

WELL IS AFFINITY OF CHINOOK WIND

Current of Warm Air Comes
From Bottom of Well Just
Before Chinook Starts.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Spokane, Wash., Jan. 13.—On an orchard tract near Wenatchee, Wash., west of Spokane, there is a well 120 feet deep that has been acting queer the last few days. The well was put down two years ago, and until recently displayed no peculiarities. A member of the family approached the well for water a few days ago, and was astonished to hear a hissing noise from the depths of the well. A closer investigation showed that a blast of air was belching forth through openings in the covering of the well. Curiosity led to further investigation, and a couple of the planks covering the well were raised. It was found that a warm current of air was floating upward, and as near as could be ascertained it was coming from a point just above the surface of the water. The well kept belching wind for a couple of hours. About 8 o'clock in the evening a chinook wind started to blow, and the well immediately quieted down. The same phenomena was repeated a few

days later, and those who witnessed it are greatly puzzled to know what connection the current of air can have with the chinook.

HOMELESS MAN HAS HOME FOR 13 YEARS IN CITY HALL TOWER

Los Angeles, Jan. 13.—City hall officials today came to the aid of S. L. Colburn, an old but practically unknown municipal employee, who was found dying yesterday in the tower of the city hall, where he has lived for 13 years, with only bats and pigeons for company. Colburn was removed to a local hospital today, where he is attended by physicians.
Colburn, who is 52 years old, has been lost in the heart of the city for 13 years, so far as the throngs of people in the streets and nine tenths of the city hall employees are concerned. Most of that time he has been on the payroll of the fire department, doing work when called upon. Only a few persons knew where he lived, and these few paid little attention to him. So when he became ill, several weeks ago, no one knew of his condition, and it was only when an old crotchety climbed into the tower to find out why he had not been seen, that his predicament became known. If he recovers he will be pensioned by the fire department.

BREAKS PROMISE TO FIANCEE BY SUICIDE

A self-inflicted gunshot wound that resulted in death was the end Harry W. Wetzel, a United States customs inspector, put to a drunken spree at 8:45 last night at the Clarno hotel, situated at the east end of the steel bridge. Wetzel had made numerous threats to kill himself while in company with Mrs. Jessie L. Edwards, his fiancée, during the evening, but when she left him, five minutes before he ended his life, she had secured his promise to do himself no harm. Before she reached her apartment, however, which is in the same building, the fatal shot had been fired. Mrs. Edwards rushed back to the room, but hesitated about going in. T. C. Peebler, a grocer, who lives in the same hotel, found Wetzel sitting in an armchair with a wound over the heart. Death had been instantaneous.

The body was removed to the morgue, and relatives notified.
Wetzel was 40 years of age. A brother resides at Sellwood, and other relatives in Portland.

CENTRALIA HOPES TO GET OWN WATER SYSTEM

Centralia, Wash., Jan. 13.—As a decisive step toward municipal ownership, the city council of Centralia is aiming to acquire a city water system, and it will cost \$200,000, if present estimates are verified. The present water system

covers water supply from the Skookumchuck river, and it is unsatisfactory in quality. This service is derived from pumping, while the suggested system would be gravity supply.
The aldermen believe that the result of the change would include better service, lower rates and finer quality of water, and the city fathers are thoroughly in earnest about giving the measure every possible support, despite some opposition by citizens who protest

against the cost.
A formidable form of opposition to the movement is the fact that the city has already exceeded its legal indebtedness of 8 per cent by something like \$70,000, and a number of the townsmen take the view that a reduction of the city's bond and warrants indebtedness should precede any wholesale outlay in public improvements.
