

OUTLINE PLAN TO BUILT GOOD ROADS THROUGH OREGON

Meeting Discusses How to
Take Advantage of New
Amendment; Favors Com-
petent Commissioner.

Building a mile of macadam highway, then other miles, until in each county a good roads plan has been extended to become a unit of a good roads system covering Oregon, was the plan discussed at a meeting held by the Oregon Good Roads association in the Beck building.

Dr. Andrew C. Smith, president of the association, congratulated the membership upon the victory for the good roads amendment to the state constitution.

Judge Lionel R. Webster declared the time has come to substitute theory for practice and do actual work that will result in the construction of real roads. County Judge Cleaton said that it was not enough to build roads; they must be watched and cared for, as big buildings are watched and repairs made when found necessary.

The date of a state good roads convention was set tentatively for December 3, that delegates who will attend a Washington good roads meeting in Washington, D. C., beginning November 23, may come directly to Portland. Judge Webster outlined legislation necessary to supplement the good roads amendment.

Power Given Counties.

By the amendment, counties are given permission or power by the constitution to pledge their credit for building permanent roads, he said. There is power without plan, in other words, he stated. A system of roads so developed for each county that the result will be a greater state-wide system, is the ideal. To this end, and to secure wise and economical expending of cash procured for road building, there must be a general supervisory agency. A state highway commission of three, serving without recompense and having under their control a salaried executive officer commonly known in other states as a highway commissioner, would meet this need. "A scheme of state aid in

accord with one or both of two provisions would then be found feasible and necessary. First would be a direct appropriation of say \$500,000 from the state for every \$20,000 supplied by the county; second, in planning road building, allow the adjacent property owner to pay one third, the county one third and the state one third.

Convict Labor Plan.

That the jails should be emptied all over the state, the convicts being employed in road building camps, their work to be presented to the state, the men themselves being made producers instead of consumers only, was another plan presented by Judge Webster.

Judge Webster stated the great desirability of having present at the good roads convention all the state legislators-elect in order that their support may be secured. The judge had already received a letter from M. F. Eggleston, elected to the legislature from Jackson county. Mr. Eggleston in this letter asked to be informed as to what he could do to serve the good roads cause. Other members of the state legislature elect will be communicated with and their attitude toward the good roads cause learned.

John S. Beall moved the amendment of a legislative committee which will make a preliminary report at the good roads convention. This committee appointed by the president, Dr. Smith, is as follows: W. C. Bristol, L. R. Webster, C. S. Jackson, Frank C. Riggs and John S. Beall.

All the members of the good roads association present at last night's meeting endorsed Judge Webster's thought that the state highway commissioner should be more than an engineer, that he should be a financier, a man of large training in big affairs, and that his salary should be made commensurate to his ability, since in this case, as in all others, the best is the cheapest.

HUNTING GOOD IN KLAMATH COUNTY

Klamath Falls, Or., Nov. 16.—The shooting season has been at its best for two weeks. Several hunting parties have come in from Portland and California cities. In every instance the members of the parties succeeded in bagging the limit. The local birds are still in the marshes and the northern birds have been brought in by the recent rains.

The excellent hunting found in Klamath county is one of the assets of the country. It affords sport and recreation for the local people and brings in many outsiders who leave considerable money with local business houses. There was recently organized in this city a rod and gun club. It is likely that this organization will recommend a number of changes in the game and fish laws for Klamath county.

CHILEAN IS WANTED ON CHARGE OF MURDER

Hogueland, Wash., Nov. 16.—The police of the northwest have been notified to be on the lookout for Louis Sallasad, a native of Chile, wanted for the murder of Ah Pook, the Chinese gardener who was murdered on the outskirts of this city Sunday or Monday and the body thrown in the Hogueland river. The police searched Sallasad's room and found a suit of clothes wet and bespattered with blood.

Sallasad left Sunday morning without securing 11 days' pay due him at a local mill. He visited the scene of the murder Saturday night. An inquest is being held by Coroner Smith this afternoon.

SCHOOL PICTURES START TROUBLE

Merchants Object to Schools
Showing Stock of Boston
Firm in Decorations.

Allowing the use of the assembly hall in public schools to outside concerns for the purpose of selling pictures has aroused considerable comment among local merchants, and will probably result in an effort being made to induce the school board to rescind the order permitting the practice.

The latest cause that gave rise to the controversy is the plan of A. W. Elson & Co., of Boston, to hold an exhibit of pictures in Holladay school, assembly hall to which an admission fee of 15 cents is to be charged. Tickets to the exhibit are being sold by the 500 children of the Holladay school. Under the contract made between the Boston picture dealers and Principal F. M. Harrigan of Holladay school, the proceeds of the sale of tickets is to be used first in paying the express charges on the loan of pictures and the remainder up to \$50 is to be invested in pictures handled by Elson & Co.

Local Merchants Object.

Local merchants who have taken the matter up with Superintendent Rigler have entered a vigorous protest against permitting an outside merchant to display his wares in the public school building and at the same time arranging a plan to raise money among the patrons of the schools for the purpose of buying their goods.

"No local concern could get into the public schools as this Boston firm has," said one of the largest merchants in the city. "A. W. Elson & Co., Boston picture dealers, make a practice of going over the country exhibiting their pictures in the public schools and then framing up a deal to fill the walls of the school rooms with their pictures at the expense of the parents of the school children. No school principal should be

permitted to turn loose 500 school children on the public with tickets to sell for a scheme of this kind, as has been done at Holladay school.

Competes Without Taxation.

This Boston concern pays no taxes or license in this city, yet it is permitted to come in competition with local merchants who pay large taxes and conduct their business at a heavy expense. Not only that, but the pictures handled by this concern are only ordinary reproductions, and some of them secondary reproductions at that."

Superintendent Frank Rigler says that the school board approved the method of raising money with which to buy pictures, adopted by Principal Harrigan of Holladay school.

For several years Portland city schools have secured pictures for the schoolhouses in this way. The matter is left entirely with the principals. No local merchant has ever offered to help the schools get pictures, but I would be glad to take up the proposition with them at any time. I approve the plan

adopted by the principal of Holladay school to get pictures for his building."

"There is nothing new in the way I have adopted of securing pictures for the corridors and assembly hall of Holladay school," said Mr. Harrigan, principal of Holladay school. "Principals of a number of Portland schools have arranged with outside dealers to hold these exhibits with a view to securing a supply of pictures for schools. It is a question of getting pictures in this way or going without them, as the school board makes no appropriation for pictures."

HENEY COMING WITH MANDATE IN LAND CASE

Francis J. Heney will arrive in Portland tomorrow with the mandates from the United States court of appeals in the Jones-May land fraud conspiracy case, according to advices received here yesterday. The court has already confirmed the conviction of the Blue mountain conspirators, as Willard N. Jones and F. P. Mays are called, but the men have not yet begun to serve their sentences and will not until the decision of the upper court has been placed on the Oregon records. An effort is being made by the friends of the conspirators to withhold the mandates from the records until January 1. It is the hope of the convicted men that they will be able to obtain a presidential pardon before that date.

Attorney Heney acted as special prosecutor in their cases and he has steadfastly declined to intercede with the president on behalf of Jones and

Mays. The former was sentenced to one year and one day in the county jail, and the latter, to four months' confinement in the same institution. Mays will be compelled to pay a fine of \$15,000 in addition.

Busy for Greater Los Angeles.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 16.—The city and county commission appointed by Mayor Alexander, began its work today. Within the next month, it is expected, its members will return a report regarding the plan already endorsed for a "city and county of Los Angeles." Whether or not a systematic campaign will be made to secure the inclusion within the city and county, of the towns of Pasadena, Long Beach, Whittier and other neighboring cities, has not been decided. Long Beach has already organized an anti-incorporation league, and will fight for separate existence. The commission is composed of seven business men of Los Angeles.
