

INSURGENTS WILL HOLD MEETING IN CAPITAL SUNDAY

Rusk Forces Declare They Have No Fear of Movement and That Speaker Will Win in Monday's Battle.

With the insurgent forces working tooth and nail to line up members of the legislature on the issue to be raised Monday, Rusk supporters declare they have no fear of the movement, and that they have a substantial number above a majority with them.

W. J. Clemens, the Multnomah county manager of Allen H. Eaton of L-ne, declared this morning that they already had 31 men with them and that they expected to add to this number before the house resumes its sessions. A meeting of the so-called insurgents will be held in Salem Sunday afternoon to map out the proposed program.

men, asserted this morning that the Eaton-Ambrose movement could not at best rally more than four members from Multnomah county, and there has been a marked breach in the Eaton ranks during the past few days. Fouts declares that even allowing for two possible absentees there will be at least 36 men to back up Rusk.

Fouts declares he has no idea as to why Ambrose is opposing him as chairman of the revision of laws committee, and James D. Abbott as ways and means chairman.

"Ambrose and everybody else knows that I have always stood for clean and progressive legislation," said Fouts. "I believe I can say the same for Mr. Abbott."

Abbott also declares he is mystified by the attitude of Ambrose, and had no intimation until yesterday that Ambrose would oppose him. He, too, says that he is confident the Eaton-Ambrose forces will be defeated.

One reason for the confidence of the Rusk men is that numerous positions on committees have been given to Eaton men. They declare the speaker has shown no discrimination against the men who opposed him and voted for Eaton, although he has naturally given good appointments to men who were with him and friendly to his principles, they say. It is very likely, however, that Rusk will come to Portland tomorrow from Salem, in order to get a closer view of the situation and satisfy himself as to whether there will be any real danger on Monday.

Eaton men assert they are fully aware of the proposed committee appointments for some of their number, but they claim these are of a comparatively unimportant nature and not sufficient to withdraw any of their strength in favor of Rusk.

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RUSK DENIES TRADES, SAYS HE'LL CONTROL OWN APPOINTMENTS

Salem, Or., Jan. 13.—Nobody will dictate Speaker Rusk's appointments according to a statement made by him this morning. He says he will control his own appointments, but will be glad to receive suggestions from any members of the house and has, in fact, invited each member of the house to visit him at his office where he is now occupied in making up his appointments and make any suggestions as may occur to them. "I will control my own appointments," said the speaker, "and there has been no trade made by which anyone will dictate any of my appointments. I have asked each member of the house to visit me between the adjournment Wednesday and next Monday to come and discuss with me these committees and many have complied."

"I could not be expected to put my enemies in control of important chairmanships. In the opinion of some of my friends, I am being too generous now. I named Representative Eaton, my opponent for the speakership, chairman of the committee on rules. I named Representative Mahoney, a friend of Representative Thompson, also a candidate for speaker and Mr. Abbott, my own supporter, members of the committee, giving all three factions representation."

"The friends of Mr. Eaton have come to me and have pledged me their support. They have asked for consideration in the making up of the committees, and it will be granted them."

DISCORDANT PAIR PUT EACH OTHER DOWN IN QUARREL

Walter I. Scott Says Wife Used Pistol, Too; M'Ginn Gives Divorce Where Love Does Not Dwell in Home.

Walter J. Scott, traveling salesman for a clothing house, and his wife, Laura, began quarrelling within six months after their marriage in 1907. This quarrelling continued until last October, when she started suit for a divorce. They were married in Spokane and moved to Portland, living at 747 East Eleventh street. Mrs. Scott alleged in her complaint that her husband struck her several times, and on May 28, 1910, choked her. A few days later, she alleged, he threatened to kill her, and on September 30, again struck her and knocked her against the sofa. She said he earned \$250. In his answer, Scott said the fault was all his wife's. He alleged that she snatched a loaded pistol at him June 10, 1910, and on June

15, 1910, knocked him down. He said she should not be given the divorce, but when the case was heard Thursday evening, he did not appear against her. The only reason Clara Markness gave her husband, Alfred, living at 7 East Ash street, for deserting him in 1909 was that she did not love him. This was cause sufficient, held Judge McGinn, and he allowed a decree. Markness and his wife were married in 1892 in Washington. He said that during the last four years of their married life, his wife was gone frequently from the home and often expressed dissatisfaction with him. One child in a boarding school was left in the school, where both the parents have the privilege of visiting it.

Louis E. Gibson, living at the Oregon hotel, said his wife Eleanor "nagged" him and made life miserable. They were married in Birmingham, Ala., in 1908. His wife left him six months ago, and he has not heard from her. While conducting a delicatessen store at 48 North Sixth street, Gibson said she would enter the place and abuse him before customers. A decree was granted.

Selma Jones was 16 years old when she married Casey Jones. This was three years ago in Williston, N. D. They lived together one year, when Casey Jones said he was going to leave her. Nothing has been heard from him since. She was granted a divorce. Seila McKern told the judge that night and in at the Oregon. Robert M. McKern refused to speak to her for two years. They were married in 1896 in Los Angeles, Cal., and he left her three years ago. She moved to Portland, and is engaged in the rooming house business. A decree was granted.
