Portland, Or., Dec. 22. — There has been a marked increase in pressure over the western half of the country, and a large high pressure field now overlies that section with center over adjacent portlons of Oregon and idahe. High pressure also overlies the Appaiachian alghands. A trough of low pressure extends from Texas to Manitoba. Light precipitation has occurred in .northeastern Washington, in northern Utah and in the Mississippi valley. The weather is cooler than usual over the greater partion of the Pacific slope, and cast of the Mississippi river, where the lemperatoures are 2 to 18 degrees below the normal. In the Mississippi and Missouri valleys and in western Canada temperatures are 1 to 29 degrees above the normal.

Conditions are favorable for occasional rain tonight and Friday west of the Cascade mountains in Oregon and Washington, and generally fair weather over the eastern portion of the district. The weather will be slightly warmer west of the Cascades, but in general all temperature changes will be unimportant. 
