

# DIAZ FACES CRITICAL SITUATION IN MEXICO

## REVOLUTIONISTS CROSSING LINE IN LARGE BODIES

Mobilizing at San Carlos for Attack Upon City of Chihuahua, Which is to Be Made Their Capital.

## SUSPECTED THAT REYES IS MANAGING UPRISING

"Red Sunday" at Zacatecas, Where Troops Fire on Revolutionists at Meeting.

Laredo, Texas, Nov. 21.—Three hundred armed Mexicans crossed the Rio Grande early today and are marching toward San Carlos, where the revolutionary forces are reported to be mobilizing 5000 strong. The insurrectionists plan to attack Chihuahua and make that city their capital in an insurrection against the power of President Diaz.

It is estimated that during the night and this forenoon 2000 Mexicans had crossed from the American side into Mexico. They are under regular formation, marshalled by officers, and are hastening toward the towns of Aldama, Javal and San Carlos, from which points they will march in three divisions to the neighborhood of the city of Chihuahua, where they will unite in the attack.

## FRENCHMEN FIGHT WITH RAPIERS; BLOOD FLOWS

Paris, Nov. 21.—Injurious, mental and physical, were avenged with honor in two duels today. Condemned Man Breaks Down When Told There is No Hope—Says He is Innocent but Too Poor to Prove It.

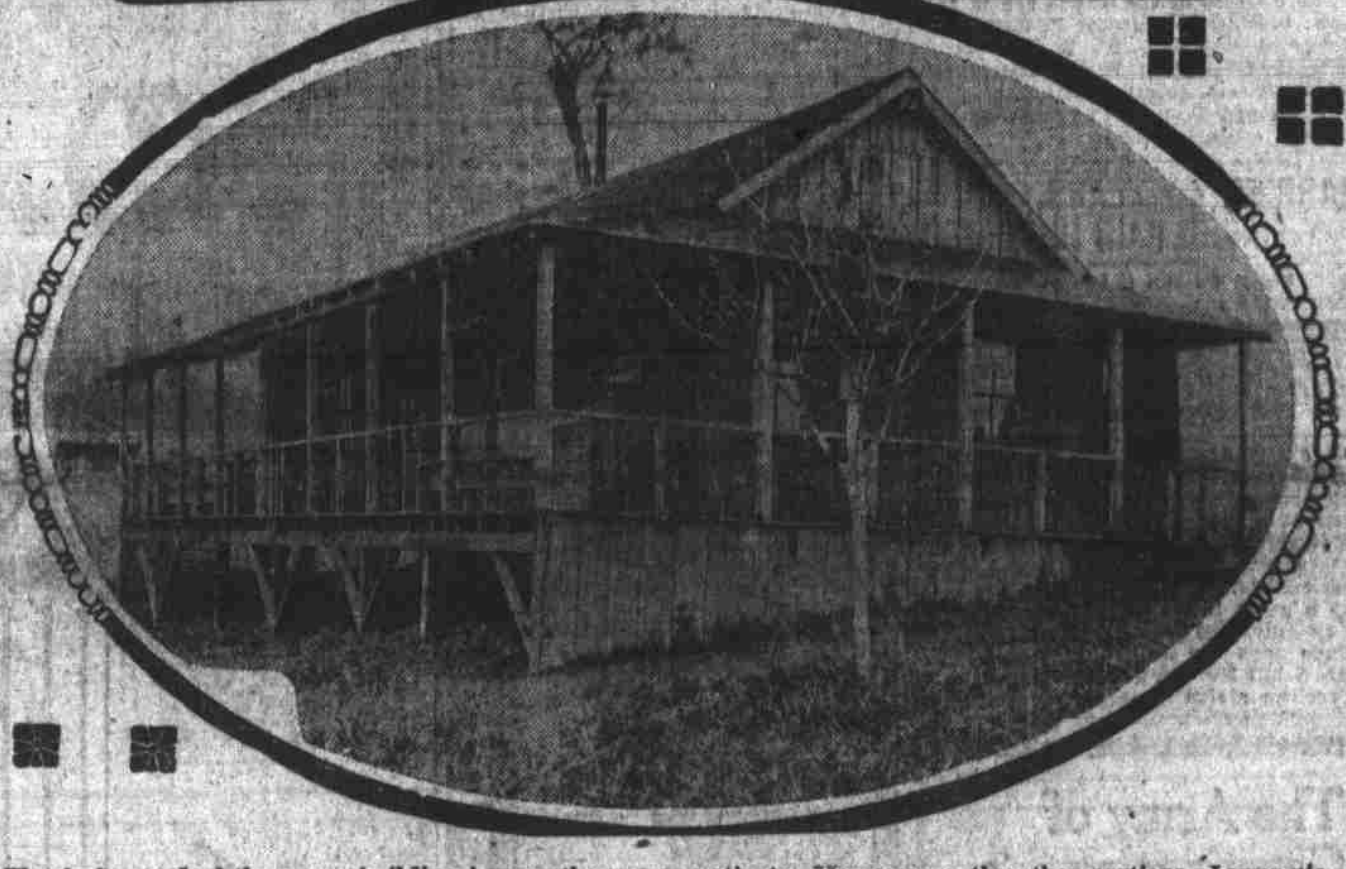
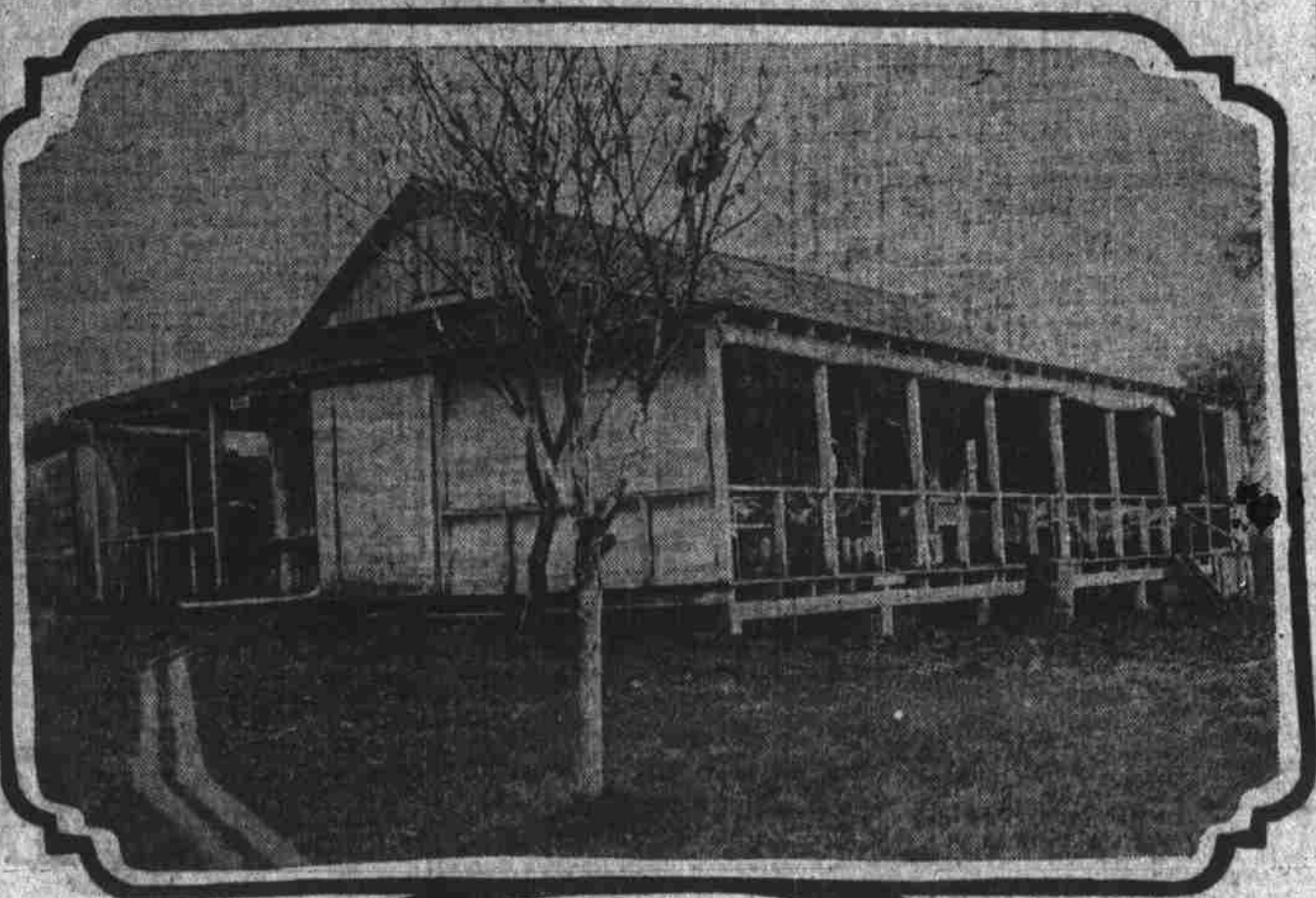

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## FILTHY CONDITIONS AT POOR FARM ARE MUCH IMPROVED

Public Sentiment Aroused by Journal's Description of the Disgraceful Scenes Forces Change for Better.

## CIVIC ASSOCIATIONS TO INVESTIGATE CHARGES

Dr. Matson Declares He Called Attention to Ill Treatment of Patients Long Ago.

Public Meeting to Be Held. Committee from the Unitarian church, the Visiting Nurse association, the Associated Charities, and the Fruit and Flower Mission, who visited the tuberculosis ward of the county poor farm before the conditions there were made public, will be called to meet probably Wednesday, according to an announcement made this morning. Reports will be received and resolutions condemning conditions and demanding remedial changes will be submitted. A formal demand will be made upon the county for appropriation of an amount sufficient to remedy permanently what the charity workers term "a disgrace to the county."

Publicity in The Journal of the conditions in the tuberculosis wards at the county poor farm has produced immediate improvement.
