

# WIFE PICKS UP HIS SILENCES HUSBAND BY KICK MONTGOMERY ASSERTS IT HAS POSSIBLE SPEED OF 200 MILES AN HOUR.

She Also Inspired Daughter to Pick His Pockets, Says Albert Mittlehner in Suit for Divorce.

Albert M. Mittlehner, a brewmaster for the Portland Brewing company, has found married life full of excitement and thrilling situations, according to a suit for divorce he has filed in the circuit court against Josephine Mittlehner. A recent sample experience was on the night of November 2. The night before, he says, Mrs. Mittlehner was away all night, and when she did not return home until 1:15 a. m. the next night he mildly asked where she had been. Whereupon, he says, she "kicked, beat and jumped upon him" and added several unlovely words to his name.

Two weeks after his marriage in January, 1909, his trouble began, says Mittlehner. His wife, he alleges, allowed his wife \$50 per month for household expenses, but she demanded \$10. She won her point, he admits, after refusing to sew on his buttons or mend his clothes. Finally pretending to be sick with nervous prostration and writhing like a maniac, he says, she beat her head on the sides of the bed until he caught and held her to prevent further damage.

Daughter Made Paces. Before her last marriage Mrs. Mittlehner had been married to a man named Manning and by her first mate has a daughter named Hazel, 19 years old. This girl, says the brewmaster, is incorrigible, and has been encouraged by her mother to pick his pockets, make faces at him and "turn up her nose" when he sought to rebuke her.

August 1, he recounts, the girl rifed his trousers, secured \$60 and ran away to Hood River. He caught her there at the hour of midnight, he says, dressed up in a full wild west cowboy outfit, for which she had spent his money. The next day she came home, when he arrived home with the girl and sought to give her a few lessons in honesty, he declares, his wife prodded the girl to make faces and then go to the piano and play. "What's the matter with her?"

One morning at breakfast time, says the complainant, Mittlehner suggested the use of some stale bread. His wife started to toast the bread, he says, but soon flew into a rage, threw a knife and fork at him and told him to go to the kitchen. He later, he says, told her she had previously advised her daughter Hazel to tell him to visit the very same place, he says. At the noon meal the same day as the knife and fork incident, he declares, she threw the coffee pot into the sink and called him shocking names.

Shows His Clothes Out. Another incident told by the husband is that he was hit on the neck with a hairbrush after he had kicked on the door for admittance. Then, he says, she threw a suit of clothes, overcoat, hat, shirts and collars into the vestibule. Mrs. Mittlehner has contradicted large bills at the dry goods stores, says the complainant, and keeps him largely in debt. Money intended for laundry and gas bills has been spent for theatre tickets, he complains. Recently his wife left him, he alleges, in a new calling herself Josephine Manning, using her former husband's name.

In a separate suit, Mittlehner is suing his wife and Anthony Neppach to get back property he has deeded away. By threatening to leave him and refusing to cook his meals, he says, he was obliged to deed to land worth \$1250, and he wants this deed set aside.

A mortgage on certain property was given by himself and wife to Neppach, he says, and later he gave Neppach a deed on the promise he would receive the return trust deed to protect his equity interests, worth \$2400. Neppach has since refused to give the trust deed, he says, and is supported in this course by his wife. He charges Neppach and Mrs. Mittlehner are now trying to sell this property, and he asks the court to restrain such a sale.

# MILWAUKEE BY THE CAMPAIGN

### Opponents Unearth Embarrassing Platform of One Mayor-Candidate.

Milwaukee is in the throes of an election campaign as bitter as any in her history. The fight centers around the two candidates for mayor, Phillip Streib and Thomas Shindler. Both men have large forces of friends working for them and many novel campaigns and features are promised before the election next Monday.

Opponents of Shindler, formerly mayor of the city, but who was defeated by Streib, the present incumbent, at the last annual election, are using a platform which Shindler used in the campaign of 1906 to defeat him.

On this occasion, Shindler was opposed by G. S. Mullien for reelection and upon election day issued thousands of printed circulars in which he told the voters that he should be re-elected again because there was work unfinished which had to be done and which he could do much better than any one else, because he was familiar with it. He also promised that in the event he was elected he would not run for the office of mayor again. That was in 1906, and in both 1908 and this year ex-Mayor Shindler has been a candidate.

Shindler's plan in 1906 of having started work which was not yet completed in the basis of the strongest fight for Streib. The city is in the midst of a campaign for better streets and sidewalks and has several miles of paving work in view. Streib has started this work and his friends maintain he should be re-elected and allowed to finish the work.

One of the biggest projects contemplated by the city is the grading and surfacing of Front street. The tracks of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company run down this street and the company has agreed to put its tracks to whatever grade the city may outline. This street, on the banks of the Willamette river, will be a beautiful driveway when graded and paved.

Ex-Mayor Shindler is working hard at managing his own campaign. His supporters are making a close man to man canvass and believe they will be successful.

At a special election which will be held shortly after the general election the city will decide whether it wants to amend the city charter so that the city may bond itself. It will vote also on the amount of bonds which it will issue.

### WOUNDED SLAYER PLANNED ESCAPE

William Hensing was removed from St. Vincent's hospital to the county jail yesterday. He so far recovered from the self-inflicted bullet wound in his head as to make the removal safe. From remarks made by Hensing, it was concluded that he would try to escape if given the opportunity. A stronger plea than the hospital was considered necessary. Hensing killed his wife at the corner of Fourth and Columbia streets last Thursday night, that shot himself. Her wounds were fatal, his not serious.

### TALKS ON TEETH Good Ethical Dentistry

Whatever may have been our previous conceptions, there is nothing expressed or implied in the code of ethics which prevents a dentist conducting his business on profit-producing lines, so long as he conducts it on the square-deal principle. "Honor."

The dentist is free to educate his patients to the appreciation of good dentistry. This means that he must know his patients what good dentistry is and what it can do.

This does not mean that he shall unduly advertise himself. Assuredly, it does not mean that he should belittle another. Mere worldly wisdom would indicate that the dentist refrain from self praise. It is an exhibition of weakness quickly perceived by others and never forgotten. It intimates that a man cannot safely leave it to others to praise him for his work, but that he fears it will not be done unless he seizes the opportunity to do it for himself.

The same form of wisdom shows the folly of belittling another or his work. Such a course reveals a mean soul. It declares plainly that as he would take advantage of one who is not able to defend himself, he will take advantage of the patient in those ways where the patient's knowledge is not sufficient to protect him. It labels belittling as unworthy. This habit is a boomerang in the hands of him who practices it and it often returns to wreak damage on him who launched it.

It makes a more favorable impression if we are big enough to stand on our feet without taking from our own pedestal stones to stir another's practitioner.
