

OREGON SENATORS WORK FOR CRUISER FOR THIS STATE

Believed Application of Oregon Naval Reserves for Old Battleship Will Be Acted Upon Favorably.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, Dec. 2.—Senators Bourne and Chamberlain have endorsed the application of the naval reserves of Oregon for the assignment to the organization of an old battleship or cruiser for practice. The department seems disposed to view the request favorably and it is believed, will finally grant the application.

Several weeks ago Captain George S. Shepherd of the Oregon Naval Reserve applied to Secretary of Navy Meyer for a warship to be stationed at Portland and used as training ship for the newly organized reserves. Captain Shepherd suggested that the advertised auction sale of either the cruiser Boston or the gunboat Concord at the Bremerton Navy yard be postponed with a view of having one of these vessels turned over to the Oregon reserves.

The secretary of navy acted promptly upon the suggestion and had an examination of the two vessels with the result that it was ascertained that they could be placed in excellent shape for less than \$20,000 per vessel. This information was received from the navy department a few days ago, and it was hoped that the cruiser Boston would be ordered to Portland as the vessel would not only prove a fine training ship but would also be an interesting sight to visitors from the interior who have not had opportunity to inspect any of Uncle Sam's vessels.

Seattle too, is trying to get the Boston, but had it not been for the timely action taken by Captain Shepherd, the vessel would have been sold at auction for junk and their machinery by this time. It was Captain Shepherd who brought the matter before the navy department and as soon as an investigation was begun to ascertain how much it would cost to place the vessels in perfect trim. Seattle got busy and thought it wanted the Boston for its naval reserve. To appease the competitor across the sound the Seattleites suggested that the Concord would probably go to Tacoma.

The Portland division of the Oregon National Guard is rapidly gaining new recruits and will be able to turn out in good shape as soon as the money for the necessary uniforms has been raised.

JUDGMENT FOR \$105,000 FAVORS PLAINTIFFS

Judgment for \$105,000 has been entered in the circuit court by Judge Morrow in favor of A. A. Welch, J. D. Welch and W. P. Slaughter against W. G. Hollis because of the failure of Hollis to carry out an agreement to sell 1620 acres of land in Skamania county, Wash. The effect of the judgment is to require specific performance of the contract. Hollis paid \$5000 down on the land, but refused to make the other payments provided for, asserting the plaintiffs failed to clear the title as he had stipulated. He asked for his \$5000 back on cross complaint but the court held he should pay \$105,000 more.

MISS HELEN TAFT ENTERS SOCIETY AT WASHINGTON

Debut of President's Daughter One of Most Brilliant Affairs in White House History—Fifteen Hundred Guests.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Washington, Dec. 2.—One of the most brilliant receptions in the history of the White House was that given last night to present society Miss Helen Taft. Fully 1500 guests attended, making the occasion one of the gayest of all the gay gatherings of Washington society. Roses were everywhere. Masses of bloom spread fragrance throughout the immense rooms of the White House, the color effect being in keeping with the color scheme of the national residence.

In the green parlor the president and his wife and daughter stood to welcome the guests. Pale tinted flowers were bunched about the mantels. The pianos in the east room and in the blue parlor were covered with the choicest blossoms sent to Miss Taft. On the tables pink roses only were used.

Guests announced. Captain Hart announced the names of guests and Colonel Spencer Cosby made the presentations to Mrs. Taft, who in turn presented the guests to her daughter. Mrs. Taft wore a gown of soft blue chiffon from over chiffon and satin, the top bodice finished with point lace. Miss Taft's gown was of dull pink chiffon, made in draped princess style with a sort of surplice effect in the bodice. Her brown hair was dressed in a mass of soft curls.

The case was transferred to Seattle for trial. No date for the trial has been set.

BELLINGHAM SALOON MEN WANT MONEY BACK

Bellingham, Wash., Dec. 2.—Saloon men of Bellingham, backed by the brewer of the state, will make a test case of the state local option law, if the city is unable to pay them back the unearned portion of their license money on January 1, when the saloons will go out of business here as a result of the decision at the polls recently. It is

held by the saloon men that one part of the law cannot be enforced and the other set aside, and that if the city cannot pay, the courts will be asked to enjoin the officials from attempting to stop the sale of liquor until such time as the money is forthcoming. The city attorney declares the position of the saloon men is untenable and has uttered a veiled threat that if the dealers become too belligerent some licensees may be revoked between now and the first of the year.
