THREE BUSH SLAB
WONDERS SIGNEDManager McCredie Secures
Sanchez, Boston Prospect,
Artlett and Ruth.

Manager McCredie of the Champions will give three young California bush-slabs a chance to make the Beaver pitching staff next season, one of whom, George Sanchez, is so promising that Charlie Hall recommended him to the Boston Americans. Sanchez lives in Ventura, Colo., and comes from a good Spanish family. He concluded that a year of seasoning in the Coast league would be just the thing for him, and accepted McCredie's terms in preference to inviting Boston to tender him a contract. He is a big fellow and hurries from the starboard side. McCredie had his eye on Sanchez all last summer and told Hall to give him a line on him. Hall's home is also in Ventura.

Sanchez pitched a game for Ventura against some big leaguers like Hall, Dolly Gray and George Stovall, and let them down with two hits, and following this performance Hall tipped him off to Boston.

Artlett, a young heaver from Elm-hurst, and Ruth, a San Francisco semi-pro phenom, are the other two. Artlett held the San Francisco Beavers down to a 4 to 2 victory against a semi-professional team in a post-season exhibition game. Claude Berry thinks he is a coming wonder of the Coast league.

Ruth, like Artlett, is a young fellow with a great deal of speed on account of his size. He has been pitching semi-pro ball around the Bay City and is highly regarded by those competent to judge.

Not Far Many Kids.

Manager McCredie will not try as many unknown fellows as last year. He intends to rely a great deal on Cleveland sending him one or two good performers to add to Steen and Seaton, who promise to be away up in the averages next year. If Jesse Garrett shows signs of coming back he will be transferred from the Northwestern to the coast league some time in June or July. Against two clubs last year Garrett was invincible. They were Oakland and Sacramento. He had poor luck against the others, however, and Steen, as mentioned several times, will be the man around whom the hopes of the Beavers will be built. McCredie is banking on Seaton to finish well up, and he trusts Archer, the Three-I south-paw, may partly fill the loss of the great Gregg.

Last year McCredie could win a game many times he wanted by rushing Krapp, Gregg or Steen to the mound. This year he can hardly hope for such luck. Although one can never tell what is in store for a ball club, and there may be another pair like Krapp and Steen among the recruits who report to the Beavers training camp next March.

VICTORIA RUGBY TEAM
WON'T CHANGE DATES

Victoria, B. C., Dec. 12.—A change in the dates fixed by the Victoria Rugby club for the Pacific coast championship matches is sought by the management of the Berkeley team. Monday the 26th, Thursday the 29th and Monday, January 2, are the days which have been selected locally for the games between Victoria's 15 and the California students, who are coming after the Keith cup.

The southerners do not want contacts to be made with the work. They object to the calling of one of the games for the second day of the new year, pointing out that this would mean that they would miss a southbound boat and materially increase the expense of the trip.

The matter has been considered by the Victoria club, and the decision reached that it is now impossible to change the dates.

SELLWOOD ROLLS UP
SCORES ON SHAVERWinner Will Meet Irvington for
Grammar Football Cham-
pionship Friday.

Sellwood eliminated Shaver from the race for the grammar school football championship last night by defeating her 14 to 0. This places Sellwood against Irvington for the championship next Friday.

Sellwood easily defeated Shaver, the game being almost entirely in Shaver's territory. Occasional long runs by Ralph Colvin would put the ball in Sellwood territory, but not for long. Runs by Mallet, Martin and Proppe would soon return the ball close to Shaver's goal.

Sellwood's first touchdown was made in the first quarter after about eight minutes of play. They received the ball in the middle of the field on a punt and by steady gains placed it on Shaver's 10 yard line. Martin put it over from here on an end run. Sellwood kicked the goal.

The second touchdown was made in the third quarter. Sellwood got the ball on their own 45 yard line. A long run by Martin placed the spheroid on Shaver's 35 yard line. Sellwood put it over from here on straight football, including runs by Proppe and Mallet, but failed to kick the goal.

Blocked Punt Makes Touchdown.

The third and last touchdown of the game was made in the last quarter. It was Shaver's ball on her 1 yard line and Colvin stepped back for a punt. Sellwood broke through the line and blocked the kick, the ball going straight up. It fell in fair territory and rolled back over the goal line, where a Sellwood player fell on the ball. Sellwood again failed at goal.

Ralph Colvin played a great game for Shaver and Mallet, Martin and Proppe starred for Sellwood.

New York, Dec. 12.—Little opposition to the reelection of Thomas J. Lynch as president was expected when the National league directors met this afternoon at the Hotel Breshin to select officers and draw up a schedule for next season.

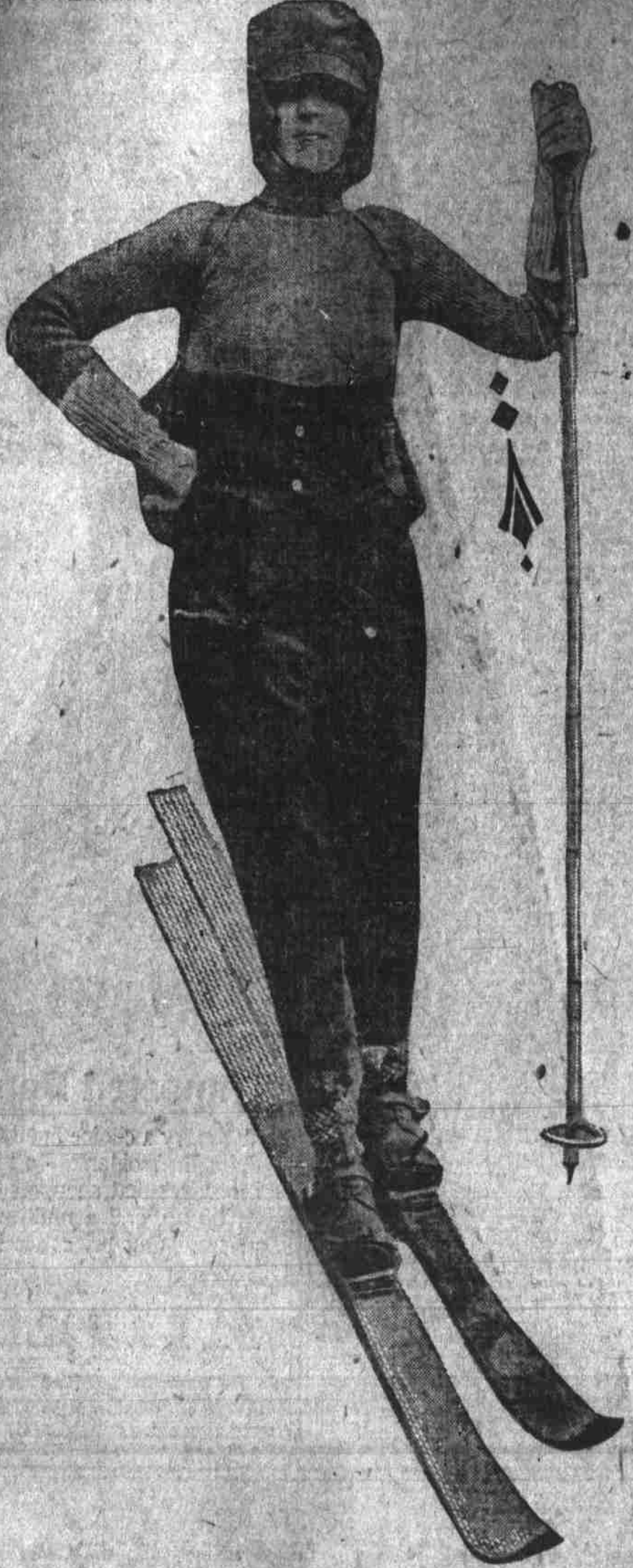

DUARTE-HOLLAND
BOUT STIRS FANSSt. Johns Captures Big Card in
Signing Up Clever Middle-
weights.

Jack Duarte, who is matched to box Fritz Holland, the fast California middleweight, before the St. Johns Athletic association next Friday evening, was host to a party of boxing enthusiasts yesterday afternoon at his training quarters in St. Johns. Duarte boxed 10 fast rounds and demonstrated to those present that he is in the pink of condition and able to travel 10 rounds at a lightning clip. He boxed five rounds with Kid Kruger and the balance with a heavyweight weighing 220 pounds. Duarte toyed with the big fellow, hitting him at will.

There is no doubt in Duarte's mind but that he will be returned the winner over Holland next Friday evening. There will be no decision but he wants to show Holland Duarte is confident of turning the trick before the tenth round leaves in sight. He looks upon his bout with Holland as being the chance to redeem the win that Holland has to his credit in a previous battle. Those who have seen Duarte's workout each afternoon are sure that Jack will win in 10 time, while the more conservative fans figure him to have the battle of his life on hand.

The wisecracks admit that Duarte is a great middleweight and is anxious to see him beat Holland decisively, but they feel that Holland's experience will overwhelm Duarte's confidence and wallop.

Holland Old Ringmaster.

Holland has been training in San Francisco and when asked by the management of the St. Johns association to agree to meet Duarte he jumped at the offer. Holland is an experienced ringmaster. He has been in many battles with the best middleweights in the country and has many victories dangling at his belt. In California he is looked upon as the coming middleweight champion. The Bay City promoters would have liked to sign Holland and Duarte to a 20 round bout, but the St. Johns management beat them to it. Holland is built along the lines of Kid Carter, who was one of the greatest lightweights that ever stepped onto an arena. Holland can handle any angle and is game. He uses the Ketchel shuffle, which has won many battles for him. In meeting Duarte, Holland figures to use all his knowledge and ring generalship in order to come out on the long end of the honors. He recognizes that to beat a man of Duarte's caliber he must be right on edge, therefore he has asked Tommy Tracey, the well known retired welterweight, to assist him in his training and will get the benefit of Tracey's experience. Tommy will be the man in charge of Holland on next Friday evening, which means Fritz will have the wisest man in pugilistic matters in this neck of the woods in his corner.

All in all, the bout promises to bring out a record breaking gathering of fans who will journey down to St. Johns.

Bobby Evans and Kid Kruger will meet in the preliminary, which promises to be a crackerjack curtain raiser. Evans has been anxious for the chance to redeem himself for the showing he made against Bud Anderson, and will try to put "Gom Paul" into dreamland before the gong sounds at the end of the bout.
Special car service has been arranged and the fans will be back in Portland before 11:30 o'clock.

Pacific University, Forest Grove, Or., Dec. 13.—Basketball and indoor track work now absorb the entire attention of students at Pacific, and every effort is being made to turn out winning teams in both activities.

For the past 19 days a large number have been turning out for basketball and doing hard scrimmage work, in which some excellent new material has shown up. Of last year's team, Ward, Taylor, Livingstone and Markie have been showing their consistent basket throwing and of the new recruits, Shaver and Anthony are doing aggressive work. Shaver was captain of the Allen preparatory team last year and his experience will count for much.

Several Games Scheduled.

Games are to be played with Dallas college, Philomath college, Chemawa Indians and McMinnville college, the first of which will take place January 14 with Philomath.

Indoor track has received an impetus this year which will count for much, caused by the excellent facilities of the new "gym." Training has started in earnest and although old men are scarce, Coach Conville has hopes of developing a team which will show up well in Pacific's first meet with the M. C. A. of Portland February 11 at Forest Grove. Ten events are on the schedule, which are as follows: 25-yard dash, 220 dash, 440 dash, 880 run, mile run, 35-yard hurdles, high jump, pole vault, shot put and relay races.

Arrangements are being made for a meet with O. A. C. also in the near future.
