Labor Unions Petition Governto Subdivide Fort Walla Walla Tract and Sell to Workers.

Walla Walla, Wash., Dec. 17.—Laboring organizations of Walla Walla will make a strong fight to secure the Fort Walla Walla lands when they are disposed of by congress, and at the meeting of the Trades and Labor council of Walla Walla, which takes in labor anions with a membership of 700, resolutions against that the land he cut up and ions asking that the land be cut up and sold to laborers in acre tracts will be pressed and will then be sent to govern-ment officials for action.

That the resolutions will be unanimously passed is without doubt, for every labor union in the city has taken them up and passed them separately. The seal and signatures of the officers of every union are attached to indorsements of the resolutions, and these will

That the action has not been taken with a view to simply shutting out Whitman college from obtaining the land is averred by those in connection with the move; but they state that unless the land is given to laboring people there is every chance it will be given to some private corporation, which will make the people who ultimate the people some private corporation, which will make the people who ultimately get it pay for the profit made by these cor-

"The land should go to those who will farm it," said E. W. Olsen, chairman of the committee which had the man of the committee which had the matter in charge. "And there is none more deserving than the laboring people. The bill would require them to be actual settlers, and it would provide net only for union laborers, but for all laborers, of whatever kind. We have no fight with Whitman but we helieve we are with Whitman, but we believe we are more entitled to the land."

From a reliable source it is learned that the new movement has the good will of many congressmen, high government officials and local men of influence. That it will be supported by the American Federation of Labor has been assured, and organized labor the nation over will take a hand in the matter.

No Fight Intended. Just what the result of this will be is hard to tell. Whitman college has announced that it will make no further fight, but will let matters take their course. With the laboring men of the nation interested in the movement, it is possible that congress may take favor-

able action on the resolutions.

The resolutions reported by the committee, and adopted unanimously, are as

Whereas, It is generally believed that Fort Walla Walla, a cavalry post, situated near the southeastern limits of Walla Walla, State of Washington, and asisting of six hundred acres or more of land, is about to be ordered a doned, having already been vacated by

"Whereas, Said tract of land, if abandoned will have to be disposed of by the United States government, its pre-

sent owner, by act of congress, and
"Whereas Said land being a portion
of the most fertile of the soils of the Walla Walla valley and especially adapted to intensive cultivation, will be much sought after by private financial in-terests for exploitation towards personal gain, which will mean that the final owner and husbandman will be required to pay for said land from two to three times the amount which the government will receive for the same,

"Whereas, Ultimately said land must necessarily fall into the ownership of the laboring people, in order that it may have the proper care and cultivation to make it yield a competence to its owner, and if subdivided into aure tracts, will provide homes for six hundred of more industrious families, therefor be it For Common People.

"Resolved, By the Trades and Labor council of Walla Walla, Washington, representing a membership of seven hundred individuals, a majority of whom are heads of families, that it would be a matter of great facility and economy, as well as justice to the common perple, for congress to enact a special act providing for the subdividing of the aforesaid land into acre tracts, and apgraise same in a manner that will rea conably remunerate the government, and to provide for the payments to be made in several equal annual installments, also with the provision that the purchaser must make said tract his or her nome and make reasonable yearly im-provements thereon, until same is fully paid for and title received from the covernment, and be it further Resolved, That this council petition

honorable congress of the United States to enact a law, the essence of which shall be as outlined above, and which will make the lands aforesaid diectly transferable to the ownership of industrial toilers, whether they are mem-bers of organized labor or not, and be it

Resolved. That a copy of these lutions be forwarded to the president of war and to members of congress.

The Iroquois and Chippewa were built for operation on the great lakes and were purchased and brought to the sound from the Atlantic.

CARRIER STRIKE AT ADELAIDE SERIOUS

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Melbourne, Dec. 17. — The carriers'
strike at Adelaide has taken on a serious aspect. Almost all the industries are at a standstill in consequence of a sympathetic strike, and the price of food is rising rapidly. The trade unionists are intimidating the free laborers and there are frequent colli-sions with the police, who are almost helpless. The general outlook is omi-nous, as it is feared the agitation will spread over the whole of Australia. The carriers demand higher wages and shorter hours.


