

MOHAMMEDANS OF BOMBAY ENGAGE TROOPS; 18 DEAD

Orthodox and Sectarian Factions Squabble Over Street Parade; Order Against Parading Ignored.

Bombay, Jan. 13.—Six religious celebrants, wounded in a clash with troops when a parade, planned as part of the celebration of the Mohammedan new year, was prohibited, died today. Twelve others were killed yesterday, making the total dead 18. In addition 24 were severely wounded. A fresh outbreak of rioting was feared today, and troops patrolled the sections where the disturbance was feared, and others were held in readiness for service at instant notice.

The trouble was the result of differences between Sunnites, orthodox Mohammedans and Shiites, a sect, over the celebration of the festival of Mohorum, the first month in the Mohammedan year. A great parade had been planned, and it was feared that it would end in rioting on account of the open hostility of the factions. The authorities ordered the parade abandoned.

The leaders of the Mohammedans decided that the parade should be held in spite of this order, and it was formed. The troops advanced to interfere with the movement of the procession, and rioting ensued. The Mohammedans rushed the soldiers and drew weapons. The troops replied by firing a volley, which did not check the attack. Volleys after volleys were fired directly into the swarming Hindus. Women and children were among the dead and wounded.

The paraders retreated to their homes, where they remained locked in.

CLAIM CHARGE HIGH FOR SHIPPING CASH

Salem, Or., Jan. 13.—The railroad commission will take testimony at Salem, January 26, relative to alleged overcharges for shipping cash between McMinnville and Carlton in Yamhill county. Complaining bankers of those towns say they have been charged 75 cents per \$1000 by the Wells Fargo Express company for this service when the published tariff shows the rate to have been 50 cents per \$1000. Refund of the overcharge is desired.
