John Kennedy, Yale's veteran rowing ceach, is defended from recent attacks by Cameron Waterman of Detroit, Yale's former captain, who calls Kenne-dy peerless as a coach and who blames lack of material for Yale's recent de-

Writing in the Tale Daily News, Waterman says: "For years I have watched with alarm the trend of Tale rowing conditions and the underlying causes. As early as 1904 the result could be and was foreseen by many. Harvard men with whom I have conattribute the decline to our coaching


