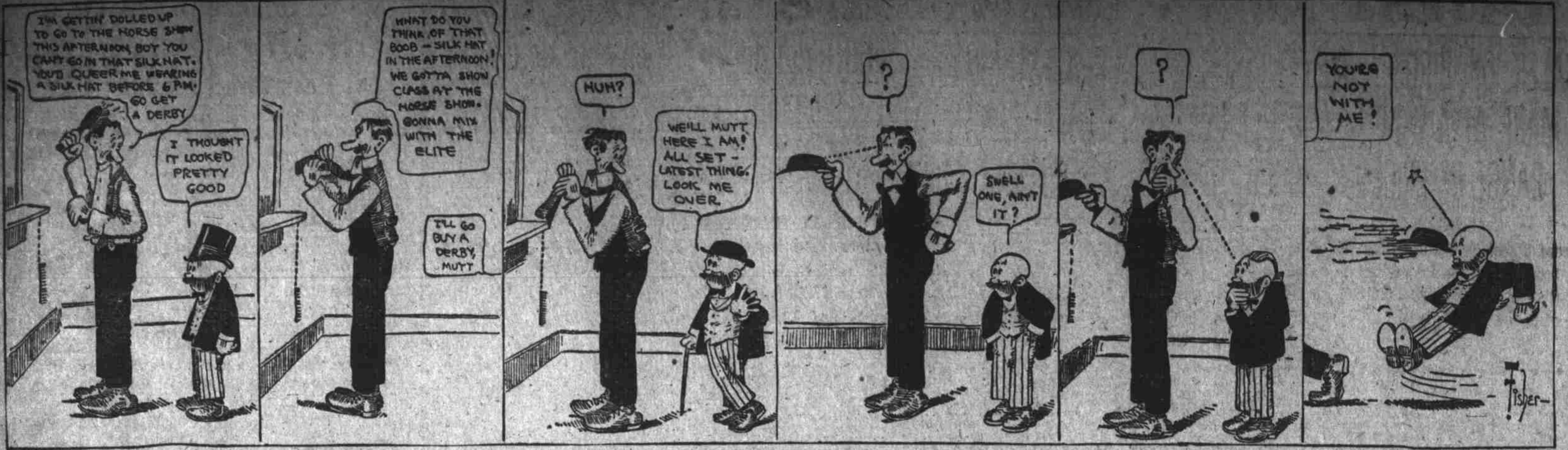

JIMMY CARROLL IS MAKING GREAT HIT

Little Boxer Turns Tables on Harvey and Gets Many Offers.

Jimmy Carroll can have all the rights he wants in New York. After losing a questionable decision to Charlie Harvey in Albany two weeks ago, Jimmy thoughtfully whiffed Harvey in Gotham last Tuesday night.

Every New York paper gave Jimmy the decision over Harvey, and now they want him to box Sammy Kellar, the English champion, with whom he divided two fights in San Francisco.

Jimmy Carroll, the Frisco bantamweight, gave a sample of his boxing abilities before a New York crowd when he easily defeated Charlie Harvey of Philadelphia in a smashing 10-round bout at the Olympic A. C. last night.

Carroll was wild in the first round and few of his blows reached their mark. Harvey used a fine right jab to the jaw which kept Carroll on the move. In the second round Carroll solved Harvey's style and held him even.

The fourth was slightly in favor of Carroll. In the fifth Carroll took all the fight out of Harvey when he sent him clear across the ring with a right smash to the jaw.

The seventh and eighth rounds were decidedly in favor of Carroll; the ninth round was even, but in the tenth Carroll put it all over his little opponent.
