

VICTOR L. BERGER MAKES RETORT TO GLENNON CHARGE

Says Socialism Not a Beer
Mug Affair and Charges
Church as Obstructionist—
Challenges Test on Labor.

(United Press Special Wire.)
St. Louis, Nov. 22.—Archbishop Glennon's attack upon Socialism in a sermon heard by many leading labor leaders received a "come back" today from Victor Berger, Socialist congressman-elect of Wisconsin.

"Archbishop Glennon intimates that Socialism is the philosophy of the beer mug," he said. "That is unfair, and does not show much learning. I might with equal justice say that the archbishop's religion is the religion of the whiskey bottle. That would be unfair, too."

"Father Glennon contends that the Catholic church will solve the labor problem. It has had over 1800 years in which to do it, and has not yet accomplished the task. The conditions of the working man in civilized countries are not nearly so wretched as in the Catholic countries of Ireland, Italy, Spain, Portugal, Mexico and South America. In these countries labor is down to its lowest ebb."

"Concerning the archbishop's statements, it might be interesting to know that at the last election, and in fact in all Milwaukee elections, the Catholic church went hand in hand with the retail liquor dealers, the saloon keepers and the red light district in attacking Socialism and the Socialist party."

"The only reasonable ground for the fears of the archbishop and other Catholic dignitaries is that Socialism will enlighten, educate and culture the masses, while certain priests would lose their grip on the masses."

WORK ON RIVER JETTY HALTED

Channel of Columbia Already
Shows Increase in Depth;
To Take Final Step.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Pt. Stevens, Or., Nov. 22.—It has been found that the structural work on the jetty has advanced too rapidly to admit of the possibility of filling all in with rock; consequently a portion of the end is now being removed, as it is known that it could not withstand the winter storms without the rock foundation as a support.

Today all work on the jetty proper ceased because of violent storms and it is generally admitted that the outdoor season for jetty work is practically at an end.

Recent harbor surveys denote the interesting and encouraging fact that the channel depth shows an increase of from one to three feet.

Next year work on the Washington side of the river will commence. This is the final step toward the completion of the vast works necessary to permanently insure a deep channel for the Columbia river.

Government and local engineering experts admit that every foot of construction on the north jetty, as it will approach the old jetty at a rapid angle and thereby narrow and consequently deepen the main channel by forcing it to scour itself out.

Main machine shop, car barns, repair shops, etc., will be located permanently at Stevens, as it is not deemed advisable to change for the Washington project, necessary repairs being done on the Oregon side of the river.

Guy Peely of Waterloo, speaker of the house of representatives of the last Iowa legislature, has made announcement of his candidacy for the seat in the United States senate now temporarily filled by Lafayette Young as the appointee of Governor Carroll. The choice for the full term will be made by the next general assembly.

FRATERNAL ORDER TO MEET CRISIS

A. O. U. W. Supreme Lodge
Takes Up Reorganization
Question.

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 22.—The supreme lodge of the Ancient Order of United Workmen met in this city today and began what is expected to be one of the most important sessions in the history of the order. Before the session adjourns it is expected that plans will have been adopted for what will amount to practically a complete reorganization of the order.

The Ancient Order of United Workmen, organized in Meadville, Pa., in 1858, is one of the oldest and for many years was one of the most prosperous fraternal and beneficiary orders in America. Since its founding it has disbursed in benefits over \$200,000,000. At the height of its prosperity it numbered nearly 400,000 active members, but at the present time the membership has decreased to a little over 200,000.

The decrease in membership is attributed to the litigation in which the order has been involved for some years, but which has now been satisfactorily settled. For a time the litigation threatened the very existence of the order. The difficulties arose over the refusal of some of the grand lodges, headed by that of Nebraska, to pay over relief funds collected, to the treasury of the supreme lodge. The insurgent grand lodges were of the opinion that they were bearing the burden of life insurance losses in other states.

Under the laws of the order each state jurisdiction was supposed to care for its own death losses. Through the operation of the guarantee fund only 12 assessments could be levied each year. But when these were found insufficient to cover the losses in certain states the plan was adopted of assessing other states to make up the deficiency. The grand lodges of some of the states, among them Nebraska, submitted to the extra assessments, but refused to turn the proceeds over to the supreme lodge treasury and action was brought by the supreme lodge against the grand lodges of Nebraska and certain other insurgent states to compel them to make payment.

A decision was finally returned in favor of the supreme lodge and now the representatives of the several states have come together to make an amicable arrangement and to decide upon such changes in the laws of the order as may be deemed necessary to meet the objections of the grand lodges and to restore the order to that condition of prosperity which it has enjoyed in the past.

SEATTLE ENJOYS NEW PROSPECTS

Better Rates on Great North-
ern and New Ocean Steam-
ers Will Make Port.

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 22.—President Howard Elliott, of the Northern Pacific, is in Seattle, and following his conference with local officials of the road it is believed a new freight rate schedule for transcontinental shipments will be announced on both the Northern Pacific and Great Northern this winter. This move will come in competition with the Milwaukee road, which is enjoying an immense oriental trade.

George B. Dodwell of London, head of the large shipping firm of Dodwell & Co., Limited, was in Seattle Saturday in conference with leading traffic and shipping officials. Three large new fast freighters are now being built for the use of his firm in the trade between the United Kingdom, the Orient and Puget Sound, and they will be put into service as soon as completed. This Mr. Dodwell announced Saturday night, at the same time intimating that larger propositions were under advisement.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 22.—The Canadian club of Boston has completed arrangements for its annual banquet at the Parker house tonight. Sir James Mackay of Ottawa, James Brierly of Montreal, C. R. HANGMAN TAKES LOOK AT CRIPPEN

Then Rehearses for Grim
Drama of Tomorrow; Crip-
pen Resigned to Fate.

London, Nov. 22.—Resigned to his fate but protesting his innocence, Dr. Hawley Crippen is spending what will probably be his last day on earth in the condemned row in prison. Unless some unforeseen intervention occurs, Crippen will be hanged tomorrow morning for the murder of his actress wife, Belle Elmore Crippen.

Crippen appeared resigned to his fate and professed to believe that eventually his wife would appear alive, thus clearing his name. He emphatically denied rumors that he had confessed.

"There is nothing to confess," he repeated.

John Ellis, assistant executioner, today prepared the gallows from which Crippen will drop. Through a peephole he looked Crippen over to determine how far he should have to fall, guessed his weight, and then tested the rope to be used by "hanging" a bag of sand. 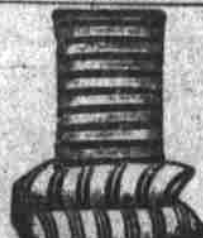

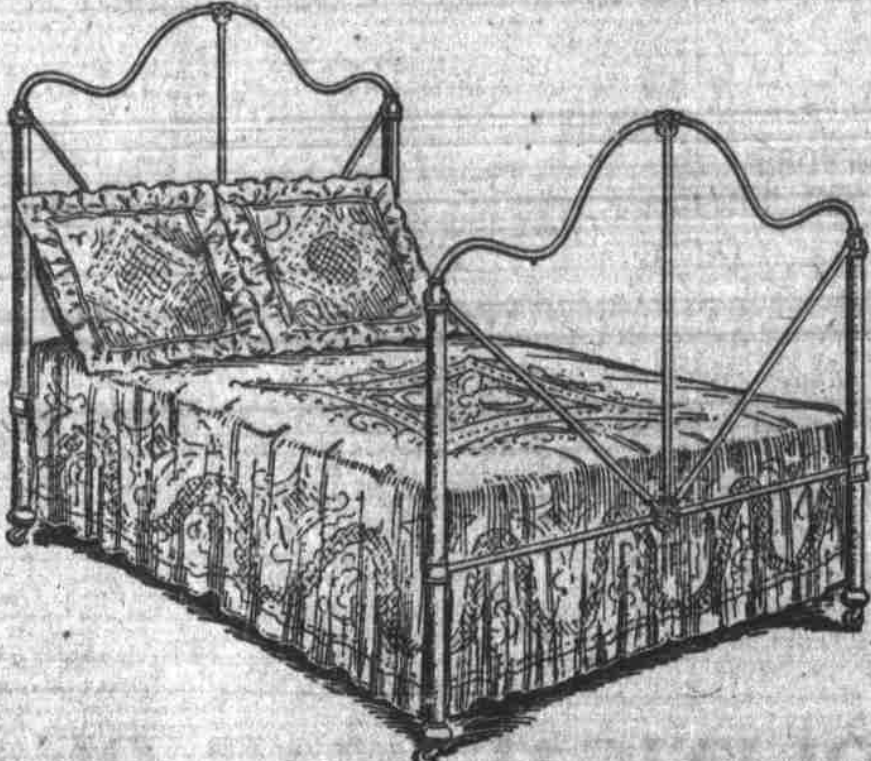
