Kane's a Law Case.

Just 52 years after its adjournment a law case which was originally interrupted because Richard de Maundeville had to leave for the war in France, has been resumed in the chancery court. The point at issue is the right to hold a market at Stowmarket, Suffolk, and the suit was originally brought by the abbot of St. Osyth, Essex, in the reign of Edward III, against Richard de Maundeville. The abbot claimed that Richard had wrongfully obtained the grant of the right to hold a market "to the grave damage of the said abbot." Richard claimed the king's protection and eventually the case was adjourned sine die because of his departure abroad. At the resumed hearing last week G. F. Howard, the modern representative of Richard, asserted that G. A. Woodward, the modern representative of the abbot, had no right to set up a rival market. This assertion was supported by Mr. Ogden, K. C., who cited the Domesday Book and other books. "When Richard de Maundeville went abroad," remarked Justice Dyer, "he little foresaw that we would be fighting the same question 600 years afterwards." The hearing was adjourned.

Although the small holdings act had only been in operation for two and a half years, county councils had already submitted schemes for the acquisition of 22,000 acres of land—and loans had been sanctioned by the local government board for nearly \$1,500,000.

Welsh Strike.

As a result of the Welsh mining strike collisions with the police have already been frequent and so serious is the situation that cavalry and infantry detachments are being held in readiness at Cardiff and Brecon. There are now nearly 12,000 strikers in Aberdare valley, South Wales. Charles Stanton and his Socialist followers are jubilant for only one small colliery in the valley is working. There are already hundreds of homes verging on destitution. While the riot of the Cambrian colliers was proceeding, strikers attacked the powerhouses and fired the straw in the fly wagons. A blaze was caused, but it was soon put out, and the police played the water hose on the strikers. Stones were again hurled and several police officers were injured. About 60 strikers were also injured.

Long Road Built in a Day.

Independence, Kan., Dec. 3.—Every able bodied man in this (Montgomery)

county lent a hand to building a new road between here and Coffeyville, eighteen miles away. About 1500 men were engaged in the work. The road was completed, with the exception of spreading the oil, at nightfall.

TASK TO HANDLE CANADIAN GRAIN

Consul's Report Shows 89,000,000 Bu. Have Reached Upper Lakes During Year.

(United Press Lined Wire.)

Washington, Dec. 3.—The enormous task of handling grain from the Canadian west at the head of the upper lakes, through Fort William and Port Arthur, in which he says:

"From September 1, 1908, to August 31, 1910, 89,000,000 bushels of grain passed through these ports, the preceding year 65,000,000 bushels and the year before 47,000,000.

"The combined harbor has 16 grain elevators with a storage capacity of 30,000,000 bushels. The 4,800,000 bushel one belonging to the Grand Trunk Pacific is the largest in the world, and the first of ten which that railroad is building. The Canadian Pacific has five, the largest holding 3,500,000 bushels. The Canadian Northern has two, each with 3,500,000 capacity.

"It is hard to realize what it meant to bring this enormous traffic of grain to the elevators for trans-shipment by boat. Allowing 100 bushels to the car, 89,000,000 bushels would fill 89,000 cars, or 13,000 trains of 70 cars each. The busy times are the spring and late fall, when 20 to 40 of the Great Lakes freighters are alongside the elevators with grain pouring into the vessels' holds.

"The Canadian government takes an important part in handling the grain at this trans-shipment port. An act of parliament provides for the grading of the grain, and government inspectors pass on every carload in the assembling yard before it goes to the elevator for unloading. The grain has already passed one inspection at the starting point, and the second inspection at the elevator terminal is performed to confirm the western grading. The inspectors are on hand again when the grain is shipped out. They watch the weighing and see that the grade is what is called for. Every boat that clears with a cargo of grain carries a certificate signed by a government official showing the quantity and quality of the grain it contains."

MOONSHINE STILL LARGEST CAPTURED

Washington, Dec. 3.—The art collection of Royal E. Cabell, commissioner of internal revenue, has been enriched by the addition of a rare specimen, a photograph of the second largest moonshiners still ever captured by the revenue officers. The still is a product of the

still of North Carolina moonshiners. It was taken eight miles south of Virginia. The government raiders called between midnight and daylight at the secluded spot where the plant was located. They found the still and a supply of materials that enter into the making of ardent spirits. No prisoners were captured, the moonshiners having received a tip that the "revenue" was on the march, and scattered to their peaceful homes. The still has a capacity of 500 gallons, and when sold a copper

junk by the government will yield about \$200. It is the largest "pot" still ever captured. A still of another design and larger size was taken by the revenue men near Hoffman, North Carolina, several years ago. In that case a distillery had gone out of business and several unassuming gentlemen bought the alcohol-making apparatus for junk. A few months later the government officers discovered that the "junk" had been set up in a swamp and was producing contraband liquor in vast quantities.
