Captain Moore's Good Work—The November report of the detective bureau shows that much work has been done by that department. Captain John Moore is head of the bureau, and efforts have been made to vigorously ferret out thefts and crime falling under his charge. The report shows 145 larceny cases were reported to him, and 75 were cleared up. Twenty bad checks were reported, and 11 were traced to the men floating them. There were three holdups, and one man caught. Larceny cases to the number of 26 were reported from other cities, and three of these were cleared up. Two cases of pickpockets were reported, and the men arrested. One man attempted to smuggle goods into Portland and was captured. Three thieves stole goods from the pockets of other men, and were arrested. Three bunco cases were reported, and three men arrested.

Submits Pavilion Plans—Tentative plans for the sanitary, modern, tuberculosis pavilion to be erected on the new county poor farm were submitted by Architect Bridges to the county court yesterday. The plans contemplate the construction of a building about 180 feet long with the sides so arranged that during favorable weather they may be opened out to the air. The office, or administration section of the building, is placed in the center. One side will be used for men, the other for women. Accommodations will at first be arranged for about 25 patients, with arrangements for enlarged accommodations if necessary. In the meantime, County Judge Cleaton is seeking to have all eligible charity patients in Multnomah county sent to state sanatorium at Salem.

Civil War Sharpshooter Dies—William W. Root, who served as a sharpshooter in the Civil war when but 14 years of age, died yesterday morning at the residence of his sister, Mrs. Caroline Virgil, 324 East Thirteenth street, North. He was 64 years old, and came to Portland 26 years ago. For 13 years he was connected with the Ladd & Tilton bank, retiring because of ill health. He was a member of George Wright post, G. A. R. In addition to his mother, Mrs. C. M. Gee, and several brothers three sons survive. They are George G. Root, bookkeeper of the First National bank; W. W. Root, plumber, and Clarence M. Root, a business man. The funeral service takes place Friday afternoon.
