

CREAMER AND BUTTER MAKERS IN NEW ORGANIZATION

Will Work to Improve Dairy Conditions in Oregon by Adopting Scientific Methods of Production.

The preliminary organization of the Oregon Cheese and Butter Makers' association was accomplished at a meeting held last night in the convention hall of the Commercial club. As explained by the organizer, Paul V. Maris, deputy dairy commissioner, the purpose of the organization will be to improve methods of milk and butter production in this state. It is desired that Oregon be made more distinctively a dairy state, and that the organization be close enough to solve the problems of a production that shall be increased both in quantity and quality. The adoption of scientific methods in dairying, butter making and the operation of creameries is the ideal.

At the meeting last evening three fourths of the butter makers and creamery interests of the state were represented. Outside creameries will be assisted by the large local firms. They will work to secure improved methods, will be vigorously carried on during the year to come. Included in the membership in the association from out in the state are the following:

An encouraging feature of the meeting was the liberal prize offers for the first competitive scoring contest to be conducted in connection with the annual meeting to be held in Eugene on December 7. Silver cups were offered by the De Laval Dairy Supply company of Seattle and by the Pacific Homestead of Salem. Or. Monroe & Grissell Dairy Supply company of Portland offered five barrels of Diamond crystal butter and Dairy and Food Commissioners J. W. Bailey a cash prize of \$25. These prizes are to be placed at the discretion of the executive committee.

DESERTED MAN DIES OF BROKEN HEART

Laurel, Del., Nov. 12.—Theodore King died here of a broken heart caused by grief over the desertion of his wife, who had him four months ago, after telling him she loved a younger man and had married him for his money.

The Kings, who were wealthy, came here from Lyons, Mich. Three years ago and purchased the old Governor Cooper mansion and were supposed to live happily until a few weeks previous to the woman's departure. They had two children, a boy of 12 and a girl of 6.

Mrs. King took the girl with her but instead of returning to her old Michigan home she went to Gascon, Cal. This seemed to crush King. He made his will and then directed Undertaker Holt to have his body incased in a metallic casket and sent to his old Michigan home and placed by the side of his first wife, whose nurse became his second wife.

His last act was to denounce his wife by poster on bill boards. When the son realized his father's condition he wired for his mother and she made desperate efforts to reach the side of her dying husband for a reconciliation but death cheated her.

ENGINEERS BALLOT ON STRIKE ISSUE

That 85 Per Cent of B. L. E. Have Voted for Strike As Alternative Is Claim.

Cleveland, Ohio, Nov. 12.—Not less than 85 per cent of the 30,000 members of the Brotherhood of Railway Engineers who are demanding increased pay from 62 roads in the west, have voted to strike unless their request is met.

This is the statement here tonight of heads of the brotherhood, who with its grand chief, Warren Stone, are engaged in receiving returns from the local membership have participated in balloting.

Pending the complete count of the ballots no member of the brotherhood would consent to be quoted, but it is expected that within three or four days the result will be announced.

The engineers asked for advances of pay from 10 to 15 per cent. They were not offered within six per cent of their demands and the strike vote resulted. In case of a vote to strike, Stone will reopen final negotiations with the roads and not until final efforts have failed will a strike be declared. In case of trouble the engineers are expected to be joined in their fight by the affiliated orders of railroad trainmen and conductors.

MAY NOT ELECT YOUNG SENATOR

Predict Deadlock in Iowa Legislature over Governor's Appointment to Succeed Dolliver.

Des Moines, Iowa, Nov. 12.—Can Senator Lafayette Young, standstill editor of the Daily Capital, appointed United States senator to succeed the late J. P. Dolliver by Governor Carroll today, be elected by the legislature which meets in January?

The general opinion is that he can not, for the progressives will never vote for him, the Democrats are equally opposed to him and the standstillers have not the votes. The one best guess just now is that the legislature will deadlock and adjourn without electing any one, leaving the junior senatorship vacant after the first formal ballot.

The house has 48 progressives, 24 standstillers and 16 Democrats, while the senate stands 19 progressives, 15 Democrats and 15 standstillers. The legislature stands on joint caucus at 28 for the progressives, but there is nothing to indicate that the standstillers will enter the caucus. If the standstillers tonight caucus and abide by the results the progressives will elect some one other than Young, for there is no place pact between Young and Cummins.

Chairman Carl Franke of Parkersburg, chairman of the Republican state committee, tonight announced himself a candidate for the senatorship.

NEW YORK'S HORSE SHOW IS OPENED

Break Coaching Record by Covering 10 Miles in 37 Minutes—All Fashion There.

New York, Nov. 12.—Four horses drew a scarlet coach surmounted by a scarlet coated driver into Madison Square garden this afternoon and the first big feature event of New York's horse, gown and beauty show, the Arrowhead inn coach drive, had been won by Paul Sorg.

A few minutes later the Ayleshire farm's coach team, driven by Alfred G. Vanderbilt, followed. The coach, with the horse and driver, headed inn on Washington road, was 27 minutes, a record.

Tonight, the opening night of the show, Madison Square garden was aflame with beauty, feminine, sartorial and equine. The garden was filled with the biggest first night attendance a horse show has drawn in years. The opening on Saturday night obliterated the rivalry of the grand opera season opening which has always divided the crowd with the horse show.

Before society took refreshments, however, the horse show had given enjoyment to 2500 children from the orphan asylum and tenement houses, who as guests of A. G. Vanderbilt filled the balconies this afternoon.

ACCIDENT SPOILS AERO FLIGHT FROM STEAMER

New York, Nov. 12.—Because of an accident to the aeroplane the ocean mail carrying flight scheduled for today did not take place from the deck of the Hamburg-American liner Pennsylvania.

Bud Mark, the aviator who was to make the flight in place of McCurdy, who failed to arrive in time, was aboard and the starting platform on the rear deck of the ocean liner ready, but during a preliminary test of the motor the propeller struck a piece of iron, causing damage to the engine as well as the wire supports.

The aeroplane was removed from the steamer and the Pennsylvania proceeded on its way.

CONTRE BEAUFORT MOVE TO DISMISS BRIBERY CHARGES

Proceedings in Behalf of Calhoun and Others to Be Renewed on Monday.

San Francisco, Nov. 12.—On Monday morning the motion to dismiss the bribery indictments against Patrick Calhoun, president of the United Railroads, Thornehill Mullaly, T. L. Ford and W. M. Abbott will be renewed in Judge Lawlor's court. More than 60 days have elapsed since the attorneys for Calhoun and his fellow defendants moved to dismiss these indictments, and there is a prevalent impression that Judge Lawlor will grant the petition.

It was in connection with proceedings on this same motion that the turbulent scene was enacted that resulted in Attorney A. A. Moore, Stanley Moore and J. V. Barrett being adjudged in contempt of court and committed to the county jail. On that occasion Judge Lawlor intimated that the continued absence of "Big Jim" Gallagher, an essential witness, would eventually compel him to dismiss the indictments. The fact that the election is over may also have some bearing on the situation.

A motion to dismiss the indictments is also pending before the supreme court, having been submitted by Attorney Garrett W. C. McInerney in the form of habeas corpus proceedings. The supreme court has had this matter under submission more than two months and apparently the two courts are becoming weary of one another, each hoping that it would be relieved of acting, through some decisive step by the other.

LOS ANGELES PAIR HAVE ROMANCE

Elopement Unites Descendants of Andrew Jackson and Thomas Kendricks.

Los Angeles, Nov. 12.—A romance involving Marjorie Nesbitt Carver, granddaughter of the great-granddaughter of Andrew Jackson, and Thomas Kendricks Morgan, Jr., grand-nephew of Thomas Kendricks, vice president of the United States under Cleveland, has culminated in a runaway marriage at Santa Ana and a local great-grandson of President Jackson is 17 years old and the daughter of Mrs. Carlos S. Hardy of this city. The grand-nephew of the former vice president is the son of Los Angeles Hendricks Morgan of Los Angeles. He is just 21.

The young couple have been engaged for some time, but their parents objected to a marriage on account of their youth. So they took matters into their own hands and went to Santa Ana, where the marriage ceremony was performed by Justice Smithwick of Santa Ana.

The bride's father died some years ago, leaving her a fortune.

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The club is one of the most magnificently appointed in the west. In it are staterooms, paintings, books and manuscripts, the works of members living and dead, famous in themselves. The furnishings, designs and woodwork are the result of the thought and care of the artist members of the club.

The building is of three stories, the lower two being given over to club purposes and the top floor to apartments for the resident members. The entrance leads into a large lounge room, the ceiling of which is yellow stained glass, through which the sun shines. Here are arranged, amid masses of ferns and palms, the club stateroom, prominent among which is one depicting a cave man standing forth in his pedestal the mammoth base of a tree.

To the east is the second lounge room, where are hung the club paintings. These include the works of the leading artists of the world. On the second floor also are the bar and the billiard room, the famous club collection of caricatures and pictures adorning the walls of the former. On the west side of the entrance is the dining room, which is finished in blood red and is one of the most striking rooms in the club.

For artistic beauty and comfort the library, which is on the second floor, is generally conceded to take first place. It is exceptionally well appointed. At one end is a vast semi-circular couch, large enough to hold 50 persons. Around the room is a balcony lined with bookcases.

The jinks room is on the second floor and has a stage at one end and a balcony at the other. Leading off the main rooms are numerous smaller ones used as card and writing rooms.

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
