AGGIE WRESTLERS PROVE PROMISING

Expect to Land Another Championship for Corvallis at Mat Game.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Jan. 13.—The college wrestling team will be in the field for the mat championship with a very excellent chance of again bringing the coveted honors to Corvallis, according to Coach James Arbuthnot. A large number of candidates are in the field and are working hard for places on the regular team.

The team, which last year won the championship, has lost but one man, Captain Thompson. The ex-captain's place will probably be filled by Gibson, who formerly wrestled in the 135 pound class. Last year he proved to be an excellent man and Coach Arbuthnot feels that he will be able to work in the 145 pound class without any difficulty. Peterson, a husky lad from the Multnomah club, who has had several years' experience, will probably take Gibson's place in the 135 pound class.

Captain Charles Sitton will wrestle in the 175 pound class in which he probably has no equal in the northwest. The 155 pounder will be represented by either Shaddock of last year's team or McKenzia. Percy will wrestle at 125 pounds, the same as last year, and DuMoulin will again represent the college as the lightweight. There are also several promising freshmen who are trying for the various welter classes.

A wrestling match has been scheduled with the University of Washington for March 11 to be held in Seattle. Last year the college men had no difficulty in defeating the northerners and hope to turn the trick again this season.

Chicago, Jan. 12.—The American association yesterday elected Thomas M. Chivington as president, secretary and treasurer for 1911. The season was ordered open April 12 and will consist of 165 games.

PORTLAND GETS BIG WRESTLING EVENT

Portland gets the national wrestling championships for 1911.

After four years of the hardest kind of work Edgar E. Frank, chairman of the boxing and wrestling committee of the Multnomah club, this morning gave out a bit of news which has been eagerly awaited for the past four or five months. James E. Sullivan, chairman of the Amateur Athletic union, this morning telegraphed to T. Morris Dunne, secretary of the Pacific Northwest association, that it had been decided to give Multnomah the championships.

Frank stated that the championships, the first ever allotted to a city west of Chicago, would probably be held during April. It is his plan to give all of the Pacific coast clubs ample time in which to prepare to meet the crack from the big clubs of the east, and Multnomah club will endeavor to make the meet the most notable in the history of the amateur mat game.

Frank, personally, has been working to secure the championships for Portland for the last four years. In 1907, when he went east to wrestle in the National championships at New York, he started on the committee and there has been no cessation since. In Seattle two years ago he made a personal canvass of every member of the Amateur Athletic union executive committee there and secured assent to the plan to hold the meeting here. Last year Morris Dunne talked over the matter at the annual A. A. U. meeting and received favorable replies. Just before the Chicago meeting last month, Frank wrote every member that he knew and asked him to lend his support to Portland's invitation.

CHAMPIONS GO AGAIN TO SANTA MARIA, CAL.

Billy Miles, a former Portlander, through whose efforts the Portland baseball club trained at Santa Maria, Cal., last year, telegraphed this morning that Manager McCredie had been there yesterday and had assured Santa Marians that the Coast champions would work into shape there again this season. Miles says the Beavers and recruits have been ordered to report the last week in February.

Those who are close students on conditioning think that McCredie made a splendid move in returning to Santa Maria, where his men were put into such fine shape last year. The Beavers open at Los Angeles and since Santa Maria is almost as hot as the southern California metropolis, the boys should be worked into fourth of July form right at the start.

Santa Maria did more than any other California town for McCredie in the way of providing a ball park and an up-to-date clubhouse, and he carried away more money from exhibition games than on any other trip. They have promised him plenty of games and that is what McCredie wants.

DUCKS AND TROUT TO BE REGULATED

Sportsmen's Association Discusses Topics to Be Presented to Legislature.

Duck shooting season from Sept. 15 to Feb. 1.
Thirty-five bird limit for one week.
Open trout fishing season, April to September.
Illegal to catch trout under six inches in length.
Salmon trout fishing at all times of year in tide water.

Trout of any description to be caught only with hook and line.
The above were some of the resolutions approved by the Oregon Fish and Game association at its annual meeting in the Chamber of Commerce building last night, and the organization will memorialize the legislature in an effort to get these provisions incorporated in the new game laws.

John Gill was elected to succeed Dr. P. L. Langworthy as president of the association. The other officers elected were: W. P. Buckus, vice-president; A. E. Gebhardt, secretary; J. R. Bowles, treasurer; William L. Finley, W. P. Berger, Walter B. Honeyman, Joseph Paquet and C. L. Diven, directors. Mr. Gill is one of the most enthusiastic and best informed game and fish men in the state. Mr. Gebhardt was elected secretary of the association for the eleventh consecutive term.

The meeting was one of the most enthusiastic ever held by the association, and a great many sportsmen not members of the body were present to talk over the game laws. A committee consisting of Dr. Langworthy, W. P. Finley and A. E. Gebhardt was appointed to draft a set of game laws to submit to the legislature.

One of the important matters discussed was the proposition of increasing the membership of the organization to 500 if possible. Regular meeting will be called in the future and an effort made to increase interest in fish and game matters.

WOLGAST-MORAN MATCH EXPECTED

Managers May Sign Up for Championship Event Before Nightfall.

Chicago, Jan. 12.—That Ad Wolgast and Owen Moran will be matched to fight for the lightweight championship of the world before nightfall, is the belief of Chicago sporting men.

Tom Jones, representing the "Wallflower champion" and Charlie Harvey, Moran's manager, were scheduled to hold a conference to discuss terms this afternoon.

Preliminary differences have been swept away largely by previous dickering and through the medium of the sporting columns and it is expected that the actual signing will be brought about.

The only obstacle in the way of the proposed match, and one that is expected to develop much argument, is the question of a date. Wolgast undoubtedly will want to wait until March or April. Moran would fight next week if Wolgast would say the word.

The men are expected to compromise probably on Washington's birthday.

Edict of Mrs. G. May Be Overruled If Hackenschmidt Wrestles Others.

Chicago, Jan. 12.—"I am not crazy to get back into the game, but I will wrestle Hackenschmidt if he can first throw Zhyssco and Mahmoud," said Frank Gotch, retired heavyweight champion wrestler, today.

Gotch's announcement occasioned much surprise, as it was supposed that his wrestling days were over, following the edict issued a week ago by his fiancée, now his wife, that under no consideration could he return to the mat.

Hackenschmidt is only a mediocre performer, according to Gotch.

"Dr. Roller is the only really first class wrestler he ever beat," said Gotch, "and Roller is 40 pounds lighter than the Russian. Let him throw the other men in his class, and then I will talk business with him."
