

TWO LEAGUES FOR BASKET TOSSERS

Younger and Lighter Players Will Have Chance to Play.

In order to meet the demands made for a basketball league of the younger players of the city, the Columbia Basketball League has found it necessary to expand and besides a league covering the older players of the city, it has decided that a league to be made up of teams consisting of players weighing 135 and under shall be run in conjunction with the main league. Whoever possible two games will be played on one floor each evening.

The Columbia Basketball League through its officials has met with every possible encouragement from the players of the city and from present appearances the league is going to be a big success. Teams are now entered from the Behrke-Walker Business College, Multnomah club, Hawthorne club, Catholic Young Men's club, Christian Brothers Business College, Jewish Young Men's club, two teams from the Y. M. C. A. and the Third Presbyterian church. These teams represent the strongest teams of the city and promise one of the most successful seasons in basketball that Portland has known for many years. It will result in a definite fixing of the city championship.

Entry in the league can be made as late as November 20 and the league secretary, Clifford C. Harrison, is anxious to hear from all the basketball teams of the city. Entries should be made at once.

"WINGED M" FALLS BEFORE STUDENTS

Weak, Poorly Trained Clubmen No Match for Clever Willamette Eleven.

Salem, Or., Nov. 17.—Multnomah athletic club of Portland lost to Willamette university on Willamette field in football yesterday afternoon to the tune of 29 to 0. Willamette's crack aggregation of players made monkeys of the poorly trained team sent to Salem by the Multnomah club. Two touchdowns were made by Luke Rader, Willamette's big full back, after long runs from kick-offs and Willamette was in striking distance of Multnomah's goal nearly all the time.

After the first down it was apparent that Multnomah was beaten. The old stars showed lack of training and not sufficient experience with the new game to stop Willamette's puzzling passes. Every team that has gone against Willamette this season has been up against a line of delayed and double passes worked out by Coach Sweetland that were well nigh unsovable.

Fumbled Frequently.
Coach Sweetland has a machine that works perfectly. The varsity's interference in yesterday's game was impregnable. In sharp contrast to the varsity's work was the ragged work of the Multnomah aggregation. They fumbled frequently and the interference was nil. The only man on the club team who acted as if he had ever been in a game before was Quarterback Rhinehart. Rhinehart played every minute of the time.

While the shining light of the varsity was Rader and his long runs for touchdowns from Multnomah's kick-offs, going through the entire club team with the help of his magnificent interference, other men aided materially in piling up the big score against the club. Blackwell at center played a splendid game and is going to make a strong bid for all northwest centers for this season's work. Rader, Cummins and McMeschin, Willamette's backs, tore great holes in the club team for gains of from 10 to 40 yards.

Fifteen in First Half.
At the end of the first half the score was 15 to 0 in favor of the varsity, made by a touchdown shortly after the first quarter opened by end runs and delayed passes, a goal from placement and Rader's touchdown from kick-off. In the second half Rader made another touchdown from a kick-off at the 25-yard line in the last quarter. A touchdown was also made in the third quarter and another field goal.

Low, Willamette's end, was ruled out of the game for stugging and Willamette was penalized 50 yards. This was the only time Willamette's goal was in danger and time was called at the end of the second quarter before Multnomah could realize from the heavy penalty. Aside from this one incident, the game was clean throughout.

GROSS AND MANKURTZ BREAK TANK RECORDS

Frank Gross, an 18-year-old boy, broke two American Y. M. C. A. swimming records, and Gus Mankurtz shattered one American record in the exhibition against time at the association tank last night. Gross slipped one second off the 25 yard record of 12 2/5 seconds, and one fifth of a second off the former record of 23 seconds in the 50 yard swim.

Mankurtz swam the 220 yards in 3:03, shaving four seconds off the old record of 3:07. Mankurtz was paced a part of the time in his effort, while Gross had a competitor in the 50 yard race, but none in the 25 yard event.

Three watches timed the races and as they were sanctioned the records will stand in the Y. M. C. A. list.
