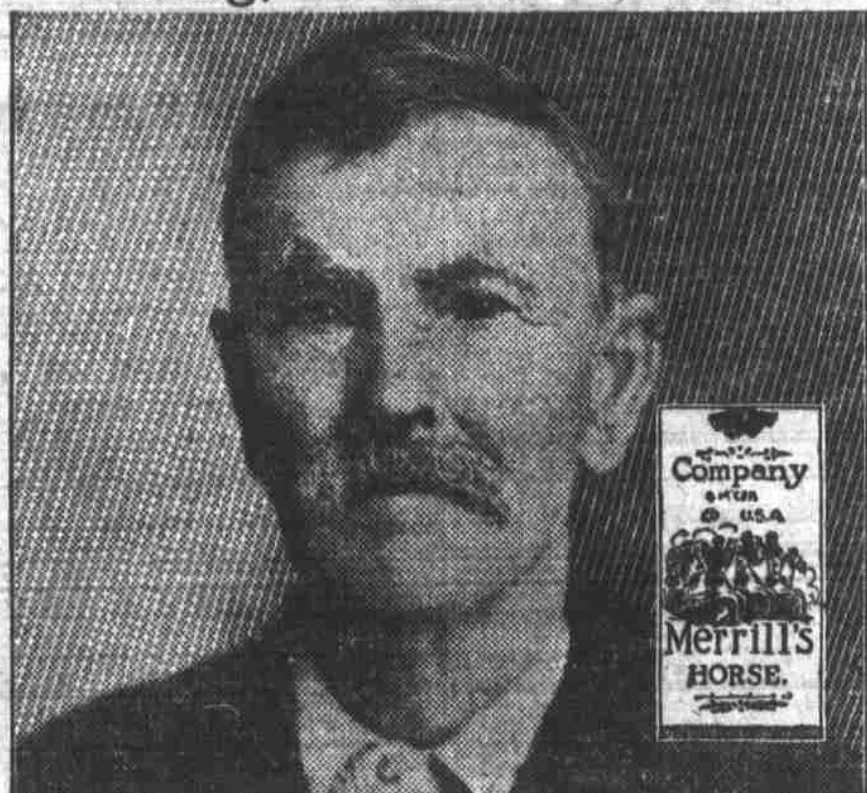
(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Butte, Mont., Nov. 12.—The completion of the first legislative assembly in Montana, which will elect a successor to United States Senator Thomas H. Carter, Republican, will be in doubt until next Tuesday or Wednesday, when the official count will have been completed in the counties in which the disputed elections of members of the legislature. As the situation now stands, the unofficial returns from Custer county indicate the election of A. W. Terrell, Democrat, in which event the Democrats will control the assembly by a majority of two, exclusive of two members now in doubt. Of these doubtful ones, the unofficial count shows: A. R. Dearborn, Democrat, in Granite, to have been elected by two votes, and in Silver Bow, W. W. McDowell, Democrat, and Charles Lane, Republican, are tied, with the official canvass yet to cover ten precincts. The unofficial count gave election to the Democrat.

DELEGATES NAMED TO MARINE CONGRESS

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Nov. 12.—Jay Bowerman, as acting governor, has named William D. Wheelwright, Charles F. Beebe, Henry L. Corbett and C. W. Hodson of Portland; Malcolm A. Moody of The Dalles; William Grimes of Marshfield; H. D. Norton of Grants Pass; Henry L. Benson of Klamath Falls; George J. Stearns of Oakland; William M. Colvig of Medford delegates to the Pacific coast congress which is to be held at San Francisco November 17, 18 and 19, under the auspices of the Merchant Marine league for the purpose of recommending a ship subsidy to the next congress and to frame other legislation that will be beneficial to the shipping interests.

The meeting has been called by Governor J. N. Gillette of California. Invitations have been sent out to the governors, lieutenant governors and other administrative officers of Idaho, Washington, Nevada, Utah, New Mexico, Arizona and Oregon by the California executive. Mr. Bowerman will not be able to attend the meeting himself on account of the many duties that will require his attention at Salem during the next two weeks and which stood so long neglected during the recent campaign.

FEDERAL APPRAISERS TO HOLD CONFERENCE

New York, Nov. 12.—A conference of United States local appraisers will be held at the United States appraisers' office here, beginning Monday, and will be attended by the local appraisers at the following ports, among others: New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago, San Francisco, New Orleans, Baltimore, Portland, Seattle, Honolulu, St. Paul, Pittsburgh, Galveston, Los Angeles, Louisville, Denver, Washington and Norfolk.

Appraising officers were invited to submit to the department such questions as they might desire to have brought up for discussion at the conference.

COMMISSION WILL VISIT PORTLAND

Representatives of Canadian Government to Study Industrial Training.

Portland will soon be visited by the royal commissioners appointed by the Canadian government on industrial training and technical education. It is expected they will arrive here the first week in December. Of particular interest in connection with this visit is the fact that representatives of the state department are now at Ottawa discussing reciprocity relations between the states and Canada.

The information of the commissioners' coming was received in a letter yesterday by T. J. Armstrong, president and treasurer of the W. C. Noon Bag company of this city, whose brother, Hon. J. Armstrong, M. L. C., is one of its members. Other members are: James W. Robertson, C. M. G., chairman; Rev. George Bryce, LL. D., F. R. S. C.; Gaspard Descares; Gilbert M. Murray, B. A.; David Forsythe, M. A.; James Simpson; Thomas Bengough, C. S. R., secretary.

The commission is now finishing its investigation in Canada as to the needs and present equipment of the dominion as respects its industrial training and technical education, and after holding sessions in Vancouver and Victoria, B. C., will visit Portland, San Francisco and other leading centers in the United States, after which they purpose spending five or six months in the United Kingdom, Germany, France and other countries in Europe, where excellent

systems are in force and which will be inspected. Canada sees that industrial efficiency is all important to the development of the dominion, and to the promotion of home and foreign trade in competition with other nations, and that industrial efficiency can be best promoted by the adoption in Canada of the more advanced systems and methods, and with that end in view the Canadian government has mapped out a big program for the commissioners to learn what other countries are doing in the way of technical training.

SANATORIUM OPENS ON TIME, DECEMBER 1

Returning yesterday from a meeting held in Salem Friday, Dr. E. A. Pierce of the state board of health stated that the new state tuberculosis sanatorium will positively be opened for indigent consumptives December 1, or before. "The work has been delayed in several embarrassing ways, but when finished the sanatorium will be the greatest public institution for the treatment of tuberculosis in the west," said Dr. Pierce. "I am very anxious to see it opened because there are many poor consumptives seeking entrance who need the help and the chance for life which the free treatment at the sanatorium will afford them."

SKATE FOR BENEFIT OF JOURNAL CARRIERS

A benefit skating entertainment for The Journal carriers will be given at the Oak roller skating rink the evening of November 21. FINDS TWO SONS BURNED TO ASHES

Montana Woman Believes Her Boys Were Killed in Freight Train Wreck.

Spokane, Wash., Nov. 12.—Standing in tears and weeping over a little gray mass of ashes and charred bones taken from beneath the wreckage of a west-bound train, involved in the Great Northern collision near Chatteray, Wash., last Sunday, Mrs. H. B. Brown of Whitefish, Mont., tonight declared there was no reasonable doubt left but that they were the remains of her two boys, Mrs. Brown's sons, Harry and Fred Grellin, aged 18 and 17 respectively, are known to have boarded the ill-fated freight train, No. 481, at Troy, Mont., with Richard Hayes of Hillyard, a mile east of Spokane. Hayes had been visiting them for a week, and the trio planned to beat their way to Hillyard for a return visit with Hayes. None of the three has since been seen. "Circumstances leave me no room to doubt that these are the remains of my two boys and their friend, Richard Hayes," said Mrs. Brown tonight at Hillyard, bending a tear-stained face over the little mangled splintered box that contained a few handfuls of human ashes. Up to this time the identity of the three victims of the wreck had been a mystery. All were crushed into an unrecognizable mass and burned.

METHODISTS SAY MENACE IN UTAH

Home Missions Committee Is Urged to Increase Efforts in Mormon Territory.

New York, Nov. 12.—The Mormon question was the topic which exercised the minds of the general committee of home missions and church extension, in session here today at Grace Methodist Episcopal church on West 104th street. The subject was catalogued "Mormon Missionaries and Polygamy," and was brought up by Bishop Luther D. Wilson of Philadelphia. He declared the church must awake to the fact of Mormonism and combat its inroads. He was followed by Rev. Dr. W. D. Pfifer, of Denver, whose district borders on Utah and the Mormon confines. "Don't minimize the Mormon evil," said Dr. Pfifer. "Mormons believe in polygamy just as strongly as ever. Why, there was a convention of 80 Mormon missionaries in Denver the day I left."

An animated discussion ensued on the proposition to increase the missionary appropriation 3 per cent for Utah. Rev. Dr. Schell, president of the Upper Iowa University, opposed it on the ground that there were greater needs of Roger standing.

Bishop Earl Cranston vigorously retorted that to neglect Utah would be criminal mismanagement. The matter was referred to a sub-committee. Bishop J. M. Walden presided.
