

ARETAS BELDING TAKES LAUDANUM; MAY NOT SURVIVE

Councilman Belding's Brother
Depressed Over Alleged
Flight of His Wife and Tries
to End Troubles.

Brooding over the alleged elopement of his wife between Christmas and New Year's with an employee of his jewelry store, and dependent over a long illness, Aretas W. Belding, of the Belding Bros. jewelry store, and a brother of Councilman Henry Belding, attempted suicide shortly after noon today by taking laudanum.

He was rushed from his home at Fulton to St. Vincent's hospital as soon as it was found that he had taken the poison, and at 3 o'clock this afternoon it was feared he would not survive.

Mr. Belding has been ill for some time and has been doctoring for his complaint, and his taking the poison was not known for some time.

His relatives and family declare it was an accident that took the overdose of laudanum. The suicide theory is given weight as he is known to have been in a very depressed state of mind.

His wife, to whom he was married 11 years ago, left him very suddenly about three weeks ago and is said to be in Seattle. Mr. Belding's niece, who is at the store on Washington street, advised the wife had gone with the clerk but refused to give his name.

TEST VOTE UPON DIRECT ELECTION

Only on Motion to Adjourn,
but Advocates of Resolu-
tion See Hopeful Sign.

Washington, Jan. 13.—Almost beyond question the resolution for a constitutional amendment providing for popular election of senators will be adopted by the United States senate. This became apparent today when a test vote on a motion to adjourn, thus to stop debate, brought out the vote of 17 for and 42 against adjournment. Not everyone who voted not to adjourn will vote for the resolution, but most of them will, and many who favor it were not present at that moment.

Carter of Montana surprised the senators by declaring he would support the resolution, not because he believed in it but because the legislature of Montana had so instructed him.

Thirty-one legislators have already endorsed the principle.

Voting "right" were Borah, Borne, Chamberlain, Jones, Flint, Carter, Newlands and Dixon. Voting "wrong" were Heyburn, Guggenheim and Warren. Piles and Perkins were absent.

SLAVER, ON PAROLE, FACES DOUBLE TERM

Only one ballot was required by the jury yesterday afternoon to determine the guilt of William Boyd, charged with white slavery in the circuit court. The case was heard by Judge Gatsch.

Boyd was accused of aiding Luther Adcox, a chauffeur, in sending Elizabeth Harlow, 17 years old, to a resort in the Dallas. Boyd is 25 years old, and is on parole from the state prison, having been sent there on a charge of burg-

lary. His sentence was for 10 years, of which he served six years. In addition to his sentence in the white slave case, he will be required to complete his original sentence. The father of the young man has spent much money in efforts to keep him from prison, and was overjoyed with grief when the jury returned the verdict yesterday. He readily gave \$750 bail for the boy's appearance Tuesday in court for sentence.

Adcox pleaded guilty, was sentenced to one year in the county jail, and will be required to pay a fine of \$100. Deputy District Attorney Collier prosecuted the case against Boyd. He characterized the trafficking in girls one of the most despicable practices known.
