

ANTI-TRUST BILL, JOSEPH, AUTHOR, AMONG THE FIRST

Will Propose for Oregon Regulations Similar to Those of Ohio and California, Following Sherman Law.

An anti-trust bill which will subject all Oregon "captains of industry" who enter into combinations in restraint of trade to imprisonment will be one of the important measures to be considered by the coming session of the legislature. Senator George W. Joseph is expected to introduce the measure early in the session.

The bill will be drawn on the lines of the Ohio and California laws, which are practically identical, the Ohio law being known as the Valentine act and the California law as the Cartwright act. The Ohio law, the pioneer in effective regulation of trusts, has been made the model for laws of several other states. The bill defines a trust as a combination of "capital, skill or acts by two or more persons, firms, partnerships, corporations or associations of persons, or of any two or more of them, for either, any or all of the following purposes:

To create or carry out restrictions in trade or commerce.

To limit or reduce the production or increase or reduce the price of merchandise or of any commodity.

To prevent competition in manufacturing, making, transportation, sale or purchase of merchandise, produce or any commodity.

To fix at any standard or figure, whereby its price to the public or consumer shall be in any manner controlled or established, any article or commodity of merchandise, produce or commerce intended for sale, barter, use or consumption in this state.

To make or enter into or execute or carry out any contracts, obligations or agreements of any kind, article or commodity of merchandise, produce or commerce, whereby they may have bound themselves not to sell, dispose of or transport any article or commodity or any article of trade, use, merchandise, commerce or consumption below a common standard figure, or fixed value, or by which they may have bound themselves to keep the price at a fixed or graduated figure, or in any manner directly or indirectly preclude free and unrestricted competition among themselves, or in any way pool or combine to directly or indirectly limit or restrict the sale or transportation that may affect the price.

Provisions for Punishment.

All such combinations are declared against public policy and void. The district attorney of any district or the attorney-general of the state is directed to institute suits to forfeit the franchises and privileges of any corporation violating the act, and corporations organized outside the state which violate the act are to be ousted from the state.

Persons convicted of violations of the act may be fined from \$50 to \$5000 or imprisoned from six months to one year, or both, each day's violation constituting a separate offense. Proof of a written agreement of an illegal combination is not required, and the character of the trust may be shown by proof of its general reputation as such.

Persons required to testify under oath before a grand jury or a court may not be excused on the ground that they may incriminate themselves, but no person so testifying shall be punished as a result of any disclosures he makes.

Right of action is also given by the bill for a civil suit by any person injured in his business by an illegal combination, and he may recover two-fold the amount of damage if he makes out his case.

Unions May Be Exempted.

One difficulty encountered by anti-trust acts has been opposition by labor unions, which fear they may be dissolved by court decisions declaring them to be illegal combinations. An amendment is being considered which may exempt them from the operation of the act, and another amendment proposed is the exemption of voluntary associations of fruit growers.

The purpose of the bill is to do within the state what the Sherman law does in the United States on questions of interstate commerce, except that the proposed law is more drastic and effective.

TWO BOYS OF 13 ARE CAPTURED IN ACT OF ROBBERY

Delivery Man Surprises Them While They Are Rifling Residence; Captives Confess to Two Other Burglaries.

Two 13 year old burglars, giving their names as John Schulz and Rudolph Minch, were captured early last evening while in the act of ransacking the home of Dr. J. J. Pittenger at 143 Wygant avenue.

The boys were apprehended by a delivery man, named Pearson, who was making a delivery at the doctor's home. He saw the boys rifling the drawers of a downstairs dresser. As he entered the house, Schulz, the larger of the two boys displayed a revolver, and then rushed to a front window and jumped out, followed by Minch.

Pearson gave chase, and captured Minch without much of a run, and later succeeded in capturing Schulz, who by that time had disposed of the weapon. Police headquarters were notified and Officer Welbrook was sent to take charge of the boys.

When they were searched, pass keys, a quantity of tobacco and cigarette papers were found in their possession.

On arrival at the police station they were turned over to the detectives who questioned them closely as to their methods. Minch is a previous offender. Two years ago he was sent to the state reform school for a similar offense.

Both boys confessed to robbing three houses, but could not tell whose homes they were. One was entered Friday afternoon after school had been dismissed, and two were entered today. The revolver, they say, was secured in the first house they entered yesterday, and six cents was taken in the second house.

Both boys displayed a very great adaptability to the work they were doing when their capture was effected. Schulz seemed to be the more skillful of the two, as he was given credit of being the "thinker." Schulz would go

to a promising looking house, ring the bell, and if there was no response, they would attempt to gain entrance by the use of their pass keys. If they did not succeed in this way, they would try the cellar door.

"We would always select a house where the curtains were down and where there was no smoke coming from the chimneys," explained Schulz. "You see, that would generally mean that nobody was at home, but if some one did answer the door, we would say, 'Kin you tell me where Baltimore street is?' Or we would always say some street that we knewed wasn't any place around."

John Could Think Fastest.

"I always let John go to the door 'cause he could think faster than me, and if somebody came to the door, he could always say something to get away," declared Rudolph Minch.

"But we were scared when we was in the house, and I shivered all the time, but I just kept it to myself and worked away," said Rudolph. His stoical little face, however, gave the lie to this statement, for while being cross examined by the detective in an effort to determine the full field of their operations, he was defiant and manufactured tale after tale to fit the circumstances.

Young Schulz took the matter lightly and confessed his part with a laugh, viewing the whole affair as if it were a huge joke. He was extremely pleased when he explained that the delivery man was frightened when the revolver was displayed.

On a description of the hiding place of the revolver an officer was sent to find it and discovered a .38 calibre, long barreled weapon.

John is the son of Gustav Schulz of 341 1/2 Williams avenue, a carpenter, and Rudolph is the son of Wilhelm Minch of 663 East Eighth street, also a carpenter. Both boys will be turned over to the juvenile court tomorrow.

The boys claim they got their ideas about the smoke and curtains from a boy whom they met early in the week.

DIAMOND THIEF'S FACE DUG UP IN ROGUE'S GALLERY

Charles J. Williams, Arrested at St. Paul, Seems to Be D. F. Keller, Ex-Captain of Regulars; Record as Forger.

St. Paul, Jan. 7.—Charles J. Williams, arrested Wednesday when it is said he attempted to steal a \$500 diamond after trying to blind a jewelry clerk with red pepper, has been positively identified as Captain D. F. Keller of Reading, Pa., for 10 years a soldier in the United States army and formerly of Troop A, Eighth cavalry.

Captain Keller was wanted at Reno, Nev., for a \$7500 forgery.

The identification was made after two days of work on the part of Detective James Murnane of the central station. Following the vague idea that he had seen Williams' face among the thousands in his Bertillon gallery, Murnane took up the search and was rewarded this afternoon.

A photograph of Captain Keller, taken nearly four years ago in uniform, is identical with the one of "Williams" made after his arrest Wednesday night.

Captain Keller, according to a circular sent out by the Pinkertons in 1907, cashed a check for \$7500 at the Washoe County bank in Reno, three years ago. It was signed with the name W. W. Robinson, quartermaster in the United States army, and the signature later proved to be a forgery.

Captain Keller enlisted with the Eighth cavalry February 1, 1896, and served until February 13, 1907. He had risen to the rank of captain, when he resigned, at Fort Columbia, Cuba, on that date.

Jury Inquisition. The charges made by Deputies Williamson, Maris and Shrock that Bailey used the state pure food

fund for his own purposes, that he did not attend to duty and was only in the office at times when the mail was delivered, were said to be confirmed by collectors for the gas company and the telephone company, who are expected to declare that before they could get Bailey to pay his office bills they had to make many trips, then threaten to discontinue service. Deputy Williamson, who as chemist was in the office almost constantly during working hours, said yesterday that people would come and go all day looking for Bailey, but that he was rarely in. It was necessary, said Mr. Williamson, to write a note and leave it on Bailey's desk, telling him it was called and when he was coming again.

Chemist's Expense Account Story.

Although Williamson, as chemist, turned in many statements for expenses, the records in the office of the state treasurer show that but three were charged to him personally during the two years past. "This was because," said Williamson yesterday, "Bailey paid me in cash when I presented expense accounts for specimens collected. In only the three instances did he give me a warrant to cash. At other times he made out the warrants to himself. Whether he changed the amounts or not I do not know, except one time, when I saw a statement I had given him lying on his desk, the amounts of which had been doubled, and a number of things I had never bought added to it."

Will Demand Auditing Body.

W. J. Clemens, state representative, said yesterday that he did not believe the alleged confusion of personal and official charges on the pure food fund could be cleared up until an auditing committee has been appointed by the legislature, and that he would make it one of his first duties after going to the legislature to secure the adoption of a resolution authorizing the appointment of a committee that would really make the necessary investigations.

PASSES FROM SLEEP
TO DEATH IN SALOON

When Tom Morrison of 295 Hawthorne avenue, went into the California saloon at 153 Front street yesterday afternoon and fell asleep at a table, he fell into the sleep that knows no waking. Five hours later, when G. U. Utter, the bartender at this saloon, went back to arouse him, he was unable to do so, in spite of the vigorous shaking he administered.

Utter called the police station and Officer C. C. Klinger was sent to investigate the case. He found that the man was dead. The remains were turned over to the coroner who found letters on him from his wife and daughter who live in London, England. His remains will be held until relatives are notified. Heart failure is given as the cause of his death.

Spurred by Big Reward, Detectives Seek Clues to Perpetrator of Dastardly Crime—Widow Gets Pension.

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 7.—A pension of \$50 monthly will be paid to the wife of Captain of Police John T. Sullivan, who died early this morning from a bullet wound, inflicted by an assassin firing through a window of his home Thursday night. The captain lacked but one day of being on the Spokane police force 21 years when he died, and his widow will get the pension under the city's civil service rules.

The funeral will take place Monday morning and interment will be made in Elks' Rest at Greenwood cemetery.

The entire detective department is working on clues picked up today and it is said to be their belief now that Sullivan is a victim of S. J. Hanley, a desperate holdup convict, who was sentenced to Walla Walla penitentiary from Spokane several years ago. Hanley was captured at that time after a terrible fight with Sullivan, in which the latter was shot and very seriously wounded.

On leaving Spokane after being sentenced Hanley swore in terrible oaths that he would come back and kill Sullivan as soon as he could after being released from prison. Governor Hay paroled Hanley a year ago against the protest of Sullivan and various other members of the police department. Hanley was seen in Spokane less than 30 days ago by Detective Briley.

Sentiment runs high and it will require little to start a bitter demonstration against the Industrial Workers of the World, whom many suspect of complicity in the plot.

Lured by a reward aggregating upwards of \$15,000, all detectives, both city and private, are looking for clues in hope of running the slayer to earth.

An inquest will be held over Sullivan's body Sunday.
