

SECOND TRIAL OF GEORGE MEYERS

Man Who Killed Salem Patrolman to Be Arraigned Monday; Witness Gone.

Salem, Or., Jan. 12.—The second trial of George Meyers for the murder of Patrolman Thomas Eckart will begin in the circuit court here next Monday before Judge Percy Kelly. Meyers was convicted of murder in the second degree at the first trial, but the case was reversed upon appeal to the supreme court and remanded for further proceedings.

Though the case is set for next Monday, there is much doubt that it will come to trial at that time, for the reason that Arthur Meyers, brother to George Meyers, and one of the most important witnesses in the case, is still absent. The case was postponed from last October because Arthur Meyers was not on hand to testify and apparently little effort has been made since then to learn the whereabouts of the witness.

Meyers shot and killed Eckart while under arrest for disorderly conduct. He charged the officers for about a week, and finally gave himself up to a retired minister living on a farm a few miles east of Salem after a reward of \$1000 had been offered by the authorities for his apprehension.

MEASURES WOULD IMPROVE RIVER

Washington Legislators Look to Fish Protection; Abolish Capital Punishment.

Olympia, Wash., Jan. 13.—Both houses of the legislature adjourned Monday morning, after passing a resolution for the appointment of a committee to confer with a like committee from the Oregon legislature to frame bills for fish protection and improvement of the Columbia river. Two bills were introduced at the morning session for the abolishment of the death penalty for murderers or treason. Life imprisonment is substituted.

FAVORABLE REPORT ON ANTI-SPY BILL

(United Press Landed Wire.) Washington, Jan. 13.—The house judiciary committee today voted a favorable report providing punishment for spies in times of peace. It is designed to remedy defects in the present law which provides no punishment for foreign spies.

An attempt will be made to rush the bill through the house. The measure would affect the activity of Japanese spies in the Philippines. The recently discovered activity of spies there is said to be the reason for the endeavor to rush the bill through.

ENTRYMAN GIVES BACK LAND, PAYS THE COSTS

Upon motion of the United States district attorney a suit to cancel a patent to public land secured by William H. Glenn was dismissed by United States Judge Bean today. The land in question was returned to the government and Glenn paid the costs of the suit.

ROSE CITY FOR THE ROTARY CLUB

Chicago Club's Action Taken to Settle Location of Convention of 1911.

Chicago, Jan. 13.—The Chicago Rotary club held the first formal banquet in the new Sherman house last night and decided in favor of Portland, Or., for the big convention to be held this year. It was a great gathering. Following the banquet adjournment was taken to the hall, where R. W. Raymond, chief of the convention bureau of the Portland Commercial club, gave an illustrated lecture on Portland and the Pacific northwest.

Handsome colored views of scenery along the Northern Pacific, Great Northern and O.W. R. & N. were greeted with marks of appreciation, as were scenes in Spokane, Seattle, Tacoma and Portland.

The hall was decorated with artistically tinted enlarged photographs of Portland, with inscriptions indicative of the welcome Portland would extend to the National Rotary club. Buttons reading "Portland, the Rose City, 1911," were worn by all the banqueters.

Telegrams from the Portland Rotary club and the Seattle Rotary club were read. Other telegrams were delayed by the storm.

At the close of the address of the evening, by Manager Raymond of the Portland convention bureau, it was voted unanimously with cheers to instruct the representative of the Chicago Rotary club on the national board of directors to cast his vote for Portland for the 1911 convention.

This is taken practically to fix the place of the convention, for four votes of the five required are pledged to Portland and this action by Chicago, which is the founder of rotary clubs, will undoubtedly settle the question.
