Defense Will Try to Prove Mrs. Schenck Insane: Husband Will Probably Not Testify: History of Case.

Wheeling, W. Va., Jan. 7.-All prep-arations have been practically completed and, unless some unforeseen Ungency should arise, the trial of Mrs. Laura Farnsworth Schenck, who is charged with the attempt to poison her husband, John O. Schenck, a multi-millionaire and president of the F. Schenck Packing company, founded by his father, Fred Schenck, will begin in the criminal court of this city on Monday next. The trial had originally been set for December 19 of last year, but at the request of counsel for the defense Judge Jordan granted a postponement to January 9. Owing to the wealth and social prom-

inence of the Schenck family the case has attracted more than ordinary in-terest, not alone in this city, the home of the Schencks, but throughout the state and in much wider circles. The case presents many interesting features and it is expected the defense will make a bitter fight, relying upon a plea of insanity to save the defendant. It is believed that facts of the most sensational nature will be brought out in the course of the trial and there is no doubt that large crowds will fill the courtroom at every session of the court.

A Self-made Family.

The case will be heard before Judge Lewis H. Jordan and a jury in the criminal court. Prosecuting Attorn-y J. Bernle Handlan will conduct the case for the state, and will have the support of his assistants. The defense will be represented by J. J. P. O'Brien

The Schenck family is well known in this part of the country and its history as a prominent social factor began with Fred Schenck, who started in business nearly 50 years ago and accumulated a fortune estimated at 12 to 15 millions, in the pork packing industry. He founded the F. Schenck Packing, company and remained at its head until his son, John O. Schenck who had been active in the business for a number of years, became president of the concern and its leading spirit. John was successful and his individual wealth is estimated at more than \$4,000,000.

Weds Carpenter's Daughter. Mrs. Schenck, the daughter of F. C. Farnsworth, a plain carpenter was a cook in the home of J. G. Tomlinson, a retired official of the Pennsylvania railroad, when she first met Schenck. The latter was a personal friend of Tomlinson, and at that time, about 15 years ago, was a frequent visitor at the Tomlinson home. Schenck, then a young man of 30, was attracted by Laura Farnsworth, then a pretty girl of 25. It was easy for them to meet
