Weather Conditions. A large low pressure area overlies the Canadian northwest, and a small low pressure area is central over Lake Eris. The barometer continues relatively high over a strip of territory extending southeastward from Oregon to New Mexico. During the last 24 hours light snow has fallen in the northern states east to and including the Lake region. No precipitation of consequence has oc-curred on the Pacific slope or in the Atiantic or Gulf states. 




